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National Congress, S.A.R., at Louisiana Purchase Exposition, St. Louis, Missouri

HISTORY OF THE MISSOURI SOCIETY

1889

The circular sent to Missouri Governor Francis by Mr. William O. McDowell of New Jersey was the beginning of the thought to form a state society. New Jersey called on all states to meet in New York on 30 April 1889 and form a national society. The circular set forth the objects and aims of the proposed association. This meeting of delegates from the states is mentioned in the history of the national society.

Governor Francis sent the circular and other papers to Josiah Fogg of St. Louis and stated that he had no objection to have the organization in St. Louis. Mr. Fogg immediately published a notice in the newspaper and met with interested persons, advertised again and, on 23 April 1889, had nearly 50 persons. The previously appointed committee reported in favor of organizing and presented a constitution and by-laws.

The meeting voted in favor of organizing the proposed society and adopted the constitution and by-laws. The Missouri Society, SAR, then became officially organized on 23 April 1889.

The Honorable Gaius Paddock was duly elected to serve as a delegate to the meeting on 30 April 1889 in New York at Fraunce's Tavern. After a two day session, the National Society, SAR, came into being and Gaius Paddock of St. Louis was elected as treasurer. Governor D. R. Francis was elected as a vice president.

The St. Louis city government and the Merchants Exchange jointly arranged to have a grand parade on the 30th of April in accordance with the recommendations of Congress to celebrate the 100th anniversary. The Missouri Society of the Sons of the American Revolution voted to join the procession with their marshals, flags and music, and to wear the old Continental hat. It was reported "the day was a delight and nothing occurred to spoil the pleasure of the occasion.

1890

Josiah Fogg, Esq., was chosen president for a second term. The first National Congress was held in Louisville, Kentucky, at the Galt House on April 30. The constitution was adopted at this congress. Signers included delegates from Missouri: William C. Stamps (listed as W. C. Stamfors, St. Louis) and Charles E. Briggs.

1891

Nathan Cole was elected as president. In February, at the annual meeting, Professor James K. Hosmer delivered a very interesting address.

Charles McLaren, Missouri Society Number 25, a "real son," died on 12 December. His father, Patriot John McLaren, was a private of a Maryland Regiment of the Continental Army. Missouri had two members as "real sons"; the other "real son" was William Shackelford Stamps, Missouri Number 6.

Nathan Cole was re-elected as state president for a second term. Charles E. Briggs of Missouri was elected Chaplain General at the national congress held in the Governor's Room of the City Hall, New York City. Missouri ranked twenty-second out of thirty-nine states in the number of members.

1893-1894

Information on these years is lacking in the state and national records regarding the Missouri Society. Edward Carrington Cabell was elected as state president for both years. William S. Stamps, "a real son," died on 19 July 1893.

1895

St. Louis, Mo., February 23, 1895.

The sixth annual meeting and the third annual banquet of the Missouri Society of Sons of the American Revolution was held at the Mercantile Club last evening, it being the anniversary of Washington's birthday. A large number of the members were present. The management had invited the Daughters of the American Revolution to participate with them on this occasion, and many of its officers and members were present. The officers of this society are, Mrs. James J. O'Fallon, State regent; Mrs. Randolph Hutchinson, Chapter regent; Mrs. W. Bascome, secretary; Mrs. Dr. Hardaway, registrar; Mrs. Judge Amos Thayer, treasurer.

The banquet hall was beautifully decorated with flags, flowers and palms. Prior to the banquet the society held its annual meeting for the election of officers. Hon. E. C. Cabell declined a re-election, and Col. George E. Leighton was chosen President.

At eight o'clock the guests repaired to the banquet hall, where an excellent menu was served, after which the following toasts were offered: "St. Louis in 1825, when visited by Gen. Lafayette, and St. Louis in 1895," Hon. Nathan Cole; "Benjamin Franklin," Ashley Cabell; "Benjamin Rush," Dr. C. H. Hughes; "Gen. Washington as a Christian," Rev. S. J. Niccolls; "The Daughters of the American Revolution," John L. RoBards; "Our Patriotic Societies," Gen. Geo. H. Shields. Delightful music was furnished by the Hatton Glee Club and Mandolin Band.

The Missouri Society S.A.R., was duly organized April 23, 1889, and elected a delegate to attend a convention to be held in New York on the 30th of April of that year, at which time the National Society S.A.R. was appropriately organized by duly appointed delegates from several States. The society claims to be the only one established upon a national basis, and each member of a State society is a member also of the national society. The Missouri society has gradually increased so that the number, character and standing of its membership places is upon a solid basis.

This society is rich in distinguished revolutionary ancestry. Among its members are several who are descendants of signers of the Declaration of Independence. One a descendant of Gen. Nathaniel Greene, another of Gen. Benjamin Lincoln, another of Gen. Israel Putnam, one a great great grandson of Patrick Henry, one a great great

grandson of Mildred Washington, the aunt and God mother of Gen. Washington, another the great grandson of Elizabeth Washington, the only sister of Gen. Washington, and this member is the nearest living relative to Gen. Washington.

1896

The annual meetings of the Missouri Society are held on March 4th each year to commemorate the taking effect of the Constitution of the United States. Annual dinners (banquets) are held on 19th April to commemorate the battles of Lexington and Concord. On 19 April this year the first chapter in Missouri was organized as the Kansas City Chapter (see histories of Missouri Society's chapters).

1897-1898

George H. Shields was elected as state president. He also was re-elected in 1898, '99 and 1904. He had the distinction of having served as a member of the U.S. Constitutional Convention of 1875. He was also noted for having encouraged his wife Mary to spend time in Washington, D.C., to help organize the D.A.R. Mrs. Shields was a charter member of the organization and its first Secretary General. Mrs. Shields is attributed with originating the idea for the D.A.R. magazine, as well as promoting national resolutions for flying the American flag over every school and teaching the children the words to the Star Spangled Banner.

1899

February 22 President George Shields called a meeting for 2:00 p.m. in Room L, Mercantile Club, St. Louis, Missouri. In March the Board of Managers met in the office of General Shields. Delegates to go to the National Congress in April at Detroit were the Honorable Stephen P. Twiss and E. H. Phelps, both of Kansas City.

Membership on February 22 was 180 members. Since organization, 231 member cer-

tificates have been issued.

The Missouri Society published an 86-page yearbook after being organized for ten years. The publication committee was Col. George E. Leighton, George H. Shields and John M. Fulton. The book contained the Constitution and by-laws of both the National Society and Missouri Society. Officers were: president, George H. Shields; vice-presidents, Edwin Harrison, C. H. Sampson, J. L. RoBards and D. S. Harriman; honorary vice-presidents, Judge Samuel Treat, Nathan Cole, George E. Leighton, Josiah Fogg and Stephen P. Twiss; secretary, Melvin Stearns; treasurer, I. Shreve Carter; registrar, J. M. Fulton; historian, Horace Kephart; chaplain, Rev. S. J. Niccolls; board of managers - Charles H. Hughes, M.D., Gaius Paddock, C. P. Walbridge, Ashley Cabell, Peyton H. Skipwith, Jr., Isaac M. Mason, Charles M. Napton, T. Griswold Comstock, M.D., Rev. J. D. Vincil, Edmin L. Adreon, James M. Jones of Kansas City, E. H. Phelps of Kansas City and Rev. W. W. Boyd.

Officers of the Kansas City Chapter were also listed (see chapter history).

The Missouri Society S.A.R. and many D.A.R.s and officials of other patriotic societies assembled at the Mercantile Club at 7 p.m. 4 March 1899 to celebrate the taking effect of the U.S. Constitution. The menu included Blue Point oysters, Cream of Asparagus Chevreuse, Hors d'Oeuvres varies, Amontillado Sherry, Filet de Sole Marquery, Pommes Gastronomes, Chateau L'atour Blanche Wine, Tenderloin of Beef with Mushrooms, Green Peas, Broiled Philadelphia Squab, lettuce salad, Neopolitan ice cream, assorted cakes, Roquefort and Neufchatel Bent's Wafers and Mocha.

General George H. Shields gave the welcome address and talks were given by Rev. Dr. W. W. Boyd and Charles M. Napton. The book listed all of the members to that date. This list commenced with Missouri Number 1 and went through number 224. It

also contained the patriot ancestor of each member listed.

Letter from the Missouri Society to the Kansas City Chapter dated 9 March informed that a James Gash, a Revolutionary soldier, is buried near Palmyra, Missouri. The Kansas City Chapter officers were the Honorable Stephen P. Twiss, president, and Frank C. Spaulding, secretary.

Meeting of the board of managers met on 27 January at President Shield's office. The board debated on holding the Annual Banquet on the anniversary of the battle Lexington on 19 April. The annual dinner was held on 19 April at the Mercantile Club, St. Louis. The annual meeting had previously been held on Washington's birthday.

1901

The National Congress was held 30 April-May 1 at Pittsburgh. Vice President General for Missouri was the Honorable D. R. Francis, Governor. Clark H Simpson, president Missouri, served on the General Board of Managers. National committee members from Missouri were:

The annual meeting was held on 4 March and the annual dinner on 19 April in commemoration of the battles of Concord and Lexington. The officers elected on 22 February were:

The National Society presented medals in recognition of service in the Spanish American War to Missouri Compatriots George P. Gross, Col. Third Missouri Infantry, and George H. Shields, 2d Lt. Infantry, U.S.A.

Delegates to the National Congress were Clark H. Simpson, Gaius Paddock and W. A. Stritnalter.

The report of Missouri to the congress said "The Missouri Society is making headway and a sincere spirit of harmony and loyalty animates the entire membership. The Kansas City Chapter vies with the parent chapter at the other end of the state in matters of growth and progress. A very enjoyable banquet is reported held on April 19 in commemoration of Concord and Lexington." The annual dues were twenty-five cents. Missouri ranked 22 in membership of 39 states with 114 members.

July 16 the Kansas City Chapter reported two deaths, Charles M. Thompson and Thomas Lewis.

On 19 October the board of managers met to accept the resignation of secretary W. Scott Hancock and appoint J. Alonzo Matthews.

The Vice President General for Missouri was the Honorable D. R. Francis. Dr. Comstock, Gen. Shields, Isaac Mason, Edwin Harrison and Melvin Stearns continued to serve on the same committees as 1901. Membership increased by 17 to 131 members. Missouri Society did not report news to the national magazine. Officers of the Missouri Society were the same as 1901 except the additions of vice presidents James E. Withrow and I. M. Mason and honorary vice presidents Samuel Treat, Gauis Paddock, Nathan Cole, T. B. Edgar and Stephen P. Twiss.

1903

The National Congress was held in New Haven, Connecticut. Clark H. Simpson of Missouri was continued on the General Board of Managers. The committee members from Missouri serving on national committees remained as stated in 1901. The only change in Missouri officers was that O. L. Teachout was elected registrar, the others remained the same as 1901. Missouri delegate to the National Congress was Ellis S. Pepper.

1904

Former Governor Francis of Missouri, mayor of St. Louis and a compatriot, was head of the Exposition organization and was successful in bringing the National Congress to St. Louis in 1904. This was the only time the congress has been held in Missouri. During the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, better known as the St. Louis Worlds Fair, the National Congress, S.A.R. was held. The membership of the Missouri Society, acting as hosts, had arranged that all sessions and social functions be held within the various buildings at the world's fairgrounds. June 15th was designated "Sons of the American Revolution Day" and the Congress was convened in Festival Hall on the grounds of the Exposition.

S.A.R. NATIONAL CONGRESS, ST. LOUIS - 1904 OPENING ADDRESS BY GENERAL GEORGE H. SHIELDS

Ladies and Gentlemen, Mr. President, and Delegates to the Fifteenth Annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution.—The very pleasant duty devolves on me as President of the Missouri Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, to welcome the National Congress of the National Society of Sons of the American Revolution to the hospitality of Missouri. I am assured that every Son of the American Revolution in this great State appreciates the honor of having within our borders the delegates from the East and the West, the North and the South, belonging to our national society; and I am no less assured of the fact that the members of the other patriotic societies here present the warmest sentiments of friendship and respect toward the distinguished delegates we have met here to honor.

We are descendants of the heroes of 1776. We are proud of our ancestry; not because the blue blood of an hereditary aristocracy whose claims rest upon birth alone flows in our veins, but because we are descended from men and women who had iron in their blood and were willing to suffer and die that liberty might have a resting place on earth. They wrote their names high on the scroll of fame in performance, not promises; in deeds, not theories; in the terrible realities of war, not the amenities of the drawing room. It is well for us to keep alive their memories till time shall end, for they founded the mightiest nation of all history. (Applause.)

We claim no monopoly of patriotism. We rejoice that at every fireside in the country beat hearts which would pulse out every drop of blood to maintain the honor and integrity of the United States; and such hearts are not confined to those who trace their lineage back to Colonial days. We are a cosmopolitan people form all parts of the earth, fused into a homogeneous American nation by the fires of liberty in our hearts. We take the best of all nations, and make them better by inspiring them with American ideas and American aspirations, and it is astonishing how quickly they become acclimated. I once asked an educated German if he used his native language in his family. He said, "I try to, but when I speak to my children in German the little rascals answer me in English." Such is the effect of the American public school system and the magic influence of the playground. The absorption of our American politics is no less rapid, and it does not take many years to make an office-holder out of an immigrant. (Laughter.)

Whatever may have been our differences in the past, we are today a unified nation; and we have seen the sons of the soldiers who wore the gray and sons of those who wore the blue rally to the defense of Old Glory, led by veterans of the Civil War who fought under Generals Ulysses S. Grant and Robert E. Lee. There was not a missing star in the emblem which they carried to victory. It represented the spirit of liberty and a government in which, as Compatriot Roosevelt says, "no citizen is so high as to be above the

law, nor so low as to be beneath its protection."

Never yet in this country has the demand for men or women to meet emergencies failed, and never will it fail so long as the spirit of self sacrifice and patriotism, which

has been shown by the American people in the past, continues to exist.

We will never forget the thousands of Irishmen and Frenchmen and men of other nations who fought with the colonists against the supremacy of England in 1776; nor the thousands of Germans and Irishmen and men of other nations who bared their breasts to the storm of 1861. Every mead of praise is due them as citizens of this great republic, and we rejoice in their patriotism; but this is no reason why the descendants of the founders of this republic, this new nation of the West, should not record with pride the fact that they are the lineal descendants of the soldiers of 1776.

During the Spanish War I read in some Eastern newspaper a screed against the socalled imperialistic tendency of the present times, and a warning against the establishment here of a constitutional monarchy. One of the tokens of the anti-republican spirit was said to be the organization of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Sons and Daughters of the Revolution, to furnish a ready-made aristocracy for the new order of things. But we can assure this perturbed soul that the descendants of the men who established a government based on the "consent of the governed," and on the cornerstones of liberty, enlightenment, and religion, will never be found attempting to undo the work of their fathers. If no "man on horseback" nor "American King" arises till he comes from the Sons of the American Revolution, the republic is safe! (Applause.)

The objects of our society are purely patriotic. The lineal descendants of a private in the Revolution and of a commanding general enter our society by the same door, and the same rules of acceptability are applied. As our name indicates, we are American

and intensely democratic.

A summary of what these patriotic societies have done is the best argument for their existence. They have rescued from oblivion the names of the "men behind the guns" of the Revolutionary War; they have marked the forgotten graves and built monuments to commemorate the bravery and self-sacrifice of those who died on the field or in prison to establish free government in this country.

They have purchased and donated to the public, or preserved under appropriate regulations, historic sites that otherwise would have been destroyed. They have floated the flag over the schoolhouses of the land and thus given an object lesson in patriotism

to the children.

They have established "Flag Day," June 14, as commemorating the day on which the Stars and Stripes were first given to the breeze by George Washington as the flag of the free.

They have caused the passage of laws in many states forbidding the use of the flag as an advertising medium, or any other manner of desecrating that emblem of the republic.

They have enouraged historic research among the children by giving of prizes and

medals for the best essays on historic and patriotic subjects.

They have cheered and gladdened the sick and wounded in our army and navy by sending hospital stores, medical attendants, and trained nurses to care for them in their affliction.

They have dug out from the dusty shelves and vaults of the nation and of the states, and set in order for preservation and reference, the military records of the officers and men who fought the war for freedom.

They have rescued from the grave of forgetfulness and written in the records of their

societies the fireside history of the Revolution.

They have broken down "the middle wall of partition between the North and the South," and taught loving hearts from both sections, through the noble deeds of their ancestors, to know that liberty and union are one and inseparable, now and forever.

And, incidentally, they have recorded for future generations the names and families

of those who established the American Republic.

Such are some of the results of these patriotic organizations. In such a brilliant aggregation of societies, comparisons would be invidious. We are proud of our own record; yet we gladly yield the palm in these good works to the Daughters of the American Revolution. American women are born queens, and deserve the respect and love of every fireside in the land which they rule so absolutely and so worthily. (Applause.)

It is peculiarly fitting that the scions of 1776 should assemble at this great Louisiana Purchase Exposition commemorative of the second greatest act in American history, next to the independence of the Colonies. When Thomas Jefferson, the most democratic of presidents, in 1803 purchased for \$15,000,000 from Napoleon, the most absolute of rulers, the Louisiana territory, he added half a continent to the United States and brought an empire under the "star spangled banner."

We are not of the original and historic thirteen, but their sons and daughters are here, and our broad prairies, high mountains, mighty rivers, and free air of nature have not dwarfed our patriotism; and this old state sent, including home guards, militia and

volunteers, nearly two hundred thousand troops to maintain the Union.

Nor are we entirely without revolutionary history, for Missouri sent sixty men in 1781 to aid in that struggle for the rights of mankind, and the Jefferson Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution has marked the place of their departure, at Main and Vine streets in this city, by a brass tablet.

We welcome you, Mr. President-General, and the officers and delegates to our National Congress, to your first convention west of the Father of the Waters. You will find the proverbial latch-string out, and we want you to enjoy your stay with us, to go home satisfied, and to tell our Eastern brothers that of the greatness of this commemorative exposition, of the resources of the heart of the nation, the half has not been told.

Our joy in meeting you can be summed up in a single sentence: as Americans we tender you, as brothers of a common country, a Western welcome! (Applause.)

GENERAL SHIELDS: I regret exceedingly to say that Governor Francis, the master mind of this great exposition, who had expected to welcome you here today, has been detained by an engagement which he cannot break. He has, however, sent to represent him the Counsel of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, the Honorable Franklin Ferris. who will say to you a few words of welcome.

Judge George Howell Shields was elected Vice-President General on 16 June 1904. Missouri delegates to the Congress were: George H. Shields, Linn Paine, Dr. C. H.

Hughes, I. Shreve Carter, Ashley Cabell and John L. RoBards.

The National Society's membership reported by the Registrar General was 11,152. Thirty-one states to include France and Hawaii. Missouri's membership was 120 with St. Louis 80 and Kansas City 40.

The Kansas City Chapter wrote a letter to the president of the Missouri Society on 4 April 1904 revealing that the chapter was in a sad state. No meetings held for three years. The letter was signed by ten members wanting a meeting and trying to revive the chapter (see Kansas City Chapter history).

1905

The Missouri Board of Managers reported by resolved at the St. Louis Congress that the board was requested to prevent, if possible, the proposed repeal of the existing U.S. law which permits the wearing of the insignia of this society and other hereditary and patriotic societies by officers of the Army and Navy. The board acted and the law remains intact. The annual banquet was held on 19 April at the Hotel Jefferson in St. Louis.

1906

The President General reported at the Boston Congress that the last Congress in

Philadelphia prepared the incorporation of this society. It was presented to the House of Representatives and passed the House and is now pending in Congress. It was approved by the Senate. At this time there are only three other national organizations charted by Congress.

1907

The Missouri dues were fifty cents. National membership now is 11,118 members. Missouri enrolled five new members but lost fifteen. Total membership is now 115. The society published an address on Revolution and Evolution delivered by Rev. Naphtali Luccock at the annual banquet on 19 April 1906. On 4 March the annual meeting was held at the Mercantile Club, St. Louis. Officers elected were: president, Ashley Cabell; secretary, Robert E. Adreon; and treasurer, I Shreve Carter.

Ashley Cabell was elected to the National Board of Trustees. The annual banquet in 1907 was celebrated on 19 April. A patriotic address was given by Rev. William C. Bitting. There were about 100 members present besides ladies and guests. The topic of

Dr. Bitting was "Fixed Truths from the First Struggle."

1908

Only fourteen state societies had more than one chapter—Missouri was one of them with a St. Louis and Kansas City Chapter. Missouri delegates to the Congress in Buffalo were Dr. Charles H. Hughes and Amedee B. Cole. Actual sons registered in Missouri, Charles McLaran and William Shackelford Stamps, both of St. Louis.

1909

Missouri delegate to the National Congress in Baltimore was Col. John L. Robards of Hannibal. Missouri added four new members for a total of 104. The Missouri officers elected on 4 March last year (1908) were the same for this year: president, Rev. S. J. Niccolls; 1st vice-president, J. E. Withrow; 2nd vice-president, I. M. Mason; 3rd vice-president, W. B. Homer; 4th vice-president, John Robards; secretary, Robert E. Adreon; treasurer, I. Shreve Carter; registrar, Linn Paine; historian, John M. Fulton; chaplain, Rev. W. W. Boyd. St. Louis Chapter had 76 members and the Kansas City Chapter had 36 members. St. Louis Chapter officers were the same as the state officers. The Kansas City Chapter officers were: president, George P. Gross; vice-president, William H. Williams; secretary, F. C. Spalding; treasurer, Wm. H. H. Tainter; historian, James M. Greenwood; and registrar, John H. Crumm.

1910

The delegates to the Congress in Toledo were Amedee B. Cole and Linn Paine. The National Registrar General reported that Missouri had only two new members. The state officers and Kansas City Chapter officers, elected in 1908 and listed above in 1909, remained the same. Minutes of the Board of Managers revealed that a letter had been received from the Secretary General requesting that all state societies nominate one or more candidate, one of which will be elected as trustee at the Toledo Congress, as provided by section 4, National Charter and article 5, section 2 of the National Constitution.

1911

Missouri Society held their annual meeting on 4 March. The only change in officers were Amedee B. Cole was elected president and Rev. S. J. Niccolls moved from president to 2nd vice-president.

1912

Missouri Board of Managers were: M. R. Moore, Edward T. Miller, W. S. Haddway, Ashley Cabell, C. W. Hughes, Cabell Gray, E. O. Stanard, T J. Barnes, Peyton H. Skipwith, Jr., S. M. Green, Addison L. Day and George B. Teasdale. The society published a pamphlet of 42 pages with the constitution and by-laws and a list of active members. Included were deceased and demitted members. Amedee B. Cole was elected Vice-President General at Boston on 21 May 1912.

1913

Officers remained same as previously listed except Edward L. Adreon elected president. The National Congress was held in Chicago.

1914-1915

Annual meetings were held in April and some changes in officers were made. This was the World War I initial years. National Society Congresses were held in Syracuse and Portland.

1916

Missouri Society met on 4 March and elected president, Robert E. Adreon; vice-presidents, E. T. Miller, J. L. Robards, C. P. Walbridge and Peyton H. Skipwith; secretary, F. G. Williamson; treasurer, I. Shreve Carter; registrar, Linn Paine; historian, Wm. H. H. Tainter; and chaplain, Rev. W. W. Boyd. A resolution was passed to have the American flag displayed in the courtroom. The Pledge of Allegiance was adopted for the S.A.R. Five district vice presidents were established by the National Society. Missouri was in the South Mississippi District.

1917

No National Society Congress held in Nashville. It was scheduled for 21 May but not enough delegates arrived. Congress was adjourned to meet at the call of the President General. The executive committee authorized a National Service Bar. S.A.R. War Council established and recommended that each state appoint a State Council of Defense and to cooperate with each other and the federal government in organizing and directing resources of men and materials. Missouri's annual meeting was held on 3 March. Compatriot S. M. Green addressed the meeting on the necessity of encouraging patriotism throughout the state, also to appoint a committee to report the plans for the distribution of prizes, for that purpose, to the Ozark Schools under the direction of the school board. The annual banquet was held on 19 April. President General Thurston addressed the society on the "History and Evolution of the U.S. Flag."

1918

Ashley Cabell and John Robards were nominated as trustees, but both declined as they had previously served. They suggested that a younger member be nominated. The question was raised for Missouri to host the National Congress in 1919. Consensus was that the members did not think that they could raise \$3,000 to support the congress. Amedee B. Cole was selected to serve on the National Archives committee.

1919


Up to this time the National S.A.R. property and records were kept at the Smithsonian that former Secretary General A. Howard Clark was associated with, but he died. NSSAR established a headquarters in the National Union Building, 918 F St. N.W.

The Congress in Detroit elected Linn Paine of St. Louis to the office of Vice-President General of the Mississippi Valley West District. This includes Missouri, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas. The national by-laws were changed to authorize a 3½ inch wide sash for Vice-President Generals.

President Williard Duncan Vandiver is credited with coining the slogan for Missouri as the "Show Me" state. Chancellor General, NSSAR, was in St. Louis 30 October to make a formal presentation to the Missouri Society of the silk banner awarded for increase in membership. President Vandiver accepted the banner on behalf of the State Society. President General Louis Annin Ames, doner and designer of the banner, was unable to attend due to a meeting of the NSSAR executive committee. The banner is in the official colors of the society with the emblem of the SAR embroidered in gold. See 1921 group photo for picture of the banner.


1920

Missouri published a yearbook and printed 200 copies. A group photo was taken on the east courthouse steps at 12:00 noon 1 Nov. 1920. Cost of the book \$3.00 each. There is a copy at the National Society Library in Louisville.

The annual congress, composed of officers and delegates of the national and state societies, is said to be one of the most imposing and distinctive bodies of men in our country. On 20th May 1919, the thirtieth annual assemblage was held at Detroit. This congress awarded to the Missouri Society a beautiful silk banner given by President General Louis Annin Ames for increase in membership. Missouri was honored further by the election of Mr. Linn Paine as Vice-President General. Mr. Paine was also reelected on 18 May 1920.

1921

Constitution Day was inaugurated by the S.A.R. in 1917. Missouri celebrated Constitution Day in all high schools of the state. The Missouri Society, SAR furnished speakers. Three public meetings were held in Columbia. Missouri Society had cooperation with the B.A.R. Association, Department of Education and other literary organizations. Missouri reported 1,144 celebrations.

Col. John H. Parker, Commandant of Jefferson Barracks, delivered the address at the annual banquet on 19 October. The Board of Managers met on 4 March. W. Scott Hancock resigned as secretary, due to health, and J. Alonzo Matthews was appointed. A sympathy card was sent to Mrs. Robert E. Adreon. Delegates to the congress in Buffalo were Col. G. K. Hunter and J. Alonzo Matthews. NSSAR endorsed House Bill 4391 for the Star Spangled Banner as the National Anthem. Missouri Society celebrated Flag Day with a program of patriotic exercises in the Jefferson Memorial Building. Compatriot Linn Paine of Missouri, chairman of the National Committee on Patriotic Education, gave a report to the Congress.

The Missouri Society Banquet was held on 19 October commemorating the 140th anniversary of the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown. President W. D. Vandiver presided, and Linn Paine, Missouri Registrar, gave a briefing on the work being done to insure accuracy in histories in textbooks of public schools.

1922

The Kansas City Chapter of the Missouri Society became inactive. Missouri delegates to the Congress in Springfield, Massachusetts, were J. Alonzo Matthews and Linn Paine. U. S. President Harding wrote P. G. McCamant in reference to the concern and interest of the effort of the S.A.R. to improve the teaching of history in schools. Missouri officers elected were:

On May 4 a get-together meeting was held in the evening at the Washington Hotel in St. Louis. Linn Paine, President of the Missouri Society, called the meeting and made the announcement of the future activities of the Society, including Flag Day Celebration and the annual banquet which is to be held on October 19 to commemorate the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown. Former President W. D. Vandiver, having recently returned from an extended trip abroad, was the principal speaker of the evening and delighted all present with narratives of his experiences in Egypt, the Holy Land, Italy and other places of equal importance. Short speeches were made by Compatriot Breckenridge Jones, Vice-President Charles W. Bates and Rev. Joseph H. Harvey, the recently elected Chaplain. A talented quartet of male singers was engaged for the evening and a program of patriotic songs was rendered. On June 14 a Flag Day celebration was held in the Jefferson Memorial Building. The program consisted of an invocation by Rev. Joseph H. Harvey; an address of welcome, delivered by Linn Paine, President of the Missouri Society; an address, "Our Flag," by Rev. Marvin T. Haw, and another, "Heroes of the Recent War," by Dr. L. H. Renfrow, Chairman of American Legion Committee on Memorial Celebrations. The officials of the local D.A.R. Chapters were invited as guests of honor. On June 17 a memorial tablet bearing the names of all St. Louis and St. Louis County men and women who died in the service of the United States during the World War was unveiled by Mayor Kiel in the City Hall rotunda. The Sons of the American Revolution, Society of Colonial Wars, Spanish War Veterans, D.A.R. Chapters, Women's Auxiliary of the American Legion and the Missouri Historical Society participated in the ceremonies. Music was furnished by the Jefferson Barracks Band. On June 25 the monument erected by members of the 12th United States Engineers to their comrades who made the supreme sacrifice on the fields of France was unveiled at the "Chain-of-Rocks." Hon, Charles M. Hay, Vice-President of the Sons of the American Revolution, delivered the dedicatory address. A ten-piece Scottish pipe band, obtained by permission of the British Embassy at Washington, D.C., and the Scottish Rite Choir participated in the ceremonies, as did many of the military and patriotic organizations of the city.

On September 17 Constitution Day was celebrated in the Fountain Park Congregational Church, Fountain and Aubert Avenues, St. Louis. This celebration was in accordance with the request of the National Society to formally celebrate the 135th Anniversary of the Adoption of the Constitution of the United States. Rev. Frank G. Beardsley, pastor, a newly elected member of the Missouri Society, delivered the principal address of the evening. His subject was "The Flag of Our Country." A beautiful silk flag, recently purchased for the Congregational Church, was dedicated during the services. A musical program consisting of patriotic songs was rendered. Reading (in unison) of The American Creed, lead by Linn Paine, President of the Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution, and the benediction by Rev. Joseph H. Harvey, Chaplain, concluded the exercises. Constitution Day was also generally observed in Missouri by exercises in schools and churches.

The annual banquet of the state organization was held in the new Hotel Chase, St. Louis, Oct. 17, 1922, celebrating the 141st anniversary of the Yorktown victory in the War for American Independence. Following an invocation by the Rev. Joseph Harris Harvey, Linn Paine, President of the Missouri organization, welcomed the assembly, reviewed the activities of the State Society, and read letters of felicitation and regret from President Warren G. Harding, who is a member of the Sons of the American Revolution, President General Washington I. L. Adams, Governor Hyde and Mayor Kiel. The principal speaker of the evening was Frederic A. Hill, chancellor of the Washington University, who delivered a very instructive address on patriotic education and highly commended the spirit of the soldiers of the World War, many of whom were present as members and guests of the Society.

Mrs. John Trigg Moss, Vice-President General of the Daughters of the American Revolution, brought the greetings of our sister society and urged that the two great organizations should continue working for the betterment and advance of America for Americans. A program of orchestral concert music was rendered under the direction of P. G. Anton and patriotic songs, arranged for the occasion, were sung by the Temple Male Quartette of St. Louis. A reception committee of fifty members was in charge of Compatriot David R. Francis, former Ambassador to Russia and President of the Missouri Historical Society. Compatriots I. Shreve Carter, J. Alonzo Matthews and

1923

Cabell Gray were in charge of arrangements and provided all present with beautifully engraved souvenir programs. The banquet was the largest and probably the most

The Missouri Society held its annual meeting at the Hotel Statler March 3, and elected the following officers: President, Linn Paine; Vice-Presidents, Charles W. Bates, Samuel McKnight Green, Charles M. Hay and J. W. Fristoe; Honorary Vice-Presidents, George M. Shields, William B. Homer, James M. Withrow, L. D. Kingsland, Harmon J. Bliss; National Trustee, George R. Merrell; Secretary, J. Alonzo Matthews; Treasurer, I. Shreve Carter; Registrar, Homer Hall; Historian and Genealogist, W. H. H. Tainter; Chaplain, Rev. Joseph Harris Harvey; Board of Managers, Ashley Cabell, Charles M. Hay, Casper S. Yost, G. S. Johns, L. D. Kingsland, E. R. Kinsey, Samuel McK. Green, C. Walter Hughes, Isaac H. Orr, Norman E. Tevis, Paul V. Bunn and Cabell Gray.

President Linn Paine addressed the Society, outlining the purposes and objects of the organization, and announced a program of activities that had been approved for the advancement of the highest ideals in American citizenship. The program includes an observance of the anniversary of the battles of Lexington and Concord on the 19th of April, a celebration on Flag Day, June 14, and the annual banquet of the Society, October 19. It was further proposed to arrange a general celebration of the 136th anniversary of the adoption of our Federal Constitution, which will occur September 17.

President Paine included in his address a tribute to the memory of Amedee B. Cole, former State President and former Vice-President General of the sons of the American Revolution, and Robert E. Adreon, who had also served our Society as State President.

The Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution, began early in a movement for general observance of the 136th anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution of the United States. Through press publicity, the advisability of meetings, celebrations, and exercises was brought to the attention of churches, schools, patriotic societies, Boards of Trade, clubs, and business organizations throughout the state.

Over three hundred letters were sent to pastors of churches, asking that the subject be included in the Sunday services of September 16. This was generally done, and many of the churches in Missouri used the "Constitution" as the theme for the entire

service.

The proclamation issued by Governor Arthur M. Hyde August 18, greatly assisted the Society in arousing interest in Missouri.

Other public officials responded promptly to the appeals for their influence.

The principal celebration, under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution, was held in the auditorium of Soldan High School in St. Louis Monday afternoon, September 17. Hon. Shepard Barclay, former Chief Justice of the Missouri Supreme Court, delivered an address on the S.A.R. theme, "Privileges Secured by, and Responsibilities Incurred under, the Constitution of the United States." Linn Paine, President of the Missouri Society, spoke on Patriotic Education. Members of the Missouri Society were seated upon the platform. Two thousand high school students sang patriotic songs, acompanied by an orchestra of the Soldan school. John Rush Powell, principal of Soldan High School, introduced the speakers and directed the ceremonies.

Arrangements having been made to further the movement by radio communication, a message on the observance of Constitution Week was broadcasted from the Post-Dispatch "K.S.D." radio station in St. Louis. The speaker was Linn Paine, President of the Missouri Society. His address was an appeal to the American people for a greater appreciation of the Constitution, and included a recital of the purposes and objects of the S.A.R. and the reading of an article that had been contributed for the occasion by

the Bar Association of St. Louis.

Many messages in response indicate that the address was heard by an audience of

many thousands, and in some far and remote parts of the United States.

Many other celebrations and publications in various parts of the state have been reported, with the assurance that Missouri is vitally interested in the necessity of protecting institutions of good government, and that our national life depends upon a fuller understanding of our charter of good government—the Constitution of the United States.

A meeting in celebration of the battles of Lexington and Concord was held at the Gatesworth Hotel in St. Louis on April 10. Dr. A. E. Bostwick, the eminent librarian of St. Louis, made the principal address and related many of the stirring events of the war for American Independence. President Linn Paine, also former President W. D. Vandiver, spoke on the activities of the Society. Hon. James M. Breckenridge was chairman of the Reception Committee, consisting of sixty members. The musical program, consisting of patriotic songs, was rendered under the direction of William M. Jenkins. The entertainment included songs by Mr. Edward I. Baker and Dr. Howard E. Shilling and recitations by George M. Ravold.

An informal patriotic and musical entertainment was given in the ballroom of the Gatesworth Hotel in St. Louis on the evening of Flag Day, June 14. Linn Paine, President of the Missouri Society, welcomed the assembly, and an address on "The Flag of our Country" was delivered by Reverend Russell Henry Stafford. Mrs. Ben F. Gray, President of the Colonial Dames in Missouri, and Mrs. S. H. Curlee, Regent of the St. Louis Chapter, D.A.R., were guests of honor and gave us a most interesting account of the progress of their respective organizations. The entertainment of the evening included solos and duets by Miss Ruth Harris and Mr. James W. Porteous.

The Society arranged for an appropriate celebration of Constitutional Day throughout the churches and schools and secured very wide press publicity. An address by radio by President Linn Paine made an appeal for greater appreciation of the Con-

stitution and included a recital of the purposes and objects of the S.A.R.

1924

The annual meeting of the Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution, was held in Hotel Statler, St. Louis, March 4th.

President Paine reported that the Society had been requested to assist in a movement to purchase and preserve the Saratoga Battle Fields as outlined by the Saratoga Battle Field Association, and also to assist in the maintenance of Sulgrave Manor, a project sponsored by the National Society of Colonial Dames of America. A committee will be appointed by the President to inform itself fully regarding the two appeals and to solicit contributions.

President Paine announced that the program of the previous year would be continued, which provides for patriotic meetings on the anniversary of the battles of Lexington and Concord, April 19th, Flag Day celebration, June 14th, a general observance of Constitution Day, September 17th, and the annual banquet of the Society to be held October 19th, the anniversary of the Yorktown victory for American Independence.

The Missouri Society annual meeting was held on 19 April with an informal smoker

at the new Fairmont Hotel in St. Louis.

President Linn Paine delivered the address of "Welcome" and outlined the ac-

tivities and the progress made by the state organization.

Rev. Ivan Lee Holt, the principal speaker of the evening, addressed the Society on "The Early Struggles for American Independence," which was most interesting, and gave an insight into much of the early history of the American Colonies. The musical program consisted of patriotic songs under the direction of Mr. J. J. Kessler, who also furnished several well-selected recitations.

Walter D. Dodd, the newly-elected treasurer, expressed his appreciation of the honor bestowed upon him and said he hoped to serve as faithfully as his predecessor, I.

Shreve Carter.

J. Alonzo Matthews, Secretary, announced the names of the delegates elected to represent the Missouri Society in the National Congress, to be held at Salt Lake City in July, and briefly outlined the necessity of securing new members to enable us to increase our representation in that congress.

A resolution of condolence on the death of I. Shreve Carter, who, for twenty-seven years as treasurer, had served so faithfully and earnestly, was read by Past-President

W. D. Vandiver.

A resolution in memory of Rev. W. W. Boyd, former Chaplain of the Society, was read by Compatriot Norman E. Tevis. These resolutions were unanimously adopted and placed in the archives of the Society.

Compatriot James M. Breckenridge, Chairman of the Reception Committee, which

consisted of fifty members, was in charge of the entertainment.

Flag Day Celebration, June 14th, was participated in by various patriotic and fraternal societies, under the auspices of the Masonic lodges of St. Louis, at the Scottish Rite Cathedral. President Linn Paine of the Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution, called the members together, who marched in a body to the speaker's platform, where seats of honor were assigned to them.

Compatriot Herbert S. Hadley, Chairman of our Committee on Patriotic Education,

was in charge of the exercises.

President Stratton D. Brooks, of the University of Missouri, was the principal speaker of the afternoon. His address on "America the Beautiful," was most enthusiastically received by an audience of several thousand people.

An interesting feature of the program was the display of the first state flag of Missouri, by Mrs. R. B. Oliver, Past State Regent of the D.A.R., who gave a descriptive

lecture of the inception and completion of the flag.

Music for the occasion was furnished by the United States Naval Reserve Band, and the Scottish Rite Choir.

The Society was represented at the Salt Lake Congress by President Linn Paine and Compatriot James M. Breckenridge, and feels highly honored in the election of the later to the office of Vice President General of the National Society for the newly designated South Mississippi District, in accordance with the amendment which was passed by the Congress, creating two new Vice Presidents General and rearranging the

respective districts of organization.

National Defense Day, September 12, 1924, was observed throughout the State of Missouri by appropriate meetings and parades in which the Sons of the American Revolution took a leading part. The Society assembled with its colors and banner on Lindell Boulevard in St. Louis and marched with thousands of patriotic citizens to Forest Park where at the foot of Art Hill a general celebration was held. Compatriot Herbert S. Hadley, chairman of the Committee on Patriotic Education, delivered the principal address of the occasion.

The annual banquet of the Missouri Society commemorating the 143rd anniversary of the Yorktown Victory for American Independence, was held in the Gatesworth Hotel, St. Louis, October 20, 1924. The principal address was made by Colonel Marvin H. Lewis, President General of the Sons of the American Revolution. Other National Officers who addressed the Society were Vice-President General George Albert Smith and Director General Chauncey P. Overfield of Salt Lake City and Vice President

General James M. Breckenridge of St. Louis.

The program included an invocation by Rev. Frank G. Beardsley, welcome by Linn Paine, President of the State Society, greetings from the Daughters of the American Revolution by Mrs. John Trigg Moss, and patriotic songs by the Mississippi Valley

Quartet.

The address of the President General on the "American Rock of Ages" was an able and comprehensive exposition of the great benefits secured by our Nation through the Constitution of the United States. The presence of the President General and other visiting officials marked an epoch in the progress of the Missouri Society.

1925

A patriotic service, commemorative of the birthday of George Washington, was held in the Fountain Park Congregational Church in St. Louis, Sunday evening, February 22. Compatriot Frank G. Beardsley delivered a sermon-lecture on "George Washington," illustrated with beautifully colored stereoptican pictures. Linn Paine, President of the state organization, spoke on "Patriotic Service."

A movement for an increase of membership in the western and central parts of the state has begun. Visits that have been made by President Paine and Vice-President General Breckenridge among the members in Kansas City have awakened a renewed interest and a desire to enlarge the Society in that city. Like efforts are to be made in other parts of Missouri that will doubtless prove successful in a state-wide revival of S.A.R. activities.

The annual banquet of the Missouri Society, celebrating the 150th anniversary of Lexington and Concord, was held in Hotel Chase, St. Louis, April 20, 1925. Dr. Henry Alfred Porter made the principal address on the "Significance of the Day." The exercises included an invocation by Rev. Frank G. Beardsley; introductory remarks by Casper S. Yost, President of the State Society; reading, "Paul Revere's Ride," by Miss Elizabeth Morse; and a reading, "Address of the Second Continental Congress," by Homer Hall. The Minute Men Quartette sang patriotic songs and led the assembly in "America The Beautiful," "Hail Columbia," "Red, White and Blue" and the "Star Spangled Banner."

In response to an appeal from President Yost, the press aided the project for a statewide observance of Patriots' Day with appropriate publicity. The anniversary was generally observed by churches and schools with programs especially arranged for the occasion.

Our Society, together with all patriotic and historical groups of St. Louis, united in a centennial celebration of the visit of General Lafayette in St. Louis, Apr. 29, 1825. The exercises continued three days, beginning with a ceremony in the hall of the Missouri Historical Society, on the afternoon of April 27, 1925. This was followed on the same evening with a dinner in Hotel Chase, attended by nearly one thousand enthusiastic citizens. Compatriot Herbert S. Hadley, chairman of our Committee on Patriotic Education, presided at the dinner. M. Emile Daeschner, Ambassador of France to the United States, was the guest of honor and made the principal address.

The anniversary of Yorktown and the visit of National Officers to St. Louis combined to make a most delightful celebration on the evening of 19 October when Missouri Society entertained visitors at a dinner at the Hotel Chase. The fall meeting of the National Executive Committee was the occasion of this visit, held in St. Louis for the first time, and the business of this meeting was conducted earlier in the day, after which the officers of the Missouri Society refreshed the visitors by a sight-seeing drive through the city. The members of the local D.A.R. were also guests at the banquet, among the speakers bringing greetings being Mrs. John Trigg Moss. Former Vice-President General Casper S. Yost, President of the Missouri Society, presided and Vice-President General James M. Breckenridge, of St. Louis, with the other visiting officers, all made brief addresses.

1926

The annual meeting of the Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution, was held at St. Louis, Missouri, March 6, 1926, Reports were read by the Secretary showing that the Society had celebrated the anniversary of the Battles of Lexington and Concord, Flag Day, and the anniversary of the Yorktown victory. The latter was made especially interesting from the fact that the Missouri Society was honored by the presence of President General Remington and his official party, who were tendered a banquet in the evening at the Chase Hotel. The report from the Treasurer showed the Society to be in a good financial condition. The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Casper S. Yost; Vice-Presidents, George R. Merrell, S. M. Green, Charles M. Hay and J. W. Fristoe; Honorary Vice-Presidents, Herbert S. Hadley, W. B. Homer,

James E. Withrow and Ashley Cabell; Secretary, Henry A. Chapin; Treasurer, Walter D. Dodd; Registrar, Homer Hall; Historian and Genealogist, W. H. H. Tainter; National Trustee, Linn Paine; Chaplain, Rev. Frank G. Beardsley; Chancellor, Charles W.

The S.A.R., in cooperation with the U.S. Army and Navy, decorated around the Statue of Liberty with flags on 14 June. A large American flag, 100 feet long by 65 feet wide, covered the entire front of the pedestal. Forty-eight flags of states marked the four corners of the statue.

1927

The annual meeting was held in the Daniel Boone Room of the Statler Hotel, St. Louis, March 4th, 1927, Pesident Casper S. Yost presiding.

The activities of the past year were confined to the celebrations of the anniversaries of the battles of Lexington and Concord and the Yorktown victory, the first with a luncheon at Hotel Jefferson and the latter with a banquet at Hotel Chase.

The banquet was well attended and addresses were made by President Yost, Rev. George R. Dodson and Past Vice-President General James M. Breckenridge. The following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, we greatly appreciate and heartily approve the remarks of the President of the Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution, condemning and characterizing as 'biographical buzzards' those authors whose recent writings discredit and dishonor the character, achievements and memory of the Father of Our Country, George Washington; Therefore be it

'Resolved, That we reaffirm our reverence for Washington's virtues and our admiration of his character and patriotism. He stands, and we believe will forever stand, as the greatest figure that ever

stood in the forefront of a nation's life.

The reports of the Secretary and Treasurer showed the Society to be in excellent condition.

All officers were re-elected.

On April 6, at a noonday luncheon meeting of the members' conference of the Chamber of Commerce, President Yost of the Missouri Society spoke in behalf of support of the Citizens' Military Training Camps, together with Major General Benjamin A. Poore, Commander of the 7th Army Area, Fort Omaha, Nebraska.

The 152nd anniversary of the Battles of Lexington and Concord was celebrated by

the Missouri Society at the Forest Park Hotel, April 19, 1927.

The Chaplain, Rev. Frank G. Beardsley, entertained with a lecture with stereopticon

illustrations on "The Spirit of the American Revolution."

Compatriot Gaius Paddock, ninety-one years old, gave reminiscences of his grandfather who was a Revolutionary soldier, after which light refreshments were served and a pleasant social hour enjoyed.

Missouri Secretary Henry Chapin attended the first meeting of state secretaries held on 17 May at the Hotel Jefferson. About twenty secretaries were in attendance.

Missouri delegates to the National Congress in Richmond, Virginia, on 18-19 May were J. Alonzo Matthews, Edward T. White, James M. Breckenridge and Henry A. Chapin.

President Casper Yost is serving his third term. He has been a long time member of

the S.A.R. and served for 26 years as editor of the editorial page of the St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

The Missouri Society voted funds to preserve the home where Daniel Boone died at

Femme Osage, Arrow Rock Tavern.

Linn Paine was elected trustee at the National Congress at Richmond, Virginia. National Committee members from Missouri included Henry A. Chapin, Advisory; James M. Breckenridge, Immigration and Naturalization; Col. G. K. Hunter, Flag; Casper Yost, Mountain School; Hon. Herbert S. Hadley, Observence of Constitution Day. President General Rogers of Connecticut stated that a payment of \$5,000 was made on a permanent headquarters building, the Norman Williams mansion, at cost of \$145,000, including furniture. Priority now is to raise \$250,000.

Article III - membership amended to include age 18 for members instead of 21. Each

state to pay Treasurer General \$1.00 per member.

Missouri delegates to Conference of State Presidents were J. Alonzo Matthews, Ed-

ward J. White, James M. Breckenridge and Henry A. Chapin.

The Missouri Society held its annual meeting in the Daniel Boone Room, Statler Hotel, St. Louis, on 4 March 1927. President Casper Yost presided and all officers were re-elected. The past year celebrations of the anniversary of the Battle of Concord and the Yorktown victory were celebrated with lunch at the Hotel Jefferson and a banquet at Hotel Chase. President Yost spoke on 6 April at a luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce in support of Citizens Military Training Center (CMTC) together with Major General Benjamin A. Poor.

The 152nd anniversary of the Battle of Lexington and Concord was celebrated at Forest Park Hotel on 19 April. Chaplain Reverend Beardsley spoke on "The Spirit of the American Revolution." Compatriot Gaius Paddock, age 91 years, gave

reminisences of his grandfather in the Revolutionary War.

1928

The Missouri Society celebrated the 150th anniversary of Saratoga on 17 October at a dinner at the Hotel Chase. Rev. William L. Sullivan, D.D., spoke on "Liberty and Nationalism." The S.A.R. Choristers male quartet sang songs of American wars.

Vice President General Samuel P. Cochran of Texas visited on 14 February and was

entertained at lunch by the Missouri officers.

The National Committee on Patriotic Education sent a letter to the school department of St. Louis advising of an award of the Society Good Citizenship Medal to be given for the best oration on the Constitution.

The Missouri Society adopted a resolution in favor of training camps for young men of the state and nation as a necessary part of the plan for national defense. There were

sixteen states listed as having no chapters-Missouri being one of them.

The National Society had a total of 188 chapters. Flag Day celebration was held on 14 June at the Tower Ballroom, Congress Hotel. President Breckenridge gave a report on the Congress.

1929

The Missouri Society's annual Yorktown Day Banquet was held at the Congress Hotel with nearly 150 in attendance with the Vice-Regent and eight past and present national and state D.A.R. officers as invited guests. President Breckenridge was toastmaster and the speaker Vice President General Cochran spoke on "The Heritage of Our Society." Col. Edmund L. Butts, Chief of Staff, 102nd Division, U.S. Army, spoke on "National Defense at Work." Elmer Wentworth, FPG-NSSAR, spoke on "Duties and Obligations."

Edward J. White, chairman of Patriot Education Committee, MOSSAR, delivered an address at the D.A.R. dedication of the statue of the Pioneer Mother (Madonna of the Trail) in Lexington, MO, on 17 September. Preliminary to the address, Compatriot White had the 2-3 thousand persons present raise their hands as a pledge.

The Rev. Frank G. Beardsley was elected president.

1930

The Missouri annual meeting was held on 4 March. Dr. George C. Trawick was elected president. Missouri delegates to the National Congress at Asbury Park, New Jersey, were Rev. Frank G. Beardsley, James M. Breckenridge, Gauis Paddock and W. W. Willeford. New members elected to the Missouri Board of Management were Samuel M. Green, C. Walter Hughes, Edward J. White and Frank G. Beardsley. The new President Trawick was named State Director of the Commissioner of Correspondence and Safety. Membership as of 31 March 1929 was 193 members. Missouri Board of Managers for three years elected were: J. Alonzo Matthews, Linn Paine, Henry A. Chapin and Casper S. Yost.

1931

A Flag Day celebration was celebrated by a gathering at St. John's Methodist Church, Kingshighway and Westminister, to hear Rev. Dr. Ivan Lee Holt. A custom of the past two years to present Good Citizenship medals at the closing exercises of C.M.T.C. at Jefferson Barracks, MO, was accomplished again this year by Missouri Trustee Breckenridge. A dress parade and review were conducted and Brig. General Frank Parker held an inspection. Casper Yost was elected VPG South Mississippi District for 1930 and 1931.

The Board of Governors decided in September to dispense with the annual banquet which was to be held 19 October. The cost of the banquet, estimated at \$300, was to be donated to assist the unemployment situation in St. Louis.

1932

Samuel McKnight Green, Jr., was elected as President. Missouri Society's annual meeting was a banquet held at the St. Louis Women's Club on 20 February to inaugurate a series of affairs to be held in 1932. There were 200 plus and many patriotic societies were represented: Regents of five D.A.R. chapters, presiding officer of Colonial Daughters of 17th Century, Daughters of American Colonists, National Society World War Registrars, United Daughters of the Confederacy, the National Society of Women Descendants of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company and the Society of Mayflower Descendants and other groups. The speakers were Mrs. John Trigg, National Vice Chairman Western Division of the National Defense Committee, D.A.R., and the Honorable Jacob Mark Lashly. The minuet was danced by couples in colonial costume, a soprano soloist sang and a splendid reading was given. A colonial atmosphere prevailed and many ladies were in costume.

1933

The Missouri Society recently inaugurated a bulletin to its members. The latest issue of October 20 reviews the activities of the spring and summer starting with the Lexington Day Program on 19 April. On 6 August the Society made its third annual presentation of Good Citizenship Medals to students at the C.M.T.C. Jefferson Barracks. The new S.A.R. Medals for R.O.T.C. were established this year.

On Constitution Day on 17th September, feature programs were presented in five large high schools and five teachers colleges in St. Louis. The anniversary of Yorktown

celebration was supper at the Kingsway Hotel. Dr. Arnold spoke on the "Shadow of Washington" and then colonial ballads were sung. The annual meeting on 4 March reelected President Greene. Compatriot Greene was a noted pioneer in the education of the blind and served as superintendent of the Missouri School for the Blind for 41 years.

1934

The society celebrated George Washington's birthday on 22 February at a luncheon and smoker at the Daniel Boone Room, Hotel Statler. The speaker, Mr. James S. McCellan, spoke on "Another Valley Forge." The Honorable Ashley Cabell was present and spoke briefly (he was the original incorporator of the Missouri Society when the charter was granted to the National Society in 1906). The annual meeting was held on 5 March. Frederick G. Williamson was elected State President.

A luncheon was held on 21 April at the Park Plaza Hotel in commemoration of the Battle of Lexington and Concord. Mr. Gauis Paddock, a 98 year Compatriot, favored the assembly with reminisences. The main speaker was Mr. John L. Bracken, superintendent of schools of Clayton.

The surrender of Yorktown was celebrated with a dinner on 19 October at the Gatesworth Hotel. The address was delivered by the Honorable Lee Meriwether of St. Louis.

1935

The annual meeting was held in the Colonial Room, Forest Park Hotel, on 4 March. The honored guest and speaker was Judge William H. Arnold, Vice President General of the South Mississippi District, who made the trip from Texarkana, Arkansas. Incumbent President Williamson was re-elected.

Missouri awarded a total of twelve Good Citizenship Medals to C.M.T.C. at Jefferson Barracks by the Honorable Charles W. Rutledge, Vice-President, who spoke briefly.

The 46th National Congress held in Louisville, Kentucky, was attended by Missouri delegates Trawick, Judge Rutledge, Frampton, Matthews and Lionberger.

AN HONORED COMPATRIOT

An honored Compatriot, Gaius Paddock of the Missouri Society will attain to the advanced age of 100 years next May 14th, 1936, and our Society in Missouri proposes to do him special honor on this occasion. Many of our compatriots will recall that Mr. Paddock was a guest at the Congress of the National Society when it met in Springfield, Illinois, in 1929. He was the first Treasurer of the National Society, and was in attendance at the early meetings at which the National Society S.A.R. was organized, as a delegate from the Missouri Society. The organization meeting was held at Fraunces Tavern in May 1889, at which time Mr. Paddock was elected to the office of Treasurer.

We are pleased to publish the following sketch of Mr. Paddock's life, together with his photograph, furnished by our Missouri Society, and there may be added to the former the fact that he was for many years a Mason, and a devoted member of Christ Church Cathedral in St. Louis for half a century. He is also an active member of the Madison County, Illinois, Historical Society, and has written many historical articles for this Society and the Illinois State Historical Society. He has composed several beautiful poems which have appeared in print on various occasions.—F.B.S.

BIOGRAPHY OF HON. GAIUS PADDOCK, MEMBER OF THE MISSOURI SOCIETY, S.A.R.

Hon. Gaius Paddock was born May 14th, 1836, at 6th and Market Streets, in St. Louis, Mo. His parents were Orville Bailey and Mary Elizabeth (Bailey) Paddock, who in 1840 moved to Springfield, Illinois, where they continued to reside until the fall of 1852, when they removed to Alton, Ill. While residing in Springfield, Mr. Paddock when a small boy became a personal frienc of Abraham Lincoln, having attended the wedding of the Emancipator, then a struggling young lawyer, to Miss Mary Todd, at Springfield in 1842. Mr. Paddock remembers many interesting experiences as he recalls the many visits to the home and office of Mr. Lincoln, when only a mere lad, and it is the delight of all present to hear Mr. Paddock recall them.

Mr Paddock was 16 when the family moved to Alton, where he grew to manhood and embarked in the hardware business, until 1872, when he

came to St. Louis and formed a partnership with Boyd Lathey which lasted only two years, when with Captain George Hawley they formed the Paddock-Hawley Iron Company, which was to continue in business until 1905 when Mr. Paddock retired from business activities, taking up his residence soon afterward at Moro, Ill. Mr. Paddock was united in marriage to Miss Sarah Josepha Foster, a daughter of Joseph Foster; by this union there were born eight children: Evelyn married Gen. Kerr, of Kentucky; Gaius F., Alice, Mary, Sarah, Mrs. Swift, Allen and Orville. The old Paddock homestead near Moro has been a show-place for many years, where the family has continued to reside, until ten years ago when they decided to spend the winters in the city, going back to their country residence May 1st of each year only to remain until the cold and chilly November weather again appears.

Mr Paddock is a descendant of Robert Paddock, who came from England in 1634, one of the pilgrim ancestors who settled in Plymouth, Mass., in early colonial times. Many of the relics, coins, etc., that existed in the time of the Pilgrim Fathers, are in the possession of the Paddock family, having been passed down from generation to generation as heirlooms of the family.

Gaius Paddock, the Revolutionary ancestor, was a native of Massachusetts, born in 1758; when 17 years of age he enlisted in the Colonial Army at the commencement of the Revolution and served until its close. He was in Washington's command at the time he crossed the Delaware and captured the British forces at Trenton. He served honorably at the Battle of Bunker Hill, and was present when Lord Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown.

In 1786 he was married to Mary Wood, and in the following year moved to Vermont,

where he remained until the fall of 1815. The Western fever then took possession of many of the people of the New England States, and he, among others said "Westward Ho." Cincinnati was the objective point where he arrived late in the year. Subsequently moved to St. Charles, MO, thence to St. Louis, in the spring of 1817. The next year he crossed the Mississippi River to settle in Madison County. Here he resided until his death in the summer of 1831. Mrs. Paddock died July 15, 1850. They had ten children, Orville, the father of our subject, being the youngest of the family.

1936

President General Baker announced the organization of a committee to direct the celebration of the Sesquicentennial of the Constitution on 17 September 1937. Missouri members of the committee were Compatriots James M. Breckenridge, Honorable Harry Hawes and Casper Yost.

The Missouri meeting of the Board of Managers on 28 January reaffirmed the Society's position of support of the U.S. Constitution. In response to a letter from the military officers of Kemper and St. Joseph the Society will present four SAR-ROTC Medals to each separate unit of ROTC of high school at St. Joseph and one to Kemper. In addition the regular C.M.T.C. awards will be made for a total of sixteen.

At the annual meeting on 4 March it was voted to hold the annual banquet (usually in October) on 17 September, Constitution Day; also to request the boards of education in St. Louis and St. Louis County to give special attention to this anniversary.

The 100th birthday of Gaius Paddock, honored member of the Missouri Society and the first Treasurer General of the National Society, S.A.R., will be on the 14th of May and it was resolved to celebrate it. He was a personal friend of Abraham Lincoln.

James Alonzo Matthews was elected State President. President Matthews stressed the observance of June 14 as Flag Day. He asked all citizens to honor Flag Day by displaying the Stars and Stripes on their homes and places of business, on public buildings, streetcars, busses and automobiles. President Matthews also stated that this will be the 46th annual celebration of Flag Day under the auspices of the National Society, S.A.R. which instituted the observance in 1890. Former President General Arthur M. McCrillis of Rhode Island was the guest of honor and speaker at the luncheon on 20 April.

President General Messmore Kendall attended the Missouri Society reception and banquet on 23 October at the Hotel Chase. On 27 December members gathered at the apartment of Compatriot Ashley Cabell to honor him on his 85th birthday. He served as MOSSAR President 1905-06-07 and was the first National Trustee from Missouri, elected at the Toledo Congress in 1910.

1937

The annual banquet was held in the Crystal Room, Coronado Hotel, in commemoration of the Sesquicentennial of the Constitution and the observance of Yorktown. There was a large attendance of ladies and gentlemen. President Matthews presided and in the background was a new Missouri flag to be presented to NSSAR at the Texas Congress next spring. The guest speaker was the Honorable Guy A. Thompson, former president of the American Bar Association.

On August 3rd, the annual Good Citizenship Medal awards sponsored by the Missouri Society to boys of the C.M.T.C. at Jefferson Barracks, were presented by President J. Alonzo Matthews to ten fine young men whose records obtained for them these awards. The names of the winners for this year are as follows:

Frederck H. Eichkoff, Claude Hutchins, William O. Flanders, Mark A. Smith, John

R. Barney, Merritt D. Elliott, France E. Vancil, Jack W. Neal, Clifford M. Hatheway, Jr., Donale E. McMurtrie.

President Matthews spent an enjoyable day in inspecting the entire army post and receiving at the hands of Colonel Atkins, commanding, and his aide, detailed descriptions of the entire organization and how each separate unit functions.

Much was said of the appreciation with which our Good Citizenship Medal awards are received by both officers and students, and the place of the Sons of the American Revolution on the program was given gratifying prominence.

The Society's plans for Constitution Day included a church service under its auspices on September 19th at the Municipal Theater in Forest Park, to which other patriotic societies were invited. A fifteen minutes' radio time on September 17th was also secured.

As a special feature of the observance, the Society also presented a U.S. Flag to Southwest High School, St. Louis, at assembly on the morning of September 17th, President J. Alonzo Matthews making the presentation. Hon. Francis C. Sullivan, President of the Board of Education, accepted the gift and a fine program of music and an address, "Our Constitution," by Hon. Walter C. Ploeser completed the program. On the same morning, the Society was represented at the exercises of the Roosevelt High School, by Hon. Marvin E. Boisseau, Historian of the Missouri Society, who addressed the assembly.

In the afternoon of Constitution Day, the Society participated in the dedication exer-

cises of the Replica Shrine for which there was an impressive program under the auspices of the St. Louis Celebration Committee.

On October 16th the Society will hold its annual Yorktown Day celebration. This will be a Past Presidents' night and promises to be a gala occasion.

1938

The annual meeting was held on 4 March at the Forest Park Hotel. John Rush Powell was elected President. He was a prominent educator who served the St. Louis Public School System for 31 years as teacher, principal and assistant superintendent. He continued strong programs for the observance of Constitution and Flag Days in the public high schools. The National Society, S.A.R. magazine printed the following on the death of Compatriot Ashley Cabell:

It is with deep regret that we record the passing of three beloved and prominent past officers of our National Society whose services entitle them to special notice.

Mr. Ashley Cabell, of the Missouri Society, and the last but one surviving Charter Member of the National Society, was called in early January. His membership in the Missouri Society antedated the formation of the National Society, as he became a member in Missouri in 1894, before the incorporation of the National Society in 1906. He was President of the State Society from 1905 through 1907.

He was a valued member of the Society until his death which occurred on January 3, 1938, at the age of 81 years. The National Society was represented at his funeral by a floral wreath and by our National Trustee and Executive Committee member, Mr. James M. Breckenridge.

The Missouri Society entertained a party of delegates and guests arriving in St. Louis on the "President General's Special" train enroute to the Congress in Dallas. The train arrived at noon on 14 May and was met by a large delegation of Missouri members. The train party was taken for a sightseeing tour of St. Louis. The wives were invited to a luncheon at the St. Louis Women's Club. The party then entrained in the p.m. for Dallas.

The Society presented ten Good Citizenship Medals and two ROTC Medals.

The Society held programs on the evening of 17 September at the Beaumont High School and also gave a program at the Rotary Club in the Hotel DuPont where the Deputy Attorney General of Missouri, Edward Duffey, spoke. On March 31 Missouri had 126 members. The December banquet was addressed by former President Breckenridge on "American Revolution." The program included fine music and entertainment and short talks by former State Presidents Linn Paine, Casper Yost, Samuel Green and Alonzo Matthews.

1939

The Board of Managers met on 20 January and adopted a forceful resolution to be sent to the U.S. Congress and President advocating an extension of the Dies Committee investigating un-American activities. On 4 March the annual meeting of officers reelected President Powell.

Missouri presented 11 Good Citizenship Medals to C.M.T.C., Jefferson Barracks, 3 other Good Citizenship and 14 ROTC Medals.

An appeal was sent to all patriotic organizations requesting observance of Flag Day.

Plans were made to consider celebration of Constitution Day with an appropriate program in the schools with noted speakers. A resolution of protest was adopted by the Board of Managers that registered its disapproval of the proposed change, by President Roosevelt, to designate the third Thursday as Thanksgiving instead of the last Thursday in November. Vice-President General Pinkerton of the South Mississippi District was the guest speaker at the annual Yorktown dinner held at the Park Plaza Hotel in October. The Honorable J. LeRoy Adair, Judge of the U.S. Court for the Southern District of Illinois, gave an inspiring address.

1940

The Society met on 26 February and hosted a luncheon in honor of Compatriot Loren E. Souers of Ohio, former Chancellor General NSSAR. The annual election of officers was held electing Marvin E. Boisseau as President; Vice-Presidents elected were Alonzo Matthews, Homer Hall, Dr. John R. Lionberger and Woodward Brown; Secretary, Theodore S. Beardsley; Treasurer, Reid A. Burtnett; Registrar, Paul F. Stoneman; Historian/Genealogist, Mark C. Lewis; Chaplain, Rev. Harold E. Camp; and Trustee, Allen L. Oliver.

A luncheon and smoker were held on 19 April at the Missouri Athletic Club.

President General Loren E. Souers was the principal speaker at a dinner tendered to him by the Missouri Society at the Park Plaza Hotel, at its annual Yorktown dinner. The meeting was held this year on October 18th in order that President Souers might also attend a meeting of the Kentucky Society the following evening.

The Presidents of two other Societies in the Southern Mississippi District attended. Horace Eller, President of the Texas State Society, traveled some seven hundred miles, and Francis Vinsonhaler, President of the Arkansas State Society, also came several

hundred miles to be present.

State President Marvin E. Boisseau presided as Toastmaster and asked Allen L. Oliver, Vice-President General of the Southern Mississippi District, to introduce the State Presidents.

Mr. Eller invited all present to attend a meeting of the Texas State Society at Dallas next February 22nd, reminding us that Texas would celebrate her Centennial next year.

Dr. Vinsonhaler made a brief but delightfully interesting talk, after which President Boisseau introduced Mr. Oliver who talked briefly upon the subject of "The Present Need."

The address of the evening was delivered by President General Souers. His talk was productive of thought, was well arranged and delivered in a forceful manner. He was critical of the attitude of indifference and lack of understanding on the part of many American youths toward world problems. They were ineffective youth and would become ineffective men because of the lack of acceptance of responsibility.

"Our forefathers thought enough of liberty to fight and die for its possession, yet today we have young men like, for example, the New Orleans youth quoted in press dispatches, who when asked why he had failed to register for the draft, replied, 'there is

nothing in the United States worth fighting for.'

"I know that the great majority of young Americans do not feel this way, but there are enough of this type in America to present a problem that must be solved," Mr. Souers said.

"We are reaping a whirlwind grown of winds of sophistication, discontentment, selfishness and materialism sown in recent years by many leftist politicians and educators. It is the duty of patriotic organizations to eradicate the un-American philosophies that have diseased the minds of some of our youth and even a few of our

older men, and rekindle in their hearts the spirit of our fore-fathers."

Preceding President General Souers' address President Boisseau introduced several distinguished guests who honored the President General and the Missouri Society with their presence. Outstanding among them were Past President Millspaugh of Nashville, Tennessee, who, in a few well-chosen words, greeted those present. Several State and National officers of patriotic societies were introduced by President Boisseau. Hon. James M. Breckenridge, of the National Executive Committee, was among the honor guests.

The evening banquet was preceded by a luncheon Round Table, at which the same guests were present and opportunity for discussion of special local problems was given. President Eller of Texas spoke especially of his activities relative to the organization of

College Chapters in his state.

The Missouri Society did not overlook an appropriate observance of Constitution Day, and held special exercises at the Roosevelt High School, St. Louis, with music furnished by the school musical organizations. Exercises in other schools were also sponsored by the Missouri Society.

Fred W. Stockham of American Legion Post 245 was guest speaker at the Flag Day

luncheon.

On 12 November the Missouri Society announced that it would present the name of Compatriot James Malcolm Breckenridge as a candidate for the office of President General, NSSAR, at the next annual Congress in Columbus, Ohio, on 17 May 1941. The Missouri Society was deeply gratified by the reception accorded the announce-

ment and the offers of support.

Compatriot Breckenridge was confined to his home with the flu. The doctor looked for a complete recovery in due time—but he is not to take any new responsibilities in the near future and advised against his acceptance of the office of President General, NSSAR. Compatriot Breckenridge felt that it was his duty to act on the doctor's advice and requested that his name be withdrawn as a candidate. The Missouri Society regretfully consented and a notice of withdrawal was given.

1941

Compatriot Allen L. Oliver was elected as trustee for Missouri at the 52nd Congress at Columbus, Ohio. Also, he was selected to serve on the National Executive Committee. At the Congress former President General Harvey F. Remington took the floor and said:

Mr. President General, the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee last night voted to send the Honorable James M. Breckenridge, of St. Louis, its regrets for his absence from this Congress and they requested that this communication to him be approved by this body. I will read the communication:

The Honorable James M. Breckenridge, Wainwright Building, St. Louis, Mo.

Beloved Friend and Compatriot:

The officers of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, including Past Presidents General, Executive Committee and Trustees, in attendance at the Fifty-second Annual Congress, your personal friends, have learned with deep regret that you have been detained, through temporary indisposition, from attendance with us.

We had hoped that at this session of the Congress, we could have honored you as well as the Society by electing you the post of President General, a position which your long service as a working member, your culture, your ability and your engaging personality fully justified.

We desire to express to you our high regard for those qualities of mind and heart which have drawn to you a large circle of loyal

friends.

We pray for a speedy restoration to good health and that we may welcome you at our future gatherings.

The letter is being signed by the Officers, Past Presidents General and Trustees and we will be very glad to have other representatives sign it. Mr. President General, I ask unanimous consent for the adop-

tion of this letter to Mr. Breckenridge.

President General Souers: All of us who know the facts are very much grieved at the serious illness of Compatriot James Breckenridge who many of us have known a long time, and we know that the very grave illness which befell him several months ago has made it impossible for him to do that which had been his greatest ambition and hope. Past President General Remington has asked unanimous consent that this message be sent not only on behalf of the Past Presidents General, Executive Committee and Trustees, who met last night, but on behalf of the Congress. Is there objection to the consent? None is heard and the consent is granted.

Following certain announcements on behalf of the Committee on Arrangements, the Congress now recessed until 2 P. M.

The Missouri Society annual meeting on 5 March re-elected Marvin E. Boisseau as President. Compatriot Boisseau was a prominent St. Louis lawyer. On 18 October the Yorktown Anniversary was celebrated with a banquet at the Park Plaza Hotel. President General Sappington of Baltimore was the honored guest. Also in attendance was Vice-President General, South Mississippi District, Benjamin Powell from Texas. Registear statistics indicated Missouri had 114 members. Missouri Society awarded fourteen Good Citizenship Medals during the year.

1942

Missouri Society officers elected at the annual meeting on 4 March were: President, Allen L. Oliver; Executive Vice-President, Reid A. Burtnett; Vice-Presidents, Homer Hall, Dr. Lionberger and Henry F. Chadeayne; Honorary Vice-Presidents, Alonzo Matthews, Linn Paine, John R. Powell and Creighton B. Calfee; Secretary, William Pagenstecher; Treasurer, Paul F. Stoneman; Registrar, John H. Dunn; Historian/Registrar, Theodore S. Beardsley; Chancellor, Guy M. Wood; Chaplain, Rev. Harold. E. Camp; Trustee nominated, Allen L. Oliver. The Society presented twelve Good Citizenship Medals and sixteen ROTC Medals during the year.

President Oliver represented Missouri at the 53rd Congress at Williamsburg, Virginia, Missouri membership at this time was 109 members. At the Williamsburg Congress compatriots were asking "What can we do to aid in the defense of our country?" President General Sterling F. Mutz arranged a conference with the F.B.I. and

tendered the assistance of the S.A.R. in combating the influence of subversive elements. The result of the conference resulted in a plan, approved by the F.B.I., that the S.A.R. appoint a corps of "Minute Men" whose loyalty was above question—the President and Secretary of each state society and a select corps of the most loyal and trusted men in each chapter of our society. Their names were certified to the F.B.I. as persons who could be called upon to supply information from the immediate community as to the loyalty of those being considered for important and sensitive positions in government. At the end of thirty days a "Corps of Minute Men" from chapters in thirty-three states had appointed 1100 S.A.R. members.

1943

The annual meeting on 4 March at Forest Park elected Guy M. Wood as State President. The Society voted to omit the usual Yorktown celebration banquet and also Washington's Birthday celebration in conformity with wartime practice. The Society did observe Constitution Day and the Battle of Lexington anniversary with a luncheon on 19 April. Retiring President Oliver gave his final report. The Missouri Society reported that it had excellent representation of its members serving in the armed forces. The National Congress in New York was "streamlined" to one day because of wartime conditions. Thirty states only were represented with 265 in attendance. The Society presented forty Good Citizenship Medals and ten ROTC Medals during the year.

1944

State President Guy M. Wood was re-elected at the annual officers meeting and all incumbent officers were re-elected. The Board of Managers met at Forest Park on 4 February. A discussion was held on the Good Citizenship Awards and Certificates now being presented in lieu of medals formerly given and the increase in the number of awards. A special committee was appointed to select an outstanding citizen to receive an award in addition to pupils in high school and prep school. A discussion was held in reference to the project of the Society issuing a bulletin to all members. Members attended an S.A.R. patriotic service at the Christ Church on 20 February and a special program at the Jefferson Memorial Auditorium observing Washington's Birthday. The Historical Society showed films of the U.S. military invasions and battle front scenes were shown. Compatriot Colonel Henry Lee Kennison (MO #597) was reported as killed in action in Burma on 3 June 1944, who was on the staff of General Joseph Stillwell and with General Merrill.

The officers were elected at the Society's annual meeting, held March 6th: President, Guy M. Wood; Vice Presidents, Homer Hall, Reid A. Burtnett, Theodore S. Beardsley, John H. Dunn; Secretary, Henry F. Chadeayne; Treasurer, John W. Giesecke; Registrar, Elbe L. Doland; Historian and Genealogist, Paul F. Stoneman; Chancellor, Marvin E. Boisseau; Chaplain, Rev. Harold E. Camp. Honorary Vice Presidents include Past Presidents J. Alonzo Matthews, John Rush Powell, James M. Breckenridge and Linn Paine. Allen L. Oliver was nominated for National Trustee and elected at the Congress of the National Society at Harrisburg, May 18th.

At a later meeting of the Board of Managers, Dr. John Rush Powell was appointed by President Wood as Chairman of a Committee on Post War Planning. The committee will welcome comunications from similar committees of other societies with a view to an exchange of ideas.

The Society will continue its authorized Awards for Outstanding Good Citizenship and Achievement and for Publications.

On April 21st the annual luncheon of the Missouri Society commemorated the Battle

of Lexington and Concord and presented as speaker Lieut. Colonel Frank A. Geldhard of the Air Forces, now stationed at Fort Worth, Texas. Colonel Geldhard spoke of the development of psychological aptitude tests for pilots, navigators and bombardiers. He stated that only 3500 pilots were trained by the Army from 1923 to 1939, but more than 100,000 have been trained between 1940 and late 1943.

Sergeant Bruce L. McHaffey of Valdosta, Georgia, veteran of fifty combat missions in the European and African theaters and recipient of the Air Medal with Oak Leaf Clusters, also described some of his experiences including the raid on Rome in July,

1943.

Present were Lieut. (j.g.) Eunice Bernet, Wave; Lieutenant Eugeniamae Collins, Wac; Ensign Lillian Helland, spar; and Lieutenant Laura E. Myer, Marine, represent-

ing the women serving in the Armed Forces.

The Board of Managers met on July 13th at the Forest Park Hotel in St. Louis, the meeting being well attended, and we were particularly happy to have with us Allen L. Oliver, past President of the Missouri Society, and our National Trustee. President Guy M. Wood read to the meeting a letter received from Compatriot Lt. T. F. Beardsley, former secretary, now in foreign service. The letter was written July 4, 1944, and is of such interest that it is quoted herewith:

"This seems to me to be as good a time as any to let you know my whereabouts and to write you for the first time since I left home. It is an auspicious occasion which we used to celebrate but far different this year. Let us hope that it will serve as the final note to give Independence to all the world and may that day be not far distant."

An interesting report was made by Compatriot R. A. Burtnett upon the distribution of medals and certificates for good citizenship. This work was commenced by this society in 1939, in which year five schools asked that such awards be made to their students and that year five medals were given. The work of the Committee on Patriotic Education, of which Compatriot Burtnett is Chairman, has been so outstandingly effective that last year the Society awarded sixty-four medals and certificates to students at fifty-eight separate schools. It is expected that the number awarded this year will substantially exceed those awarded last. The Society was pleased that in June of this year President Wood's son was awarded the Certificate of Good Citizenship at the University City High School in St. Louis County. President Wood also had the personal satisfaction of making the presentation of a Good Citizenship Medal in the high school at Bowling Green, which is erected upon the same ground as the school which he attended as a boy.

Appropriate arrangments were made to commemorate Constitution Day, and to call the attention of the entire state to this anniversary of one of the most important dates in the history of our country. The response to the appeal was most gratifying.


The Missouri Society voted early in the war period to abandon its banquet meetings for the duration and devote a large part of its funds to patriotic education. Twenty-five percent of Missouri membership is enrolled in the Armed Services.

1945

The Missouri Society has communicated with all of the school principals of St. Louis, in cooperation with the Treasury Department, to further interest with the Missouri "Schools at War" program. Under this program any Missouri school with ninety percent of students purchasing Victory War Stamps, is entitled to fly the Minuteman Flag.

The Missouri Society requested the governor to issue a proclamation urging observance of December 15 as the date of ratification of the Bill of Rights. Officers elected at the annual meeting included: President, Henry F. Chadeayne, Secretary, Reid A. Burtnett; Treasurer, John W. Giesecke; Registrar, Lucian Erskine; Historian, Paul F.

Stoneman; Genealogist, Henry S. Miller; Chancellor, Mervin E. Boisseau; Chaplain, Harold E. Camp; and Trustee, Allen L. Oliver. Sympathy was extend to former President Oliver whose mother died in October.

The Supreme Court of Missouri recently held interesting dedication ceremonies of the United States and the Missouri State Flags, in the presence of Chief Justice Douglas and Justices Clark, Tipton Leedy Ellison, Gartt and Hyde of the Supreme Court of Missouri, and at which appropriate and inspiring addresses were made by the Hon. Dan M. Nee U. S. Collector of Internal Revenue, dedicating the United States Flag, responded to by Hon. James M. Douglas, Chief Justice; and by the Hon. Forrest C. Donnell, Governor of Missouri in dedicating the Missouri Flag, which was responded to by Justice Albert M. Clark.

The special interest to the members of the National Society S.A.R. in this event, is because of the fact that the official Missouri State Flag was designed and its making was supervised by the mother of Compatriot Allen L. Oliver, Past President of the Missouri S.A.R., past Vice President General and currently a member of the National Executive Committee. Mrs. Marie W. Oliver was the first to suggest an official flag for Missouri, and was thereafter appointed chairman of a committee of the D.A.R to investigate the matter, design and sponsor the adoption of such a flag. The Missouri General Assembly, after some delays, finally provided for its adopting in 1913. This first flag was burned in the fire which destroyed the Capitol in 1911, whereupon, Mrs. Oliver caused a second flag to be made, identical with the first. This Flag was the one dedicated at the above ceremonies. Mrs. Oliver, now in her early nineties, still survives at her home in Cape Girardeau.

Missouri Society officers elected were President, Homer Hall; Secretary, John R. Frost; Treasurer, John W. Giesecke; Registrar, Lucian Erskine; and Trustee, Guy M. Wood. The 56th Congress was held in Trenton, New Jersey, at the Stacy-Trent Hotel. Missouri Compatriot James M. Breckenridge nominated Missouri Compatriot Allen L. Oliver for President General. The Pennsylvania Society nominated Judge Bonniwell from Philadelphia, Compatriot Oliver won the election for President General. When the results were announced two large state delegations instantly left the Congress enmasse before the brief acceptance address and the closing ceremonies. However their anger was short-lived. Allen Laws Oliver became the first President General from the Missouri Society, Members from Missouri serving on National Committees in 1946 were: Advisory, James M. Breckenridge; Audit, John W. Giesecke; Ceremonies, J. Alonzo Matthews; Constitution Day Observance, Guy M. Wood; Flag Day Observance, Marvin E. Boisseau; Genealogy, James M. Breckenridge. Good Citizenship and ROTC Medals, Reid A. Burtnett; Immigration, Henry F. Chadeayne; Memorials, James M. Breckenridge; Organization, Homer Hall; Patriotic Education and Constructive Citizenship, Reid A. Burtnett; Post War Planning, Henry F. Chadeavne.

The Missouri Society honored its Compatriot President General Oliver and commemorated the anniversary of Yorktown with a dinner meeting on the evening of 19 October at the Park Plaza Hotel. State President Homer Hall presided. The invocation was given by Rev. Garland E. Tuckmeyer, Missouri Chaplain. Vocal solos by Miss Anne Gilmore were featured. President General Oliver's address was on "Our Society" and he presented many details of its work and progress and the growth in membership. A

beautiful souvenier program of the occasion marked each cover.

1947

The annual meeting was held on 4 March. President General Oliver attended and presented an outline on the National Society's continuing fight on accuracy and a fair approach in textbooks dealing with American history and government. Officers elected for the Missouri Society included: President, John W. Giesecke; Honorary President, Allen Oliver; Vice Presidents, Col. John B. Barnes, Reid A. Burtnett, Smith A. Martin, George Pohlman; Secretary, William Pagenstecher; Treasurer, William M. Sherrill; Registrar, Lucian Erskine; Historian, J. Alonzo Matthews; Genealogist, Henry S. Miller; Chancellor, Homer Hall; Chaplain, Rev. A. E. Woodward; National Trustee, Guy M. Wood.

The Society is concentrating its efforts this year on attaining a substantial increase in membership. The Recruiting Committee is enlisting the aid of all members. The membership has responded generously to an appeal for funds to be contributed to the NSSAR Debt Liquidation Fund. With a membership of 126 the Society's total contribution was \$325, or approximately eight times our per capita share of NSSAR debt. At the 57th Congress in Huntington, West Virginia, it was announced that the debt on the Headquarters Building in Washington will be paid in full as of 1 July.

At the Lexington Day luncheon the State President presented S.A.R. World War II Medals to eligible S.A.R. members. To date records reflect that better than one of every four members served in the Armed Forces in World War II. Compatriot Fred Williamson, Chairman of Patriotic Education Committee, carried out an active program, during the school year, by presenting 12 ROTC Medals and 65 Good Citizenship Certificates to Missouri high school students. The medals and certificates have been welcomed by the authorities of participating schools. The committee has received many letters of thanks.

The Membership Recruiting Campaign is progressing satisfactorily, and, as of mid-

November 1947 the Missouri Society had already attained its quota for the year ending March 31, 1948.

At the request of our State President, the Governor of Missouri and the Mayor of St. Louis issued Proclamations on the observance of Constitution Day, 1947. The Society conducted ceremonies at the Beaumont and Southwest High Schools, St. Louis, Compatriots John Rush Powell and Guy M. Wood being the speakers. On their own initiative, other high schools throughout the state held obervances of Constitution Day, evidence that our educational program is beginning to be effective.

The Board of Managers has created a special committee to make appropriate arrangements for participation by this Society in the Freedom Train's visit to the State of

Missouri next spring.

The Missouri Society appreciates a very complimentary article appearing in the September 1947 issue of the American Bar Association Journal, regarding Past President General Allen L. Oliver, who received the Association's Award of Merit in 1944 when he was President of the Missouri Bar Association. Briefly biographical, the article refers to Mr. Oliver's term as President General of the National Society S.A.R. and his successful objective in relieving the Society of its Headquarters Debt, and takes pride in the fact that so many of Mr. Oliver's precedessors were lawyers as well as our present President General.

The Missouri Society records with sorrow the passing of its beloved Compatriot Henry A. Chapin, formerly Secretary of the Society, and later an Honorary Vice President, whose death occurred last April 21st. A loving memorial tribute has been prepared by his devoted friend, our honored James M. Breckenridge.

1948

The Missouri Society annual meeting in February elected officers that were nominated in January. President John W. Gieseke was re-elected as were all other officers except Dr. Albert J. Campbell and Brigadier General Paul M. Robinett replaced Martin and Pohlman as Vice Presidents. J. Alonzo Matthews became Historian/Genealogist

and Chaplain Rev. Sidney B. Harry was elected.

At the 58th Congress in Minneapolis, Missouri President Giesecke was elected Vice-President General, South Mississippi District. The Lexington Day luncheon guests were contestants practicing their oratorical contest for participation in NSSAR contest. The lads were judged and the winner received \$25 and the runner-up received \$10. (Note: The NSSAR contest was cancelled.) The Society hopes to make this worth-while project an annual event. Another project of the society will be to try and secure legislation in Missouri to have the U.S. 50 Highway designated as the George Washington Highway. The section through Missouri will be a continuation of this main road. It will traverse the heart of the state, pass through the capitol, Jefferson City, St. Louis and Kansas City. A committee has been appointed to assist in this effort.

To emphasize and broaden the observance of Bill of Rights Day in 1948, letters setting forth the significance of the first ten Amendments and urging greater understanding of their vital importance were sent to 231 Missouri Schools, 480 Missouri newspapers, to the Governor of the State, the Mayors of Kansas City and St. Louis and

all members of the State Society.

The Society reports with sorrow the untimely death of Colonel E. Carroll Sibley on January 6. Col. Sibley, who was a Professor of Economics at Washington University, had a distinguished academic and military career and had been a loyal and devoted member of the State Society's Board of Managers.

A committee composed of Compatriots Lucian Erskine, Darold E. Ferneau and

Marion S. Francis has completed a comprehensive study of the problems involved in the sale to children of comic and crime books, and of the statutes, ordinances and court decisions applicable thereto in the other states and municipalities. The committee's detailed report and recommendations were submitted to the Society's Board of Managers; the committee was directed to proceed immediately in initiating action to implement their recommendations throughout Missouri. The first step was to send the President of the St. Louis Board of Aldermen a vigorous endorsement of the proposed ordinance for that city which has just been sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. The Society hopes to secure the enactment of similar legislation throughout Missouri, either locally or by the State Legislature.

The Board of Managers has authorized the creation of a Legislative Committee, whose membership will be composed of those Missouri compatriots who are in the State Legislature. The function of this committee will be to watch for legislation introduced in the General Assembly which may be of interest to the Society, and to assist


the Society in supporting or introducing bills.

1949

Lucian Erskine was elected State President with incumbent Secretary William Pagenstecher serving his third term. Guy Wood was elected at the Congress in Jackson-ville, Florida, as National Trustee. President General John W. Finger restored the practice of the National Society Trustees setting the policy of the Society, and assuming active supervision of its affairs instead of having the Executive Committee make all decisions which were ratified by the Trustees at the close of the year. To invite greater participation it was decided to hold Trustees' meetings in New York and St. Louis. Missouri Compatriot John W. Giesecke, Vice President General, South Mississippi District, organized the meeting held in St. Louis. The Trustees' meeting was held on 25

February. The Missouri State Society was complimented, by the National Society, upon its careful preparations, with gratitude to William Pagenstecher, Secretary of the Missouri Society. A special luncheon and afternoon entertainment were arranged. A delightful dinner was given in the evening by the Missouri Society in honor of its distinguished guests.

1950

Vice President General John W. Giesecke, a member of the Missouri Society, reported that he was somewhat chagrined by the fact that Missouri is the only Society in his District that did not make its quota for the year. A special committee studying textbooks in schools located two books which should be called to the attention of the authorities. The Missouri Society Board of Managers endorsed a proposed ordinance of St. Louis prohibiting the sale of crime-comic books to children. On April 3 the Board of Aldermen of St. Louis adopted the bill. However the Mayor announced his intention to veto the bill.

The Society continued its activities in awarding of Good Citizenship and ROTC medals. It was reported to have awarded in excess of 125 certificates. Lucian Erskine was re-elected President and William Pagenstecher served his fifth term as Secretary. Missouri membership was listed as 157. The National Society's Douglas G. High Ora-

tion contest held its first contest at the Congress in Atlantic City. Florida, Missouri and Ohio had contestants. Robert Wood of Ohio won.

1951

John Holmes Dunn was elected President and Secretary William Pagenstecher was re-elected. John W. Giesecke was elected as Trustee at the Congress in San Francisco. Former Missouri Society President John Rush Powell died 25 April 1951.

1952

National Congress in Houston, Texas, elected John W. Giesecke as Trustee from Missouri Society. Re-elected by the Missouri Society were President John Dunn and Secretary William Pagenstecher. James M. Breckenridge, former Vice President General, died on 2 October 1952.

1953

The Missouri Society sponsored its usual Constitutional Day observance. The entire student body of Southwest High School in St. Louis heard Congressman Thomas B. Curtis review the Constitution. The Congressman was introduced by Missouri Society President William Pagenstecher. A joint luncheon commemorating the anniversary of the surrenders of Yorktown and Saratoga and the fall of Quebec was held on 16 October by the St. Louis Chapter of the Sons of the Revolution, the Society of Colonial Wars of Missouri and the Missouri Society, SAR. The Missouri Society is strongly in favor of whatever steps are necessary to unite the SAR and the Sons of the Revolution. Fifteen ROTC Medals were awarded to outstanding cadets in Missouri. The Missouri Society program is to be extended to honor at least one cadet in each ROTC unit in the state.

1954

President Pagenstecher was re-elected to a second term after having also previously served the Missouri Society as Secretary for seven terms (six consecutive). Compatriot Walter C. Rawls was elected as Missouri Society Secretary.

Recorded information as to the years 1951 through 1954 was very scant.

1955

The annual meeting was again a joint luncheon with the St. Louis Chapter of the Sons of the Revolution and Society of Colonial Wars hosted by the Missouri Society, SAR. During the past year 21 ROTC Medals were awarded and a number of Good Citizenship Medals were presented. The enthusiastic reception accorded this educational program attests to its great patriotic value. Former President General Allen L. Oliver served as one of the judges for a high school contest in Cape Girardeau where papers were prepared on the Constitution in observance of Constitution Week. Joseph E. Burger of Webster Groves was elected President Missouri Society and Henry F. Chadeayne elected Secretary. He had previously served as President in 1945 and Secretary in 1943 and 1944.

On Saturday 8 October members of the Missouri Society went to Ste. Genevieve, Missouri, on the Society's first annual history tour. Ste. Genevieve, the oldest permanent white settlement west of the Mississippi, was founded in 1735. Members of the Society of Colonial Wars and of the Colonial Dames joined with SAR members at a meeting in the gardens of the Bolduc House. After a picnic lunch on the grounds, the seventy-five present were addressed by Charles Van Ravenswaay, Director of the Missouri Historical Society. The Missouri Society plans to make such a tour each year.

1956

The Missouri Society held its annual meeting Saturday April 14, 1956, at the Park Plaza Hotel, St. Louis, Missouri.

Compatriot Joseph E. Burger, President of the Society for the past year, was reelected to the office and Henry F. Chadeayne was re-elected Secretary.

After the business meeting some thirty members of the Society and their guests gathered for lunch. Among the guests was Miss Valle Eigginbotham, Vice Regent, Francois Valle Chapter, DAR, who has been responsible for bringing four new members into the Missouri Society. This is a splendid example of fine cooperation by a DAR officer whose chapter treasury has been enriched to the tune of \$20.00. Miss Higginbotham is actively working on a number of other prospects.

President Burger presented his address, "God Save America," which has been so well received by the many organizations to which it has been presented. The talk is well illustrated with charts which the speaker used most effectively. Compatriot Burger spent most of his vacation in Honolulu last year working on this address instead of enjoying himself on the beach.

The Missouri Society has increased its membership from 145 to 153 during the past year.


The Patriotic Education Committee, under the chairmanship of Compatriot William Pagenstecher, has done an outstanding job in awarding Good Citizenship medals in 13 of the high schools in the state and 22 ROTC medals. This latter medal is now being offered in every ROTC unit in the state of Missouri.

It is with a deep sense of loss that Missouri reports the death on May 30, 1956, at his

home in Bowling Green, Missouri, of Compatriot Guy M. Wood, Sr. Compatriot Wood, who retired in 1951 because of ill health, was a Past President of the Missouri Society and a Past National Trustee.

1957

William Pagenstecher was elected National Trustee at the National Congress in Salt Lake City 26-27 May. Missouri delegates were Joseph E. Burger and John W. Giesecke. The Missouri Society elected James McCraken Daugherty as President and Robert M. Powell III as Secretary. The National Headquarters in Washington, D.C., sold their building at 16th Street for \$305,000 and purchased the Patrick Hurley property for \$160,000.

Two distinguished Compatriots of the Missouri Society were the principals in a unique ceremony on January 14, at the Capitol in Jefferson City, when Chief Justice S. P. Dalton, Missouri Supreme Court, administered the oath of office to his brother, John M. Dalton, Attorney General of the State of Missouri. A third brother, Col. W. W. Dalton, is Chancellor of the Missouri Society SAR.

Information about 1958 is scarce. James M. Daughterty was relected as President Missouri Society. Trustee was William Pagenstecher elected at the Congress at Biloxi, Mississippi and the delegate was Allen L. Oliver. No secretary was listed. It has been reported in an earlier writing of the history that the Missouri Society came into hard times in the late 50s due to the National Society taking political stands that offended many members throughout the nation. A number of state members resigned and little interest expressed by any prospective members.

1959

The Missouri Society President James M. Daugherty resigned. This resulted in the Missouri Trustee William Pagenstecher conducting the business of the society. The state society, at this time, appeared to be in limbo.

1960

Brigadier General Paul M. Robinett of Mountain Grove was elected as trustee during the National Congress at Memphis on 15-16 May. General Robinett was also the only delegate from Missouri. Former Missouri Presidents Frederick G. Williamson (1934-35) died in March and Homer Hall (1946) died on 24 January. No reports were being sent to the National Headquarters. Compatriot William Pagenstecher was listed as the person to address any communications concerning Missouri (apparently he acted in the capacity of state secretary, treasurer and registrar during this period).

1961

The Missouri Society has finally began to revive from a period of apathy. Compatriot William Stanley Cordry was elected president and Malcolm Canan Drummond was elected as secretary. General Paul Robinett reelected as trustee at the Clearwater, Florida Congress on 7-10 May. President General Herschel S. Murphy, M.D., visited the Missouri Society in St. Louis where it was stated that the Missouri Society was reestablished by the election of new officers after a lapse of a couple of years.

Compatriot William Pagenstecher former president of the Missouri Society and former secretary and treasurer and trustee was presented the National Society's Gold Good Citizenship Medal by President General Herschel S. Murphy at a luncheon meeting of the Missouri Society held at the University Club of St. Louis on 5 November 1960. Former Governor James T. Blair, Jr., and the present Governor John M. Dalton and recently elected United States Senator Edward V. Long are all members of the Missouri Society prepared a membership kit to be disbursed to all fifty states. Twelve states (one-fourth) have fewer than 100 members and of this group of state secretaries eight have no chapters (Missouri being one).

Original State Flag Presented to Missouri

Missouri's original state flag presented to the state at a joint session of the House and the Senate of Jefferson City on June 14, 1961.

Compatriot Allen L. Oliver, past president general of our Society was the donor who handed it to the secretary of state, Warren E. Hearnes, who promised that it would be preserved in an airproof case and displayed in the State Capitol.

The original state flag was designed 50 years ago by Compatriot Oliver's mother, Mrs. Marie Elizabeth Watkins Oliver, who died in 1944 at the age of 90. The flag had been in her family's possession since it was officially adopted by the state in 1913.

Governor John M. Dalton, a member of the Missouri Society, S.A.R., introduced Compatriot Oliver, who explained that "The design of this flag represents that while we are an independent sovereignty, we are also part of and in harmony with the na-

tional government. The Latin motto then, as now, recites that the will of the people is

the supreme law of the state."

President General Kitchell traveled 18,000 miles visiting various state meetings. He arrived in St. Louis to attend the annual dinner of the Missouri Society where he spoke to the members in attendance. Missouri president William Cordry presided. Former President General Allen L. Oliver and Mrs. F. S. Haeberle, vice regent St. Louis DAR Chapter were in attendance.

1962

Dr. Francis T. H'Doubler, of Springfield, was elected president of the Missouri Society at the Society's annual meeting held April 16 in Clayton. He succeeded Compatriot William S. Cordry of St. Louis.

Other officers and members of the board of managers were chosen to give a broad geographic representation throughout the state. General Paul M. Robinett of Moun-

tain Grove was nominated for another term as national trustee.

The Missouri Society recently awarded twenty-one ROTC medals to high school and college training units in the state, all of which participated in the 1962 programs.

Good citizenship medal awards were made recently at the School of the Ozarks and at the Richmond Heights-Maplewood Senior High School. Compatriots Kay M. Crossen, Malcolm D. Drummond and Charles A. Hardie represented the Society at a number of the award ceremonies.

1963

The Missouri Society is being revitalized by new members and renewed interest. Nineteen new members were listed from 1 April 1962 to 1 April 1963. The society now lists 127 members. State president Dr. Francis Todd H'Doubler died in office. Compatriot Charles A. Hardie, of Columbia, was elected as Missouri President. Malcolm C. Drummond was reelected as secretary. General Robinett continued as Missouri trustee.

The banquet hall of the University Club, St. Louis, Missouri, was the setting on 19 October 1963 of the presentation of a Medal of Appreciation by the Missouri Society, SAR, to Mrs. Charles H. Mennell for her outstanding services to the Society. The regents of the various DAR chapters of the St. Louis area were present to take part in the festivities.

Vice President General Pat C. Herrington for the South Mississippi District, and Mrs. Herrington were guests of honor. Mr. Herrington gave a brief talk on the dangers of subversion from within.

Compatriot Charles A. Hardie, president of the Missouri Society, gave a brief resume of the state of the Missouri Society which shows a continued gain in membership and social activities.

1964

The Missouri Society's annual spring luncheon was held on 21 March at the Clayton Inn, Clayton, Missouri. The election of officers were: President - Charles A. Hardie; Vice-President - Lloyd B. Cash; Secretary/Treasurer - Charles A. Mennell; Chaplain - Dr. Charles E. Mount; Historian - Sterling W. Hackman, General Robinett was renominated as national trustee. The officers were installed at the annual meeting in April. Membership continued to grow and on 1 April was listed as 138.

1965

Compatriot Sterling W. Hackman was elected president of the Missouri Society at its annual meeting and election of officers held on Washington's Birthday at the Cheshire

Inn. St. Louis, Missouri.

Other officers elected to serve during the 1965-1966 year were: vice presidents, Lloyd B. Cash and Everett O. Ewalt; secretary-registrar, Charles A. Mennell; treasurer, Edward N. Zilliken.

Regents of the various DAR chapters in the St. Louis area were guests of the Society and most of the members were accompanied by their wives.

As the enlarged membership in making the State organization rather unwieldly Compatriot Manning M. Patrillo, Jr., was appointed expeditor for the organization of a St. Louis chapter. Since the **Springfield chapter** has already received its charter, the Missouri Society will have two chapters in the immediate future.

A dedication ceremony was held on 22 August 1965 at the Old Salem Cemetery, 10 miles north of Springfield, Missouri. Markers were placed honoring two Revolutionary War Soldiers—David Bedell and Elisha Headlee. Also honored was Samuel L. Steele, on whose grave in nearby Mt. Comfort cemetery a marker will be placed. More than

ninety persons were present.

Taking part in the ceremony were Pat C. Herrington, past vice president general and national trustee; Sterling W. Hackman, president of the Missouri Society SAR; L. Bentley Cash, vice president of the Missouri Society SAR; Dr. M. Graham Clark, SAR member and president of the School of the Ozarks. Dr. Robert G. Tucker, SAR member of Deerfield, Illinois; and Reverend Ralph Turner, pastor of the New Salem Church.

A uniformed colorguard of Marine Reserves opened the ceremony with "To the Colors" and closed with the firing of three volleys over the graves and sounding "Taps."

Dr. Clark talked on the significance of the Declaration of Independence, the Revolutionary War and the Constitution of the United States to our American Heritage.

Rev. Turner recounted the history of the Revolutionary War soldiers and asked the benediction.

All arrangements for the ceremony were under the direction of L. Bentley Cash.

SOUTH MISSISSIPPI DISTRICT CONFERENCE HELD IN OZARKS

The first SAR South Mississippi Regional Conference was held on 22, 23, and 24 October at the School of the Ozarks in the beautiful Shepherd of the Hills country at Branson, Missouri.

Registration was at the Rock Creek Lodge followed by a cocktail hour on 22 October. On 23 October, the ladies were taken on a bus tour of the Shepherd of the Hills country with lunch at Silver Dollar City; and business meetings in the morning and afternoon were held at the School of the Ozarks followed by a buffet dinner. The conference ended with services at the beautiful memorial chapel at the School of the Ozarks on 24 October.

Among those present were President General and Mrs. Howard E. Coe of Connecticut; past President General and Mrs. Horace Y. Kitchell of Mississippi; past President General and Mrs. Robert Sonfield of Texas; DAR Vice-President General Mrs. Bentley Cash of Springfield, Missouri, and official DAR representatives from the states of Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, and Texas.

At the final buffet dinner on Saturday evening, SAR Good Citizenship Medals were presented to Dr. M. Graham Clark, a dedicated SAR and President of the School of the Ozarks, for his work in education; and to Mrs. L. B. Cash of Springfield, Missouri, as Vice President General of the Daughters of the American Revolution for her cooperation in DAR and SAR work. Mrs. Cash is the wife of Compatriot L. Bentley Cash, First Vice President of the Missouri SAR Society and Chairman of the Arrangements Committee of this South Mississippi SAR conference.

The St. Louis Chapter of the Missouri Society was presented with its charter and

held its organizational meeting on 21 March at the home of vice president-elect Everett Ewalt, of the State Society.

Officers elected were: William Pagenstecher, president; Harold Wagner, vice president; Dr. Charles Blunt, secretary; Lawrence Clark, treasurer; Philip Reis, chairman of the membership committee; and Charles Hardie, chairman of the patriotic education committee. The above named officers form the executive committee.

Compatriot Harold S. Wenger was elected president of the Metropolitan St. Louis Chapter at its meeting held 19 April. Other officers elected were: Manning M. Patrillo, Jr., vice president; Dr. Lawrence E. Clark, treasurer; Dr. Charles P. Blunt, secretary; Philip H. Reis, Jr., membership chairman, and Charles A. Hardie, patriotic education chairman.

Members of the chapter decided to keep charter membership open until 31 March 1966. Membership will be sought from any Sons of the American Revolution residing within a hundred miles of metropolitan St. Louis.

Discussions were conducted concerning representation in civic affairs, participation in patriotic education by making awards in the secondary schools in the area and means of promoting membership in the chapter.

1966

President Hackman of the Missouri Society was a guest of honor at the regular quarterly meeting of the Metropolitan St. Louis chapter held on 8 March in the Arcade Building. Also present were several state officers and present and past members from both the Missouri and Illinois Societies. The meeting was presided over by Compatriot Harold S. Wagner chapter president. Missouri Society reelected President Hackman and Secretary Mennell. Missouri continued to increase membership. A new chapter was chartered at Springfield and named the Ozark-Hougendobler Chapter. The chapter president was James L. Robinett, Jr., and the secretary L. Bentley Cash. The chapter was charted with twenty members. Dr. M. Graham Clark was elected as trustee at the National Congress in Columbus, Ohio, and Compatriot L. Bentley Cash was elected vice president of the South Mississippi District.

Compatroit L. Bentley Cash, the new vice president general for the South Mississippi District, is a member of the National Society through direct descent from Warren Cash, who served with General Washington's army at Valley Forge. Born in Marceline, Missouri, he moved with his father's family to St. Joseph, Missouri, in 1903.

He has served two terms as vice president of the Missouri Society, and is now secretary-treasurer of the Ozarks-Hougendobler Chapter, which he organized on July 14, 1966, in Springfield, Missouri. This chapter has twenty charter members.

Compatriot Cash assisted vice president general Donald C. Little in setting up the first South Mississippi conference in October 1965.

He attended public schools in St. Joseph and then worked in a garment factory as timekeeper and assistant manager. World War I intervened during which he served with the 34th Aerial Photo Section of the army. Following his army service, he moved to Kansas City as manager of a garment factory. He became interested in refrigeration and for thirty-five years followed that industry. During this period, he served in many capacities including installation, service, service manager, district engineer, and district commercial and air conditioning sales manager. He became director of national service for the Norge division of the Borg Warner Corporation, and after several years managing his own business, retired in 1956. Mr. and Mrs. Cash now operate rental property.

Compatriot Cash is a member of the First and Calvary Presbyterian Church, the Greene County Historical Society, the Civil War Round Table, the Hickory Hills Coun-

try Club, and the Springfield Lions Club, of which he is vice president.

The Missouri Society's fall meeting was held on 13 October at the Flaming Pit. A large attendance of compatriots and their ladies enjoyed the affair with President Hackman and most of the state officers. The St. Louis chapter met at the home of chapter vice president Manning M. Pattillo, Jr. Prospective members and ladies joined members in enjoying a fine buffet supper following the meeting. The Springfield chapter Ozark-Hougendobler will act as host to the state society in January and a dinner is planned.

1967

The Metropolitan St. Louis Chapter observed Washington's Birthday with a banquet at the Missouri Athletic Club. Virtually the entire membership attended with their ladies. Also present were many guests and prospective members. The guest of honor was Dr. J. W. Cross, professor of history, at St. Louis University. The Missouri Society president was Sterling W. Hackman serving his third term. Dr. M. Graham Clark was again elected as trustee.

The Missouri Society now has two chapters: Metropolitan St. Louis: president -Harold S. Wagner; secretary - Phillip H. Reis, Jr.; Ozarks-Hougendobler: president -Jack C. Appleby; secretary - L. Bentley Cash.

1968

The Missouri Society held its annual meeting for the election and installation of officers on 9 March. The meeting was held in the Downtown Holiday Inn, and was well attended, especially by out-of-state members. On account of the necessarily long business meeting, there were no other activities. A feature of the afternoon was the choice of one of our members as an honorary member, namely Mr. Harry S. Truman, former President of the United States. After the meeting had adjourned, there was a fellowship hour before the gathering dispersed. At Washington University, Air Force Cadet John F. Robinson and two University of Missouri ROTC students received similar ROTC awards. They were Air Force Cadet Irwin Williams and Army Cadet Harvey Harben. Also Navy Midshipman Dennis Hacker of the University of Missouri received an ROTC medal. Compatriot Wilson Wright awarded an ROTC Medal at Washington University to Army Cadet James M. Gieseke. It is reassuring to see such a fine group of young men who, on a voluntary basis, are devoting their time and talents to the cause of the United States. What a contrast to the campus sit-in rioters; the vociferous minorities on our college campuses.

Missouri Society officers elected were: president - Hayden Maurice Robinett; secretary/treasure/registrar - Sterling W. Hackman. At the National Congress in Williamsburg, Virginia, Dr. M. Graham Clark was elected trustee. Chapter officers were: Metropolitan St. Louis Chapter president - Craig Washabaugh; secretary - Phillip H. Reis, Jr.; Ozarks-Hougendobler president - Jack C. Appleby; secretary - L. Bentley Cash.

1969

President H. Maurice Robinett was reelected and also secretary/treasure/registrar -

Sterling W. Hackman. Dr. Clark was reelected trustee at the Congress at Salt Lake City on 26-29 May. The Springfield Chapter, Ozarks-Hougendobler was listed with the same officers as last year. The Metropolitan St. Louis Chapter was not mentioned this year or subsequent years—it apparently fell by the wayside and became inactive. The Missouri Society commenced a decline in membership to 109.

1970

The Missouri Society installed their new officers at a luncheon held at the Clayton Inn on 18 April. Lucian Howard Jadwin was elected president and Sterling W. Hackman of Belleville, Illinois continued in office as secretary/treasure/registrar. Newly elected president spoke on "Famous Patriotic Riders of History." Dr. M. Graham Clark reelected as Missouri trustee. Dr. Clark, president of the School of the Ozarks, hosted the annual conference of the South Mississippi District, at the school. President General Walter Martin attended and addressed the members who were from Missouri, Oklahoma, Kansas, Arkansas and Texas. Compatriot and former President General Allen L. Oliver died on 10 February 1970. The Ozarks-Hougendobler Chapter listed the same officers as the two previous years—although no other activity was reported.

1971

The 81st National Congress held in Atlantic City on 6-9 June elected Dr. M. Graham Clark as vice president general of the South Mississippi District. In addition, Dr. Clark was reelected as Missouri Trustee. The Missouri Society elected William Stanley Kenner as president and reelected Sterling M. Hackman as secretary/treasure. No chapters listed.

1972

Dr. M. Graham Clark trustee of Missouri was elected secretary general at the Congress in Indianpolis 11-14 June. He was also reelected as trustee. The Missouri Society elected Paul Warren Bennett as president. Former Missouri president William Kenner was elected secretary.

The Missouri Society convened on September 30 at the Vandalia State Bank dining room, and a most interesting program was conducted by President Paul W. Bennett.

Those in attendance enjoyed a discourse by Compatriot C. B. Wivel on the personalities of Presidents George Washington and Thomas Jefferson.

In November, Vice President Lucian H. Jadwin and Secretary /Treasure/Registrar William S. Kenner conferred with the national executive secretary, who was in St. Louis for a brief period. These state officers reported that there is a reawakening of patriotic and historical interest throughout Missouri, and that the SAR has become recognized as a leader in these fields.

1973

Missouri elected Merrill D. Berkeley as president and William Kenner continued as secretary/treasure/registrar. Dr. Clark continued in his eighth year as Missouri trustee. The Missouri Society proudly sponsored Dr. M. Graham Clark as nominee for president general of the National Society. A full page advertisement was purchased by the Missouri Society in the SAR magazine promoting Dr. Clark for president general. At the fall trustees meeting the South Mississippi District was changed to South Central District, the five states in the district remain the same.

1974

Dr. Claude Burns Wivel of Eckland, Missouri, was elected president of the Missouri Society. William Kenner continued as secretary/treasure/registrar. Paul Bennett elected as trustee at the Baltimore Congress, 23-26 June. Delegates included Dr. M. Graham Clark, Paul Bennett, Dr. Claude Wivel and Seth B. Caperton. Dr. M. Graham Clark was elected as president general of the National Society. Dr. Clarks message as president general stated "as I pursue the duties of President General I am frequently reminded that in patriotic organizations, that is SAR, our ultimate strength lies in numbers. But I am also reminded that the success of our undertakings is made possible through the efforts of individuals. Let us never, in our democracy, discount the importance of the individual and his contribution to a cause. Edward Everett Hale expressed well how a individual should feel toward a cause;

I am only one
But still I am one.
I cannot do everything.
But still I can do something.
I will not refuse to do something I can."

When President General Clark officiated at the establishment of the SAR Law Enforcement Committee, he said "this important committee emphasizes our concern for the need for additional support and deep interest of our society in law enforcement."

1975-1976

John W. Hillemeyer elected president in 1975 and reelected in 1976. William S. Kenner was reelected serving his fourth term as secretary. In 1976 William Edward Vesser was elected as secretary. Strength figures for these two years were not found anywhere. Paul Bennett was reelected as trustee during the Congress in Boston 29 June to 2 July 1975. William S. Kenner was appointed to the National By-Laws Committee. The Missouri Society Publicity Chairman Frank W. Shelton witnessed the signing of Constitution Week and Citizenship Day by the mayor of Cherryvale. Paul Bennett was reelected trustee in Philadephia at the 86th Congress on 13-16 June 1976. The Sgt. Ariel Nims Chapter No. One was organized in Joplin, on 29 May 1976. The State Society approved the petition for the chapter charter at the annual meeting held at the

School of the Ozarks, Point Lookout, Missouri. This was the fourth time a chapter had been organized in Missouri. The first chapter being the Kansas City Chapter organized in April 1896 and lasting until sometine in 1921. Then in April 1965 the Metropolitan St. Louis Chapter and then in July 1966 the Ozarks-Hougendobler Chapter was organized in Springfield. However the two chapters lasted only four or five years before becoming inactive.

1977

Dr. Donald L. Worley, DDS elected president of the Missouri Society, Former President John Hillemeyer was elected as the state secretary. Compatriot Paul Bennett continued in office as trustee. NSSAR established a temporary headquarters in Washington while a special real estate committee searched the United States for a new headquarters building location. Compatriot Arthur M. King was appointed as cochairman of the committee. FPG Dr. M. Graham Clark was chairman of the National Patriotic Committee and William Kenner continued as a member of the by-laws committee. Arthur M. King elected as vice president general of the South Central District at the Milwaukee Congress in June. A medals and awards committee was established by NSSAR.

1978

The Missouri Society annual meeting was held at the School of the Ozarks located at Point Lookout, Missouri. President General Calvin E. Chunn attended the meeting and gave a talk. President General Chunn also presided at the swearing in ceremony of the new state officers. Elected officers of the Missouri Society were: president - Merle M. Jackson; executive vice-president - Wade K. Forman; vice presidents - William Kenner and Roland Smith; secretary - John Hillemeyer; treasure - Burton Mayfield; and registrar/genealogist - Merrill Berkeley. Also the new officers for the Sergeant Ariel Nims Chapter were sworn in including: president - William Nims; treasurer - Stewart Miller; and registrar/genealogist - Dr. Robert Tucker. Missouri President Dr. Donald Worley (1977-78) presented the Silver Good Citizenship Medal and Certificate to Missouri trustee Paul W. Bennett for his outstanding contribution to the Missouri Society as president, vice president general and trustee for five consecutive years. A contest to name the Missouri newsletter was won by Merrill Berkelev for the name "Compatriot News". Francis L. Deane was selected to serve on the NSSAR Boy Scout Committee. Missouri President Merle M. Jackson resigned and Executive Vice President Wade K. Forman took office as Missouri Society president.

1979

A new medallion is now available for all past state society presidents. The medallion is available from NSSAR to wear on the "V" of the neck ribbon. It is blue and gold and about 7/8" diameter. Arthur M. and Berdena King SAR-DAR membership comparison award established at NSSAR.\$200 to the state whose membership as of 1 April compared with DAR membership in the state produces the highest percentage. Also \$200 to the state that has the largest percentage increase in the ratio of membership of SAR to DAR the preceding twelve months. Missouri's membership on 1 April 1979 was 188 ranking number 50 out of 51 as regards percentage of SAR to DAR of 2.82 percent. Compatriot John W. Hillemeyer received a silver membership plaque from NSSAR for signing eight new members for Missouri. Wade K. Forman was elected president of Missouri, and John Hillemeyer continued in his fourth year as secretary. Paul W. Bennett continued as trustee. President General Chunn appointed Dr. M. Graham Clark -Americanism Committee; Paul Bennett - Credentials Committee; Wade Forman -Membership Committee; and Dr. Donald Worley - Chairman Medals and Awards Com-

mittee; Former President General M. Graham Clark concerned with lack of expansion of the Missouri Society met with President Forman and Registrar Merrill D. Berkeley and Compatriot Cary Bankhead and encouraged them to initiate a drive to start a new chapter.

1980

Compatriot Seth Caperton of Walnut Shade, Missouri, was elected president of the Missouri Society and Compatriot John W. Hillemeyer was elected his fifth term as secretary. Paul W. Bennett continued as trustee. Arthur M. King was elected as President General, NSSAR. John Hillemeyer received a gold enamleled plaque of honor of NSSAR for signing 15 new members. The National Society raised annual dues from \$8 to \$10 effective I April 1981. The Missouri Society held a meeting in St. Louis on 27th September. A petition to form a new chapter in Columbia was approved by the State Society. President Caperton contacted Compatriots Wm. Gordon Buckner and Ed Gray to continue to working on members for the proposed chapter. Mrs. Worley gave a dramatic program concerning that epoch period of American history at Valley Forge. Compatriots Robert Tucker and Ryland Rudy both members of the Sgt. Ariel Nims Chapter, organized and manned a SAR booth at the McDonald County Fair providing information to interested persons and potential members.

1981

The Missouri Society's annual meeting was held in May, as in past years, at the School of the Ozarks at Point Lookout. Dr. James Spainhower, incoming president of the school, was the honored guest speaking on the over abundance of federalism in our daily lives. Eight Missouri Compatriots received the Meritorious Medal for their outstanding contributions to the society for over the past ten years. Receiving medals were Merrill C. Berkeley, Stewart W. Miller, Dr. Donald L. Worley, Burton W. Mayfield, William S. Kenner, John W. Hillemeyer, Robert F. Winegar and William E. Vesser (posthumously). Also awarded during the year were 17 Silver ROTC and 25 Bronze ROTC medals to colleges and high schools throughout Missouri. Burton W. Mayfield elected as president and Ryland M. Rudy elected as state secretary. Paul Bennett was reelected as trustee at the National Congress in Oklahoma City. John W. Hillemeyer was awarded a Silver Membership Plaque for signing nine new members. The Missouri Society organized four new chapters. M. Graham Clark in April at Columbia, Ozark Mountain at Springfield in July, Spirit of St. Louis at St. Louis and William Cookskin Corum at Liberty both in September. The Missouri Society was stimulated by the growth in membership and a resurgence has began. Reported as of 1 April 1982 memberships had increased to 242 members—a gain of 38 from the previous year. There are now five active chapters in Missouri and are growing. The NSSAR established an Eagle Scout scholarship program that each State Society may participate in.

1982

Burton Mayfield was reelected as president of the Missouri Society at the annual meeting in March in St. Louis. President General Richard H. Thompson, Jr., was the honored guest and presided over the installation of officers. Also installed were: secretary - Joseph H. Staugham, Jr.; treasure - Kirk McDaniel, Jr.; registrar/genealogist William L. Wood; and chaplain - Roger C. Fuqua. Also in attendance were DAR State Regent Mrs. Pat Towle, VPG for South Central District Louis J. Rumaggi and Former President Generals Arthur M. King and Dr. M. Graham Clark. A Missouri state meeting was held at the School of the Ozarks on 10 July and hosted other states of the

South Central District.

Paul W. Bennett was reelected as trustee at the National Congress in Portland. Charles R. Wollard was awarded a prestige membership plaque of honor for signing twenty-two members. The Portland Congress in June was an exciting one for Missouri as three major awards were received. The awards to the Missouri Society were: the Colorado Award, the Kentucky Cup, and the Syracuse Award (tied with California). The Missouri Society Board of Managers met on 9 October at the Elms Hotel in Excelsior Springs hosted by the William C. Corum Chapter.

Attendance included 54 members, wives and guests, including Mrs. Joseph Capps, State Vice Regent, DAR and Mrs. William C. Boney, Honorary DAR State Regent. Compatriots Seth B. Caperton, Jr., and Dr. Robert G. Tucker were presented Meritorious Service Medals. Speakers included Mr. Milton Perry, Jesse James Home and Museum Curator, and Mrs. Barbara Davis, Senior State President, CAR. On Sunday 10 October registrar-genealogist William Wood gave a seminar on genealogy. The Board of Managers discussd support for national officers nominations and participation in the Eagle Scout Scholarship Program among other items. Missouri membership and recruiting chairman Charles R. Wollard reported 278 members. The John Woolard Chapter at Richmond held its charter presentation and installation of officers on 18 December at the Elms Hotel, Excelsior Springs. The Missouri Society, SAR had a total of seven active chapters as of the end of the year. South Central District Vice President General Augustus di Zerega, of Kansas, installed the chapter officers and gave a talk on the history of the SAR.

A special Board of Managers meeting was held on 22 January in Columbia to nominate officers for 1983-84. This meeting was scheduled in December 1982 but cancelled due to snow. Additional business included approval of uniform by-laws for all chapters to conform to state by-laws. Also approved was an expenditure for microfilming members approved applications. The annual meeting of the Missouri Society was held on 12 March at the Columbia, Missouri Country Club hosted by the M. Graham Clark Chapter. Chancellor General Benjamin H. Morris of the National Society was the featured speaker and installing officer. Missouri Society State Officers installed were: president - Charles W. Calef; executive vice president - Charles R. Wollard; secretary -Kirk McDaniel, Jr.; treasure - William Gordon Buckner; registrar/genealogist -William L. Wood; chancellor - David L. Busch; chaplain - Roger C. Fuqua; and trustee - Paul W. Bennett. Honorary Vice Presidents were FPG Dr. M. Graham Clark and FPG Arthur M. King. The Missouri state winner of the Eagle Scout trophy was Allen S. Griffey. The trophy was presented by FPG Dr. M. Graham Clark.

The National Congress was held in Atlanta in June. Missouri tied with the Alabama, Florida and Wisconsin Societies for the George E. Tarbox, Jr., Award (state society with largest percentage of eligible delegates at Congress). Missouri delegates were FPG Arthur M. King, FPG Dr. M. Graham Clark, Paul Bennett, Burton Mayfield, Charles Calef, William Wood, Seth Caperton and Charles Wollard. The sought after Florence Kendall Award was awarded to Missouri Compatriot Charles R. Wollard for signing 63 new members.

Missouri membership as of 1 April had increased to 349 members. Paul W. Bennett was reelected as trustee. This was the tenth time that Compatriot Bennett had been elected as trustee by the Congress. On 9 July a Board of Governors meeting of the Missouri Society was held in Des Peres, Missouri, at the Flaming Pit Restaurant. Mrs.

Joseph T. Towle, Jr., Missouri State DAR Regent was the speaker. A Post Office Box 12571 in Kansas City established as the permanent legal address of the Missouri Society, now incorporated in the State of Missouri. The October board of managers met at Sedalia on Saturday the 22nd. The nominating committee reported the slate for the annual membership meeting to be held on 31 March 1984, FPG Arthur M. King, Chairman Ways and Mean, reported that due to reduction in spending Missouri will probably have a small surplus of funds this year. A new chapter of the Missouri Society was given its charter a week ago on 15 October by State President Calef. The chapter was named the Joseph Morgan Chapter and is located in North Kansas City, Platte County, vicinity of the Kansas City Airport. The Missouri Society now has eight active chapters and is steadily increasing. President Charles Calef announced that an effort is being made to charter two new chapters. One chapter to be located at Poplar Bluff and one at Paris, Missouri, The Missouri Society records are now maintained by computer. Compatriot Stuart E. Elliott of the Corum Chapter at Liberty has been establishing the data base to program the computer and imput the data for the state. The Board of Managers voted to raise the dues from \$5 to \$7 per year effective with the dues for 1984.

1984

The Missouri Society Board of Managers met in Sedalia on 28 January. Discussions included the donation of the old records and papers of the Missouri Society to the State Historical Society of Missouri in Columbia. They are stored in the Western Historical Manuscripts collection. Compatriot Francis L. Stubbs made all of the arrangements at the library. The recently completed by-laws includes a provision for a life membership for \$400, Compatriot Stuart E. Elliott appointed as executive secretary to maintain the

computerized records and will be paid a minimum fee quarterly.

Emphasis is being placed on each chapter to award the law enforcement medal to deserving individuals. Each chapter needs to emphasize renewal of membership—it now stands at only 69 percent of last year. It was voted to combine the checking account and passbook account into a "super now" account. Charles Wollard appointed to the National Genealogy Committee. The annual meeting of the Society was held at the United Methodist Church, on 31 March at Chillicothe, hosted by the Lewis and Clark Expedition Chapter. A very interesting talk was given by Judge Roy C. Hicklin on the "Lewis and Clark Exploration of the Louisiana Purchase." FPG Dr. M. Graham Clark installed the new state officers. President - Charles R. Wollard; executive vice president - Kirk McDaniel, Jr.; secretary - William Gordon Buckner; treasurer - Duncan E. Kincheloe, Jr.; - registrar/genealogist - William L. Wood; chancellor - James D. Worthington; Chaplain - Roger C. Fuqua and nominatee for national trustee Samuel G. Laffoon. The next board meeting on 28 April at Sedalia approved three new chapters to be formed. The Braxton C. Pollard at Paris, John Righter at Poplar Bluff and John Davis at St. Joseph. All of the chapter names chosen are from Revolutionary War soldiers.

Missouri Society board meetings are now scheduled for the fourth Saturday in April, July, October and January and the annual membership meeting held on the last Saturday in March. The national congress in Cincinnati elected Samuel G. Laffoon as trustee and President Charles R. Wollard was awarded a gold enameled plaque of honor for signing 20 new members. The National Society raised the fee for new applications from \$25 to \$35 and the annual dues from \$8 to \$10. The John Righter Chapter received its charter on 16 June. Chapter President Maurice Righter of Poplar Bluff accepted the charter. Then on 30 June the Braxton C. Pollard Chapter President William Gordon Buckner of Paris received its charter. Both charters were presented by

State President Charles R, Wollard. The board meeting on 28 July at Columbia approved the forming of four new chapters. The Harry S. Truman Chapter at Independence, Alexander Majors Chapter at South Kansas City, Martin Warren Chapter at Warrensburg and the Archelaus Perkins Chapter at Carrollton. The treasure reported that a certificate of deposit (CD) program has been put in place. CDs have been established to have at least \$500, mature each month and a life membership fund

segregated from other monies and a CD purchased.

The John Davis Chapter in St. Joseph received its charter on 14 July. Compatriot Clyde M. Bowlin was selected as president. The fourth chapter to receive official recognition this year was the Harry Truman Chapter of Independence. President Truman was a member of the Missouri Society. The president of this new chapter is Jerry C. Gilchrist of Independence. The fifth chapter to be chartered during 1984 was the Alexander Majors Chapter located in South Kansas City. This chapter was charted in August with George E. Hicks as president. All five chapters were organized through the diligent and persistent efforts of the state President Charles R. Wollard. President Wollard worked tirelessly to promote the SAR in Missouri resulting in an increase in membership. The quarterly board meeting was held in Sedalia on 27 October. The board adopted a change in the by-laws to add four district vice presidents. One for each established district in Missouri—NE, SE, NW, and SW. The Missouri Society now has a total of thirteen active chapters and a total membership at the end of 1984 of 380 members.

1985

The January board of managers meeting on 26 January at Columbia approved all changes to the by-laws since 1982. New by-laws will be updated and published for the annual meeting on 23 March. A decision to publish a new type of newsletter was approved. The newsletter to be published by the Missouri Society three times per year and named "The Missouri Patriot" with a total cost, including postage of approximately \$344. The annual membership meeting was held in Columbia. President Wollard presided and proposed that dues collections be changed from state to chapter. The membership voted to change the way dues are collected and that chapters are now responsible. The Eagle Scout Award for the state was presented to David Allen Whitner of the John Davis Chapter. A change of the by-laws changed future annual meetings from March to the last Saturday in April each year. The membership now stands at 366. New officers elected for 1985-86 are president - James A. Shelby, executive vice president - Wm. Gordon Buckner; vice president - Kirk McDaniel, Jr.; vice president - I. Craig Uncapher; secretary - Lawrence L. Loker; treasure - Duncan E. Kincheloe, Jr.; registrar/genealogist - Judge David L. Busch; chancellor - Joseph A. Preston; chaplain -Paul V. Sawyer.

The newly created Missouri District vice presidents were NE - L. Carey Bankhead; NW - LTC Richard Wright, SE - Dr. Larry W. Schulze; SW - Paul T. Butler. Samuel G. Laffoon was nominated for trustee. The board of managers met on 27 April. Approval was given to form a new chapter at Jefferson City to be known as the Christopher Casey Chapter. The name chosen was that of a Revolutionary War soldier buried in Jefferson City. A committee was appointed to plan and conduct memorial services at annual meetings. Also a committee of chapter presidents to plan four and five years in advance for sites of annual meetings and then rotate the sites annually. The president and treasure were authorized to approve spending of funds not to exceed \$200, without prior board aproval. The July board meetings discussed plans for Missouri and Kansas to co-host the district meeting in April 1986. Discussions with Kansas will be held but if Kansas does not agree then Missouri plans to host the five state South Central

District meeting. Permission was granted for Secretary Loker to create a twelve page format for a state newsletter to be published quarterly. A name to be suggested by

members with the winning name to receive a prize.

The October board meeting in Sedalia conducted normal business and reports. A discussion concerning the Douglass G. High oration contest indicated that about \$15,000 fund would be required to support sending a contestant to NSSAR Congress each year, using only the interest generated from the fund. Compatriot Uncapher reported that 25-26 April 1986 is the date for the annual meeting to be held in Jefferson City and host the South Central District meeting. The first special edition of the new Missouri Newsletter was printed and mailed and declared a success. The Christopher Casey Chapter was chartered on 24 October in Jefferson City with K. C. Jones as president.

1986

The board of directors met in Columbia during January. The state newsletter was namec "The Missouri Compatriot" and due to cost it will be published three times a year ir stead of four. Spring, Summer and Fall issues will be published. The board passed a resolution to be sent to NSSAR for consideration at the Congress in Tampa. That the United States Congress be petitioned to change the observance of Washington's Birthday to be once again on the 22nd of February. The annual meeting was held at the Governor Hotel in Jefferson City. There were twenty-seven visiting compatriots and guests from other states in the district. A total of 105 persons attended the meeting. The Missouri Society had a net worth of \$10,825, at the time. The officers were: president James A. Shelby; executive vice president - Wm. Gordon Buckner; vice president -Joseph M. Menius; vice president - Lawrence L. Loker; secretary - Paul T. Butler; treasure - Roy F. Hornbuckle; registrar/genealogist - Judge David L. Busch; chancellor - Joseph A. Preston; chaplain - Rev. Dr. Earl C. Grandstaff, National trustee nominated - 1. Graig Uncapher and appointed executive secretary - Stuart E. Elliott, The South Centra. District meeting was held after the MOSSAR meeting, presided over by Vice President General Kenneth Ingram of Texas. The district nominated Claude L. Withers of Arkansas to be the next VPG elected at the NSSAR Congress, Missouri Governor John Ashcroft visited the district meeting and gave a brief talk to the group. Eagle Scout Stephen J. Adams, sponsored by the Harry S. Truman Chapter, was the Missouri Society winner and was presented the Eagle Trophy at the luncheon. Secretary General Clovis Brakebill of Texas, was the honored guest at the evening banquet and was the principal speaker. The annual meeting this year changed the previous format. A Friday evening informal dinner and entertainment followed by a Saturday morning memorial breakfast, a noon meeting, and then concluded with a gala evening banquet. This format appeared to be successful and future annual meetings will follow. The July board meeting held in Columbia noted that a total of forty-five ROTC awards were given by the MOSSAR this year. A large "Betsy Ross" thirteen star flag was donated to the society by President Shelby to be presented to Governor Ashcroft on 14 June (Flag Day) and flown over the state capitol.

K. C. Jones, president Christopher Casey Chapter presented the flag to the governor and the flag was flown over the capitol. The flag will be retained at the capitol and flown each Flag Day. The board approved a plan to establish a "Patriot's Fund" for the Missouri Society. A goal of \$20,000 in four years was established to be used as a principle. The interest payments from the principle to be used to support the MOSSAR activities, i.e. oration contests, scouts and any other approved activity. President Richard Yohe, of the Ozark Mountain Chapter was congratulated for marking five Revolutionary War soldiers graves located in Washington, Pennsylvania. Seven

chapters awarded ten law enforcement medals this year. Plans were made to hold the next annual meeting in St. Louis hosted by the Spirit of St. Louis Chapter in April next year.

1987

The Missouri Board met on 24 January at Columbia. Plans are underway to celebrate the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution during the year. The last board meeting approved the purchase of three kiosks from NSSAR for \$100. This is a twelve poster pictorical display about the United States Constitution that stands about six feet tall. Chapters were also encouraged to purchase a kiosk to display at various public locations in their area. The four chapters located in the Kansas City area held a very successful George Washington birthday luncheon. The luncheon was held at the Hillcrest Country Club and almost 200 attended. In addition to the SAR members, many DAR regent and state officers attended as did other prominent men of Missouri. Plans for the event to be held in subsequent years were considered. Membership as of 1 April 1987 was 405 members. Members dropped for unpaid dues each year continue to plague the Missouri Society. The ninety-eighth annual meeting of the society was hosted by the Spirit of St. Louis Chapter in St. Louis on the 25th of April. Officers elected were: president - I. Craig Uncapher; executive vice president - Lawrence L. Loker; vice president - Richard F. Downey; secretary - Paul T. Butler; treasure - Roy F. Hornbuckle; registrar - Judge David L. Busch; genealogist - Gerald F. Thurston: chancellor - Joseph A. Preston; chaplain - Rev. Dr. Earl C. Grandstaff; historian -Richard L. Yohe; sergeant-at-arms - Edwin L. Elliott; and nominated for national trustee was James A. Shelby and alternate trustee - Charles G. Drake. The meeting in St. Louis was unique in that the memorial service was conducted at the Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery Memorial Chapel. This is the only chapel located in a National Cemetery and is non-demoninational. Lunch was held at a large outdoor patio adjacent to the Jefferson Barracks Museum and on a bluff overlooking the Mississippi River. The evening banquet was held in General Grant's Shelter at Jefferson Barracks Park, Historian General NSSAR James R. Westlake was the honored guest and speaker. The Missouri Society voted approval of a plan for the Missouri and Kansas Societies to co-host a national congress at Kansas City in June 1991. A Gold Good Citizenship Medal was awarded to United States Senator Thomas Eagleton for his outstanding contributions to the State and Nation (medal was accepted by Burton Mayfield and presented later to the Senator). The National Congress at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania approved Missouri-Kansas as co-host for the 1991 Congress at Kansas City. The set of three kiosks promoting the bicentennial and purchased by chapters for display were being displayed throughout the state with much success. Compatriot Lawrence L. Loker, executive vice president traveled throughout Missouri this year giving about a thirty minute skit. Compatriot Loker was costumed as George Washington and presented a first person talk to SAR and DAR as well as other organizations during this Bicentennial year. The October board meeting approved an assessment of \$1 per chapter for four years. The money collected will be used to pay for hosting a state reception at the 1991 congress. Kansas asked their chapters to do the same.

1988

President Uncapher reported at the MOSSAR board meeting in January that a search for a new executive secretary to replace Stuart Elliott was in progress. The new executive secretary should have a computer to continue the excellent data base that Stuart Elliott has established. The second annual Washington's Birthday luncheon was held at the Hillcrest Country Club. It was decided to include the Delaware Crossing Chapter of Lenexa, Kansas. Another successful Washington Luncheon was held by the

following chapters: Alexander Majors of South Kansas City; Harry S. Truman of Independence; Joseph Morgan of Platte County; and William Cookskin Corum of Liberty. Vice President Loker reported on arrangements for the upcoming MOSSAR annual meeting to be held in Kansas City, hosted by the four greater Kansas City Chapters mentioned above. The Missouri board passed a motion that Missouri would sponsor a Douglass C. High Oration contestant in the 1991 National Congress. The annual meeting held in Kansas City, Mo. at the Ramada Inn South. The meeting was a great success and the attendance and participation from the chapter were excellent. Missouri Society officers elected were: president Lawrence L. Loker; executive vice president - Marvin D. Vawter; vice president - Richard F. Downey; vice president - Gary W. Beaham; secretary - Paul T. Butler; treasure - Jerry C. Gilchrist; registrar - Edward S. Gray; genealogist - Dr. Robert G. Tucker; surgeon - Dr. Clarence M. Pickard; chancellor - Joseph A. Preston; historian - Richard L. Yohe; sergeant-at-arms - Eugene B. Shelton; chaplain - Rev. Dr. Earl C. Grandstaff and nominated for National Trustee -I. Craig Umcapher; alternate trustee - Charles G. Drake, President Uncapher reported that Compatriot Gerald F. Thurston will succeed Stuart Elliott as executive secretary of the Missouri Society. Transfer of computer data base from Elliott to Thurston is almost complete. A breakfast memorial service by Chaplain Grandstaff was extremely moving to all present and was well received. A Eagle Scout Color Guard presented the colors at the awards luncheon in honor of Eagle Scout Keith J. Ferrell, MOSSAR winner of the Eagle Scout Trophy. Dr. Benjamin F. Taggie of Central Missouri University was the honored guest and speaker. The NSSAR Treasure General Col. James R. Calhoun was the honored guest and speaker at the evening banquet. Mrs. Clark K. Froman, Missouri State Regent, DAR and Mr. Hunter Beckham, President Missouri Society, CAR brought greetings from their respective organizations. The MOSSAR annual meetings have greatly improved the last few years and the meeting this year was again very successful. The July board meeting conducted by President Loker received reports of the NSSAR Congress in Washington, D.C. (Tyson's Corner, Virginia).

The National Society annual dues are increased from \$10 to \$12 effective 1 January 1989. MOSSAR annual dues will remain at \$7. MOSSAR Trustee James A. Shelby was elected vice president general of the South Central District. The MOSSAR Board approved the purchase of a full page SAR magazine advertisement in 1989. The ad to be placed in one of four special centennial editions to be published in 1989 to feature the Missouri Society. The board also approved a contract to publish 300 copies of the Missouri History and Registry of the MOSSAR Centennial. A Centennial Medal is available for purchase, from NSSAR and may be worn by any current SAR member after 1 January 1989. The design of the medal specifically honors the 100 year history of the SAR. Anyone who is a member of the SAR prior to the NSSAR Congress in Louisville in July 1990 is eligible to purchase and wear the medal. The MOSSAR Board met on 29 October at Columbia. Compatriot Gilchrist resigned as treasure and former treasure Roy Hornbuckle will fulfill the unexpired term. The board voted to approve a new chapter at Warrensburg to be named Martin Warren, a Revolutionary War soldier buried in Warrensburg, Charles G. Drake was appointed as organizing president of the new chapter. The Martin Warren chapter was officially chartered on 3 December 1988.

A "Best Chapter" award is in the process of being established. Dr. Clarence Pickard is chairman of the committee and has a goal of initiating the contest effective in April 1989. The next annual meeting of MOSSAR will be held in Springfield hosted by the Ozark Mountain Chapter and the Sgt. Ariel Nims No. One Chapter at Joplin. The meeting will be held on 28-29 April 1989. Planning for the MO-KS 1991 National Congress is continuing on schedule with enthusiasm and vigor. It is envisaged to be the best Congress ever and will commence the first year of the NSSAR Bicentennial.

MISSOURI TRUSTEES OF NATIONAL SOCIETY, SAR

The fifty-ninth Congress of the United States of America passed an act to "incorporate the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution." Section four of said act provided that the property and affairs of said corporation shall be managed by not more than sixty or less than forty trustees, who shall be elected annually at such time as shall be fixed in the by-laws, and at least one trustee shall be elected annually from a list of nominees to be made by each of the state societies. This act of incorporation No. 5181 was approved and signed by President Theodore Roosevelt 9 June 1906. Missouri trustees since then have been:



HISTORY OF THE NATIONAL SOCIETY SAR

The preparation for the celebration of the centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence on 4 July 1776 spread as a wave of patriotic fever throughout the United States. On 22 October 1875 a half dozen men in San Francisco discussed plans for taking part in the 4th of July procession in 1876. They voted to call themselves "The National Society of Sons of Revolutionary Sires." During the fall and winter they met several times and in the Alta, California News of 29 June 1876 they ran a small ad as follows: "The descendants of Revolutionary patriots are requested to meet this evening for the purpose of making arrangements to participate in the celebration." Twenty-four persons were enrolled as original members. They met again at the Palace Hotel on 1 July and accepted an invitation to join the 4th July procession—31 additional names were enrolled. Three members were appointed to obtain 13 banners (one for each original state) and others were to get carriages.

Tuesday July 4th at 9:30 a.m. the Society met at the Palace Hotel. New names were enrolled bringing total membership to over 80 with 10 members being actual sons of

Revolutionary sires.

The detachment joined the public procession and attracted a great deal of attention and was quite successful. The parade over, they returned to the Palace Hotel and it was unanimously resolved to continue the association as a "Society of Sons of Revolutionary Sires." With the exception of the Cincinnati this was the first society in the country whose members were exclusively descendants of Revolutionary sires. The California organization was perfected 11 July 1876 or seven years prior to the formation of any organization in any state.

The California Society grew and prospered, the constitution provided for auxiliary branches, coequal societies and a national representative body. Copies of the constitution were sent out all over the country together with circulars and bulletins.

The California movement excited the East. In 1883 a few men in New York City met and organized an independent society called "Sons of the Revolution" and adopted a constitution providing that societies might be formed in other states, each of which should be an "auxiliary" branch. Then, in 1888, a "Society of Sons of the Revolution" was organized in Philadelpha—refusing to be an auxiliary to New York. Again in 1888 a few New Jersey members of the New York Society proposed to form a New Jersey Society. New York Sons told them they would be recognized as an "auxiliary" and that they had better join New York or Philadelphia Societies—New Jersey then went to work.

On the 30th of April 1789, standing upon the balcony of the Federal Building, fronting Wall Street, in the city of New York, and in the presence of a vast concourse of people. General George Washington took the oath of office as the first president of the United States. This was the grand culmination of the most eventful and important period of 14 years known in the history of this country, since the first settlements were made in what are now the states of Virginia and Massachusetts. Six and one half years of this time had been spent in war, one and a half years in negotiating a treaty of peace at Versailles, France, and six years in calling a national constitutional convention, electing members thereof, the meeting and deliberations of that convention, the adoption of our most wise and beneficial constitution, its ratification by the state bodies and the final election of president, vice president, United States Senators and members of the House of Representatives.

To duly and properly celebrate and commemorate the 100th anniversary of this memorable day, Congress, early in the year 1889, passed an act declaring the 30th of April of that year to be a national holiday and called upon all the people of the United States to join in its observance, and especially provided that a grand procession and

military pageant should take place in the city of New York on that day and pass in view before the president and vice president of the United States, all of the cabinet officers, the justices of the Supreme Court and many other prominent and distinguished persons. Through the effort of our governor, the Honorable David R. Francis, the state of Missouri was well represented on that occasion, by the governor and a large detachment of state troops. The introduction of this bill in Congress suggested to several persons in New York and New Jersey, the desirability of forming, in each state of the union, a society of the sons of the American Revolution.

The event of the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as the first president of the United States stirred patriotic emotions anew, and many descendants of Revolutionary stock in New Jersey organized a "Society of the Sons of the Revolution" on 7 March 1889. This Society passed a resolution that had far reaching results and an action important in the history of the Society. Basically it resolved that the president of this Society and two delegates to the National Society were appointed to a committee to invite a like committee from New York and Pennsylvania Societies to cooperate with them and to meet with descendants of Revolutionary ancestors from different states and assist in organizing Societies whose membership shall be exclusive descendants of Revolutionary statesmen, soldiers and sailors.

In spring of 1889 the New Jersey Society organized state societies of Sons of the Revolution in New Hampshire, Vermont, Delaware, Maryland, Ohio, Indiana, West Virginia, Arkansas, South Carolina, Kentucky and Tennessee. The endeavor was to organize a National Society in which each state would be a coequal and none auxiliary to any other. They did not dream of forming a new organization but to pressure New York to repeal the "auxiliary" article in the constitution.

In the latter part of March 1889, the circular was sent to Governor Francis at Jefferson City. The governor at once sent the same to Josiah Fogg at St. Louis with the following letter:

Executive Department, State of Missouri, Jefferson City April 4, 1889

Josiah Fogg, Esquire, St. Louis, Missouri.

Dear Sir: I am in receipt of a circular and other documents from Mr. William O. McDowell of New Jersey. I forward all these papers to you with the suggestion that there can be no objection to have the organization in St. Louis instead of the capital of the state. If this meets with your approval you may keep these papers for the use of the society to be organized, and should you call a meeting and notify me of the same I will advise all who inquire that the meeting will be in St. Louis.

Respectfully, David R. Francis, Governor

Upon receipt of this letter, Mr. Fogg had the following notice published in the Republic, Globe-Democrat and Post Dispatch:

All descendants of revolutionary soldiers or those who took part in the war for independence are requested to meet at the Laclede Hotel, Saturday evening, April 6th at eight o'clock.

At the appointed hour about a dozen persons came, and, after an exchange of views, it was decided to adjourn and further advertise. At the next meeting a much greater number were present and much interest manifested. A committee was appointed to consider the advisability of organizing a state society and to report on April 23. On this date nearly 50 persons attended and the committee appointed at the previous meeting reported in favor of organizing the Missouri Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and presented a constitution and by-laws. The meeting voted unanimously in favor of organizing the proposed society and adopting the constitution and by-laws as presented. The following officers were elected: President, Josiah Fogg; Secretary, H. J. Bliss; Registrar, John M. Fulton; Treasurer, Dr. Charles E. Briggs. The president stated that it was very important to elect a delegate to meet at Fraunce's Tavern in Broad Street, New York, on the 30th of April to take part in the formation of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. On motion, the Honorable Gaius Paddock was duly elected as said delegate. The selection of Fraunce's Tavern in New York was due to the fact that General Washington bid farewell to the officers of the Continental Army, after peace was declared, at this now historic tavern.

On 10 April 1889 a call was issued by the New Jersey committee inviting delegates from every existing society from all the states and territories to meet at Fraunce's Taverr in New York at 9:00 on 30 April 1889 to organize a National Society with every state entitled to one delegate-at-large and additional delegates based on membership.

Twenty delegates met in New York at Fraunce's Tavern in the same room that George Washington bade farewell to the officers of his army on 3 Dec. 1783. The meeting was called to order and a chairman and secretary were elected. Remarks were made by several, all in favor of organization of a National Society.

A motion was made to proceed and a committee be appointed on constitution and by-laws, and to nominate permanent officers. During the discussion Pennsylvania delegales urged that all societies become "auxiliaries" to New York. Pennsylvania was

asked if her society was auxiliary to New York and she replied no.

The convention then refused point blank to the auxiliary relation with New York. The question "what shall be done?" then arose. After discussion, the convention organized as a national society taking the name "Sons of the American Revolution." The national organization thus began its existence with eighteen state societies while the Sons of the Revolution had only two.

They adopted a constitution and by-laws, and a full slate of national officers. Missouri's delegate, Gaius Paddock, was elected the first Treasurer General of the National Society, and Governor D. R. Francis of Missouri was one of the Vice Presidents. Eighteen states were represented at the 1889 convention. During the period from 1889 to 1900 societies were organized in 37 states, plus the District of Columbia, the territory of Hawaii and the country of France.

When the General Board of Managers of the National Society and the Executive Committee met at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel in Philadelphia on 6 December 1904, inquiry was made as to whether the Society was legally incorporated and the subject was discussed at length. A committee thereupon was appointed to consider and report

on the incorporation of the National Society.

The committee reported at the Sixteenth Congress, in Philadelphia, in 1905, that although at two separate times attempts had been made to incorporate the Society under the laws of Connecticut, the proper steps had not been taken in either case, and that we were simply a voluntary association.

It was then voted that a committee of two be appointed to secure incorporation of the Society under the laws of the District of Columbia; that the same committee be instructed to secure a special charter from the Congress of the United States. The committee prepared the proposed act, submitted it to the Board of Managers, and secured

their approval.

During the first session of the 59th Congress, January 26, 1906, Hon. E. J. Hill, of Connecticut, introduced the bill in House of Representatives and on 6 February 1906 it passed the House. May 23 it passed the Senate, with a slight amendment. On 9 June 1906 it was finally approved by President Theodore Roosevelt, our compatriot.

ALLEN LAWS OLIVER

Allen Laws Oliver, Cape Girardeau, Missouri. Elected President General at Fifty-sixth Congress. Born January 19, 1886, at Jackson, Missouri; graduated Southeast Missouri Teachers College, 1905, summa cum laude, and from University of Missouri, A.B. 1908, LL.E. 1909. Married Olivia Leachman of Prince William County, Virginia, October 28, 1913.

Two sons were born of the marriage: Allen L. Oliver, Jr., A.B. University of Missouri 1936, M.B.A. Harvard 1938, and John Leachman Oliver, A.B. University of Missouri 1938, LL.B. University of Virginia 1941, Captain Infantry, and later, at end of war, J.A.D., numerous decorations, practicing law with Oliver & Oliver.

Mr. Oliver practiced law as a member of the firm of Oliver & Oliver at Cape Girardeau, Missouri, since 1910. Never sought political office. Admitted to bar of United States Supreme Court 1912.

Member Phi Delta Theta and Phi Delta Phi. Later honorary member Mystical Seven. Traveled in Europe, Canada and Mexico. Developed several hundred acres of raw land

into productive farms. Was listed in Social Register of Virginia.

He was active in civic organizations, was an officer in Presbyterian Church more than thirty years. Was a Mason—Knight Templar; was President, Southeast Missouri Council, Boy Scouts of America, and granted Silver Beaver Badge for outstanding service to boyhood in 1936.

In S. A. R. had served as President, Missouri Society; Vice President General South Mississippi District; National Trustee from Missouri, and on Executive Committee several years. His father, Robert Burett Oliver, was a member of Missouri Society, S. A.R.; and his mother, Marie Watkins Oliver, former Regent of Missouri Society, D. A. R.; member Colonial Dames; and she designed and created the official flag of the State of Missouri. Mr. Oliver's wife is a member of the D. A. R. and Colonial Dames.

In Rotary International, Mr. Oliver served as Governor in 1935-36; member of and chairman of numerous committees and was member of Board of Directors 1938-39.

He was Past President Southeast Missouri Teachers College Alumni Association; Past President Missouri University General Alumni Association; Past President of, and one of the Trustees of the Law Foundation, University of Missouri; and member Board of Visitors, University of Missouri.

He organized battalion of the Home Guards in Southeast Missouri during World War I and served as Major thereof; previously having served as an officer in Missouri National Guard. Appointed Colonel on staff of Governor Lloyd C. Stark of Missouri 1937-40. He served as Appeal Agent, Cape Girardeau County, Missouri, during World War II, and was awarded Congressional Medal 1946. Member of Speakers Committee, Missouri Council of Defense; Missouri State Vice President, U. S. O.; Member Executive Committee, Board of Directors, Missouri War Chest; Member Advisory Board to Missouri Development and Resources Commission.

While President of Missouri Bar Association 1943-44, the Missouri Bar Association was given Award of Merit by the American Bar Association for the most outstanding constructive work of any State Bar Association. He was a member of Missouri Bar and American Bar Association, also member House of Delegates of American Bar Association; Member American Judicature Society; member American Academy of Political and Social Science; Member International Association of Insurance Counsel; President Missouri State Chamber of Commerce 1945-46.

Throughout his professional life Mr. Oliver was an active trial lawyer. Compatriot Oliver died 10 February 1970.

Dr. Clark was born in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina; alumnus of Georgia Tech School of Engineering; before coming to Missouri was Vice President of an insurance company in Atlanta, Georgia; served there on numerous boards and engaged in many civic and welfare activities, having been a member of the Park and Recreation Commission of Fulton County; Treasurer for many years of the Atlanta Christian Council (Atlanta Council of Churches) and a member of its Executive Committee; President of the Youth Council of the city; Treasurer and President of the Atlanta Sunday School Superintendents Association; an organizer of and an officer in the Association of Grand Jurors of Fulton County; a member of the Security Panel of the Aircraft War Production Council (New York) during World War II.

Dr. Clark came to The School of the Ozarks in 1946 as Vice President; became President of The School of the Ozarks in 1952; initiated both the two-year and four-year college programs of The School of the Ozarks and brought The School into regional accreditation; was ordained a minister in the Presbyterian Church, U.S., in 1950; served as Moderator of Lafayette Presbytery and Moderator of the Synod of Missouri

(Presbyterian U.S.).

Arthur Mansfield King was born in 1902 at LeRoy, Illinois, and graduated from the University of Illinois with a Bachelor of Science degree in Commerce and Law in 1928, the same year in which he married Miss Berdena Lee, of El Paso, Illinois. The couple celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary, in November, 1978, at their home in Weatherby Lake, Platte County, where they have resided since 1962.

A descendant of Samuel Mansfield, a fifer, Maryland, and Dan King, Private, Connecticut, who answered the Lexington Alarm, FPG King has twenty-two supplementals!

He joined the Delaware Crossing Chapter, Kansas Society, in 1963 serving as Chapter Vice President and two terms as Chapter President, following which he served as President of the Kansas State Society. His National service, prior to his election at the 90th Annual Congress in Dallas in 1980, included Vice President General of the South Central District, and two terms as Secretary General, immediately prior to becoming President General. He also served on the Executive and other committees.

His honors include the Minuteman Medal, the Patriot Medal, Silver Good Citizenship Medal, and Law Enforcement Commendation Medal. At the 91st Annual Congress, he received the Gold Good Citizenship Medal from FPG Richard H. Thompson, Jr. For bringing in 40 new members, he has received the National Membership Plaque

twice, the Silver Membership Plaque, and the Gold Membership Plaque.

Berdena King. who is an active member in the DAR, received the SAR Certificate of Commendation at the Oklahoma City Congress. She subsequently joined with her husband in establishing the Arthur M. and Berdena King SAR-DAR Membership Comparison Awards, providing for \$1,000 cash awards to (a) the State Society having the highest percentage of SAR State Society membership when compared to the total DAR membership in its State, and (b) the largest percentage increase in the ratio of SAR to DAR membership among State Societies, during the year preceding each April 1st.

First awards were presented at the Dallas Congress, along with a customized gavel with a gold identification band to (a) The Delaware Society, and (b) the Nevada Society. Funding for continuation of the competition in perpetuity was provided by FPG and

Mrs. King by a gift of public utility stock to the NSSAR.

In 1931, he obtained the National Trustees' acceptance of the Eagle Scout Scholarship program originated by the Delaware Crossing Chapter of the Kansas Society. This program, funded by the NSSAR Eagle Scout Scholarship Foundation, has developed into the most beneficial activity of the National Society. The Foundation, from its investments of over \$125,000, and donations, gives a first place award of \$4,000, a second place award of \$1,000, and pays the recipient and his family's expenses to the Con-

gress.

Recognizing the need for more effective office space in which to consolidate the Headquarters staff, FPG and Mrs. King funded the construction of an addition to the first floor of the National Headquarters building. This building, named the "Arthur and Berdena King Computer Center," was dedicated on June 1, 1985.

In 1987 it became obvious that the rapidly expanding library of the National Society was in need of a vault for rare books and manuscripts. Through the generosity of Arthur and Berdena King this was made possible. The vault was built with compact shelves on movable tracks providing maximum utilization of space. The new library

vault was dedicated 27 February 1988.

Compatriot King believed that the Missouri Society should have Chapters in the Western part of the State and turned his attention to this problem soon after the 1981 Congress. The William C. Corum Chapter was chartered in Liberty, September 26, 1981, and was soon followed by Chapters in Richmond, Chillicothe, Independence, Platte County and Kansas City. These Chapters have provided the membership growth, so needed, by the State Society, and the individuals who have made the Missouri Society a more effective organization.

This attention to Missouri Society progress has decreased the time available for National service, which is limited this year to Chairman, National Headquarters Committee; Acting Chairman, Permanent Fund Committee; member Nominating Committee, Finance Committee, and Coordinating Committee for Headquarters Utilization.

Compatriot King had two dissimilar business careers—both successful—prior to retirement from the second one in 1968. His first began in 1928 with the A&P Tea Company and ended in 1952 when he resigned as Superintendent of the Kansas City Division to enter the real estate development industry as Executive Vice President of a real estate company.

The high point of his second career was his recognition, in the fifties, that Platte and Clay Counties needed a shopping center if the area was to have adequate facilities.

Compatriot King spearheaded the acquisition of the site and the construction of the Antioch Shopping Center, in Kansas City North, having more than a million square feet of office, retail and service business space and serving nearly 300,000 residents of residential developments.

He found builders and helped them obtain land and financing, thus enhancing business opportunities for shopping center tenants, which include branches of national retailers and downtown Kansas City dry goods, food and other establishments.

He has served as Director and Treasurer of the Kansas City Real Estate Board, and director of an insurance company, a stock brokerage corporation, a mutual fund, a

mortgage loan company, and a bank.

His civic contributions include five terms (a total of ten years) as Mayor of Weatherby Lake, an organizer and a director of the Platte County Business and Professional Association, a director of the Platte County Industrial Development Authority, and a director of Junior Achievement.

FPG King is a Presbyterian, Knight Templar, Shriner, Acacian, member of the Order of Pythagoras, and the Tribe of Illini. His memberships in hereditary organizations include the Order of Americans of Amorial Ancestry, the Society of the Descendants of the Founders of Hartford, the Society of the Descendants of Colonial Clergy, the Huguenot Society, the General Society of Colonial Wars, the General Society of the War of 1812, Sons of the Revolution, the First Families of Ohio, and the Gavel Society.

To show their appreciation for Compatriot King's support, the Missouri Society has made him an Honorary Vice President. Without his help, the Society would not have grown and prospered as it has to date.

Chapter Histories

CHRISTOPHER CASEY CHAPTER

During the annual meeting of the Missouri Society on Saturday, March 21, 1985, at Columbia, Missouri, the newly installed State President, Col. James A. Shelby, was approached by Compatriot K. C. Jones of Jefferson City. He stated that he wanted to start an SAR Chapter in Jefferson City. In May 1985 a meeting was arranged at the Jefferson City County Club hosted by Compatriot K. C. Jones that included former State President Charles Wollard, State President James A. Shelby, Gary Beahan and Duncan Kincheloe III.

This initial meeting and discussion determined that there was an excellent opportunity to establish a chapter.

With preliminary plans for organizing, it was agreed that K. C. Jones would be the organizing President and that the chapter would take the name of Christopher Casey. This patriot, Christopher Casey, is buried in the City Cemetery on the Gordon lot in Jefferson City. Christopher Casey was born ca. 1755/62 and died August 2, 1840. His Revolutionary War service was in South Carolina. Patriot Casey married Sarah Smith and has pension no. 29683 in the National Archives records.

The next meeting was held on June 10, 1985, with K. C. Jones and it was decided to arrange a meeting at the Thomas Jefferson Library on Saturday, June 15. It was further agreed on to coordinate with the Jane Randolph Jefferson Chapter of the DAR to make contact with potential members.

Compatriot Jones continued to organize for recruiting new members and processing their applications until he attained fifteen members. By October the minimum number was reached and on the 24th of October, 1985, the Christopher Casey Chapter received its charter from President Shelby. The names of the charter members are as follows: August Fredrick Barnhouse, Gary William Beahan, Herbert Lee Capps, Charles Joseph Hitz, John Robert Howland, Miller Thomas Hunter, Kleber Conway Jones, Jr., Gordon Wendel Jones, Rev. Charles Leo Kepler, Russell P. Keyes, Duncan E. Kincheloe, III, Jeffrey Kyle Morse, Steven Vincent Morse, Hugo Vernel Ochsner, Francis Wimmial Quick, John Clifford Scruggs, Dr. Dudley Thompson, Cullen Hoyt Wilson.

Other major activities include the following: April 25/26, 1986, the Missouri Society Annual Meeting and South Central District Meeting of the SAR was held in Jefferson City. The Christopher Casey Chapter members assisted with the local arrangements and special events. The Chapter held monthly meetings with many spent in work meetings on preparation of membership papers for various prospective members.

In March 1986 a Law Enforcement Commendation and Medal was presented to

Retired Captain of the Highway Patrol, Oliver C. Schepers.

In May 1986 President K. C. Jones represented the SAR at the Lincoln University Annual ROTC Awards Day and presented the SAR award to the outstanding first year advanced course cadet who showed all around excellence in the ROTC program and who maintained a high degree of scholarship. Cadet Patrick E. Hollis was the recipient. On June 11, 1986, in behalf of MOSSAR and in appreciation of the "Year of the Flag" President Jones present Missouri Governor Ashcroft a 13 star Betsy Ross Flag to be flown at the State Capitol on June 14 (Flag Day). A delegation of SAR Compatriots and local DAR members accompanied President Jones.

Many of the activities held by the Christopher Casey Chapter have been held jointly with the Jane Randolph Jefferson Chapter of the DAR. On Independence Day, July 4, 1986, the chapter held a Grave Marker Ceremony at the Woodlawn and Old City Cemetery and dedicated a marker at the grave of Patriot Christopher Casey. In September 1986 Jefferson City Mayor George Hartsfield signed a proclamation making September 17 Constitution Day and as a part of the celebration there was a joint SAR-DAR booth set up at the Capitol Mall where information was put on display concerning the two organizations. Pamphlets were handed out and interested potential members were asked to identify themselves so they could be put on our mailing lists.

In October 1986 a joint barbecue was held at McClung Park commemorating the

first anniversary of the Christopher Casey Chapter.

On November 11, 1986, there was a wreath placement ceremony presented jointly by the SAR and DAR chapters. Wreaths were placed on the graves of Patriots Christopher Casey and John Gordon.

Other activities of the Christopher Casey Chapter include the following: SAR marker was placed on the grave of Patriot John Gordon. For two years running the chapter has sponsored an Eagle scout who has won the Missouri State Contest. A Law Enforcement Commendation and Medal were presented to Deputy Sheriff Don Schulte. A Law Enforcement Medal was presented to Missouri State Water Patrol Captain Richard Swineberg. A Law Enforcement Medal was presented to Jefferson City Policewoman Peggy Quigg. The Betsy Ross Flag has flown at the State Capitol for three consecutive years and has attracted considerable attention from the news media.

The Christopher Casey Chapter, although a young chapter in the Missouri Society SAR, has a good basis for continued success. It has every reason to believe that it will

become one of the leading chapters in the state.

During the late 1970s, Compatriot Dr. M. Graham Clark, E.D.D., L.L.D. of the School of the Ozarks, had become very concerned with the lack of expansion of the Missouri Society. Up to that point, the Missouri Society, in the viewpoint of several national officers, "Had not done anything, we don't even know why they exist." Compatriot Clark, not one to incur these offerings without result, contacted several members-at-large throughout central Missouri in order to stimulate formation of a chapter in the area. Among those contacted were:

Compatriot Lowell Cary Bankhead of Higbee, Missouri Compatriot Paul W. Bennett of Vandalia Compatriot William Gordon Buckner of Marshall Compatriot Allan B. Burdick of Columbia Compatriot Charles W. Elsea of Marshall Compatriot Dr. Clifton D. Gray, Jr., of Marshall Compatriot Edward S. Gray of Jefferson City Compatriot Francis L. Stubbs of Columbia Compatriot Max S. Woods of Columbia Compatriot Marvin Shamburger of Columbia

Former President-General Clark, Compatriot Wade K. Forman, then President MOSSAR, and Compatriot Merrill D. Berekeley, then Registrar MOSSAR, met with Cary Bankhead and asked him to spearhead an organizational meeting to start forming a chapter. The organizational meeting was held on January 15, 1980, in Columbia. A steering committee was formed, and they worked through the spring of 1980 and petitioned the State Society to form a chapter. At the annual State Society meeting of September 27, 1980, approval was given to form the Chapter. Due to business commitments, Compatriot Bankhead removed himself from the organizational structure. President Seth Caperton contacted Compatriots Gordon Buckner and Ed Gray to see if they would continue organizational activities. Throughout the fall and winter of 1980, Compatriot Buckner worked to make a cohesive organization of the local membership. Finally, on March 10, 1981, another organizational meeting was held in Columbia. Acting President Buckner opened the floor for the election of new officers with the following results:

Wm. Gordon Buckner - President Charles Wayne Elsea - Vice President Edward S. Gray - Secretary-Treasurer Francis L. Stubbs - Registrar Floyd D. Reece - Chaplain

President Buckner suggested that since the State Society was meeting on March 14th (four days hence), the Chapter should have a name. Several names were suggested, among them were Yorktown, Boonslick, Kaskaskia and Central Missouri. It had been previously decided by the organizational committee that the Chapter would not be named after someone's relative. It was then noted that because of Dr. Clark's hard work that this meeting had come to fruition, it was decided to name the Chapter the "M. Graham Clark" Chapter. The vote was unanimous.

On April 25, 1981, the Charter of the M. Graham Clark Chapter was presented to the Chapter. Dr. M. Graham Clark installed the officers of the Chapter. Compatriot Allan B. Burdick was elected Secretary-Treasurer as Compatriot Edward Gray had moved to Illinois earlier that month. With seventeen signatures the final charter presentation was made on September 11, 1981. The Flags used at the presentation ceremony were presented to the Chapter inabsentia by Compatriots David Judson Gray (currently

President - Massachusetts Society) and his brother Edward Gray (currently Registrar-Missouri Society) in memory of their father, the Rev. Dr. Clifton Daggett Gray, Jr.,

who had passed away prior to the formation of the chapter.

In early 1982, sufficient business justified separating the duties of Secretary-Treasurer into separate offices. Compatriot Harold D. Buell was elected as Secretary for the 1982-1983 term, a post he held until succeeding to the Presidency on March 12, 1988. The Chapter officers for 1982-1983 were as follows:

During the '82-83 season, meetings were held throughout Columbia. It was determined that if one meeting location could be chosen then recruitment might be made easier. This problem was resolved when the banquet room of the Howard Johnson's Restaurant was selected.

Officers for the M. Graham Clark Chapter for the 1983-1984 Chapter Year were as follows:

These officers remained in place for the 1984-1985 year with addition of Compatriot Rev. Earl Clayton "Chappie" Grandstaff as Chaplain and Compatriot Dr. Clarence

Mott "Jack" Pickard as Registrar-Genealogist.

Several highlights during Dr. Stubbs' Presidency include the selection of Eagle Scout Gregory F. Lauf of Jefferson City as the Eagle Scout award winner. Eagle Scout Lauf was also selected as the Missouri Society winner and received the Bronze Eagle Trophy at the State Society meeting on March 31, 1984. Two SAR Law Enforcement Awards were presented on May 17, 1984, to Sergeant Steve Stephens of the Columbia Police Department and to Sergeant Ellis Peoples of the Missouri Department of Corrections.

On February 16, 1985, Dr. M. Graham Clark, Former President General, installed the officers for the 1985-1986 year. They were:

During Dr. Pickard's first year stewardship of the M. Graham Clark Chapter, many events were held. Among them were: Eagle Scout Bruce Smith of Sedalia, Missouri, was awarded the Bronze Good Citizenship Medal and the NSSAR Certificate on March 16, 1985. On September 28, 1985, Dr. Harold D. Buell, our Compatriot and Secretary, was awarded the SAR Law Enforcement Commendation Medal for his services to the State of Missouri, Department of Corrections. During the '85-86 year, Compatriot Frank Stubbs was appointed Program Chairman and arranged several excellent programs of interest.

Among them were: Dr. Frederick Spiegel, an authority on the Supreme Court and Constitutional Law; Mr. William Crawford, President of the Boone County Historical Society; and Professor Ralph Lauert of the Department of Education at the University of Missouri. Dr. Stubbs also received the SAR Meritorious Medal awarded by the Missouri Society, by state president Charles Wollard.

Some of the highlights of Dr. Pickard's second term of office included the election of Rev. Dr. E. C. Grandstaff as the State Chaplain of the Missouri Society. Included in the programs were: Dr. Robert Bray, Professor of Archaeology; Erica Pickard who spoke on Paul Revere and colonial silver; and Col. James Shelby, then President of the Missouri Society, who

spoke of the lost State of Franklin.

On March 7, 1987, the same slate of officers that was elected for 1986-1987 was reinstalled as officers for the 1987-1988 year. WILLIAM C. CORUM CHAPTER

The William C. Corum Chapter of the sons of the American Revolution, was organized on September 26, 1981. The meeting was called to order at nine a.m. at the Liberty Hills Country Club by Former President General of the National Society Arthur M. King, who shepherded the proceedings throughout the entire organizational procedure.

Many National and State notables were in attendance to carry out the mission of organizing a new Chapter. Besides Former President General Arthur M. King, those present were: Rylen M. Rudy, Secretary of the Missouri Society; G. Arthur Luther, Historian General, National Society; Burton Mayfield, President of the Missouri Society; Merrill D. Berkeley, Vice President of the Missouri Society; Boaz Padon, Treasurer of the Kansas Society; Robert O. Dickey, President of the Kansas Society; Jack Bayne, President of the Delaware Crossing Chapter, Kansas State Society.

The officers elected to office during the organizational meeting were elected by acclamation: R. Kenneth Elliott, President; John M. Mason, Sr., Secretary; John B. Wymore, Vice President; William E. Eldridge, Registrar; Kenneth R. Corum, Genealogist; Kirk McDaniel, Jr., Historian; J. David Goodell, Publicity; and Arthur M.

King, Honorary Vice President.

William C. Corum was born in 1760 in Virginia. His father, John, was a native of England, his mother was Nancy Cookskin. He went to North Carolina, where he worked as a trader and teamster, and served in the Revolution from that state as a wagoneer in the Commander-in-Chief's Guard from 1 April 1778 through 4 June 1783, by which time he had advanced to the rate of sergeant. He met Barsheba Bloyd in Somerset County, Maryland, married her, and migrated to Green County, Kentucky, where several of their children were born. In 1818 the family migrated to Cooper County, Missouri, and later moved to Clay County. By 1842 lands patented in his and his sons' names totaled more than 1300 acres. William and Barsheba are buried in a family cemetery with 20 marked gravestones and many plain field stones, located west of Liberty behind a modern farmhouse. On 18 October 1981, celebrating the Bicentennial of the Battle of Yorktown, our chapter joined the Alexander Doniphan Chapter, DAR, in dedicating a grave marker in the old Corum Cemetery for William Corum.

Interest and discovery of Compatriot William C. Corum came about largely by the efforts of Kenneth R. Corum, who is a direct descendant of William C. Corum, and his wife, Amy. It was through their genealogical research that William C. Corum was discovered, and the combination of the Alexander Doniphan Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Corum family, and many interested individuals, that the William C. Corum Chapter came into being.

Judge R. Kenneth Elliott, who transferred from the Delaware Crossing Chapter KSSAR, was elected by acclamation as first president of the chapter. Arthur M. King, immediate Past President General of the National Society SAR, was the organizing officer, and presided at the organizational meeting held at the Liberty Hills Country Club. Mr. King introduced several SAR dignitaries present, and the newly-elected officers were installed by MOSSAR President Burton Mayfield. Charter members included transfers from the Delaware Crossing Chapter, and MOSSAR members-at-large, as well as new members recruited from DAR families in the area. Over the years members have been gained through publicity and individual recruitment. Many of our members have transferred out of the chapter to form the nucleus of additional chapters—Joseph Morgan Chapter, in Platte City; Harry S. Truman Chapter, in Independence; and John Wollard Chapter in Richmond.

Chapter meetings are breakfast meetings on the second Saturday of each month, usually at the Liberty Hills Country Club. Consistently outstanding programs have been enjoyed, and we join with the Alexander Doniphan Chapter DAR in annual dinner or luncheon meetings in November. The Bicentennial of the United States Constitution has been the theme for many recent programs. The chapter obtained a set of Bicentennial "Blessings of Liberty" posters for public display. They were on exhibit during Constitution Month, 1987, in the Clay County Justice Center and Administration Building.

A letter from the Kansas City Chapter dated 4 April 1904 addressed to the Missouri Society (presumably the President) stated:

The local chapter of the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution seems to have fallen into a state of "innocuious disuetude" during the last five years, and the fact that there has been no meeting during the last three years, and no election held or any interest manifested towards keeping the chapter alive. We have taken it upon ourselves to make an effort looking toward the revival of interest in the Chapter and the Order. We believe that with a united effort of those whose names are on the roll there can be added at least fifty names during the present year. We ought to be patriots indeed as well as in name and believing that our chapter can be revived by proper effort being put forth earnestly ask you to put aside all other business and pleasure for an evening and meet with us

on Tuesday evening April 12, at Board Rooms Public Library Building, 9th and Locust St. In order that we may devise ways and means looking to the welfare and upbuilding of our chapter.

In 1904 the Chapter membership was listed as 40 and St. Louis 80. A letter of 25 April 1906 from Chapter Secretary F. C. Spalding to Mr. Lincoln M. Stearns of St. Louis, Missouri, Society Secretary, in reply to a request for chapter officers stated that a meeting was held on 19 April. The meeting was so poorly attended that another meeting will be scheduled later at which time officers for the year will be elected. Secretary Spalding stated it is almost impossible for the chapter to induce members to come to the meetings. The officers elected last year (1905) were listed as: President, George P. Gross; First Vice President, W. H. Williams; Second Vice President, Major Albion P. Pease; Treasurer, W. H. H. Tainter; Registrar, George R. Jones; Historian, Prof. James M. Greenwood; Secretary, F. C. Spalding; and the office of Chaplain was vacant.

Missouri Society letter of 13 July 1907 to the Secretary General gave a report of officers. Kansas City Chapter officers were the same as listed above for 1905 and 1906 except for Chaplain, Rev. John H. Crum was listed.

In 1908 only 14 State Societies had more than one chapter-Missouri was one of

them. National dues were fifty cents.

On 10 February 1909 the Missouri Secretary Adreon wrote to the Kansas City Chapter Secretary F. C. Spalding requesting how many members were on the chapter rolls. Informing Secretary Spalding that the Missouri Society understands that the Kansas City Chapter has not been very active in recent years but since Missouri is very desirous of seeing them on their feet once more and will gladly carry with the National Society the number of members enrolled by paying the annual dues for a year. On 2 March 1909 Wm. H. H. Tainter wrote to Missouri Secretary Adreon in reply for Kansas City Secretary Spalding that conditions, as to the chapter, remain the same as one year ago. Compatriot Tainter stated that within the year he may sever his connections with the Kansas City Chapter. Also that his late resignation as Chapter Treasurer has not been accepted. A letter of 2 February 1912 from the Kansas City Chapter President George P. Gross to Wm, H. H. Tainter thanking him for representing the Kansas City Chapter at the special meeting of the Board of Managers. President Gross also stated that "I was never so handicapped in my life, with no books and no officers that I can depend on." That he hoped to soon get a quorum and elect officers and try to infuse new life into the organization. Also that the Board of Managers was very kind to remit the Kansas City delinquent dues. The last mention of the Kansas City Chapter is in October of 1922, with the National Secretary asking "What is the trouble there? Are the members dropping out? Can you revive interest in the Chapter there?" Apparently the Kansas City Chapter became inactive because of no interest shown by members; meetings not scheduled or attended; members not paying dues; the older members dying off and just general attrition over the years. After 1922 we have found no mention again of the Kansas City Chapter.

LEWIS AND CLARK EXPEDITION CHAPTER

The Lewis and Clark Expedition Chapter of the Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution, was organized largely through the efforts of Compatriot Luther J. Shobe of Chillicothe, Missouri. Compatriot Shobe, a professional engineer and a native of Henry County, Missouri, commenced in his attempt to organize a local chapter of the S.A.R. in Chillicothe during the spring of 1981. Compatriot Shobe spent many hours assisting potential members in researching their genealogical background and in preparing application papers. Compatriot Shobe's efforts paid off and on 10 July 1982 the Chapter Charter was presented. The Charter members are listed below.

The name of the chapter was selected for those two great explorers Captain Meriwether Lewis and William Clark. President Jefferson chose these two men to blaze a new trail to the Pacific Ocean and strengthen the claims of the United States to the Oregon country, stimulate a new extensive fur trading era in the West. Also to establish peaceful relations with the Indian tribes along the route, prepare the way for commerce and to gather and record information on geography, mineral resources and animal and plant life. The great historical expedition of these two men seems appropriate to name

the new chapter Lewis and Clark Expedition.

The chapter was the sixth chapter organized in the Missouri Society and the first to be located north of the Missouri River in the state. The chapter is small but quite active in the support of S.A.R. programs. In 1988 the chapter honored three Eagle Scouts at a chapter meeting by presenting the chapter winner, Donald J. Weymouth of Maryville, a bronze Good Citizenship medal and certificate plus \$25.00; first runnerup Brent Johnson \$15.00; and second runnerup Wesley Dunne \$10.00. The chairman of the Eagle Scout Committee is Compatriot Vincent Moore, a Boy Scout leader in this area for a long time and highly recognized for his efforts in scouting and also his talks to organizations about the Sons of the American Revolution.

The chapter is presenting a film to the local library—one that shows the many flags that have flown over our country at one time or the other. We have conducted meetings with the local D.A.R. Chapter Olive Prindle and have presented other patriot pro-

grams.

Although the chapter is a relatively new chapter it was honored to host the Annual Meeting of the Missouri Society on 30 March 1984, less than two years after receiving our charter. The chapter is small and young but has a lot of potential and expects to not only grow but to retain our membership in the years ahead.

ALEXANDER MAJORS CHAPTER

Chartered on the 28th of August, 1984, the Alexander Majors Chapter of the Missouri Society, SAR, was named after the founder of the Great Western Freighting Company bearing his name. Majors' grandfather, Beal Kelly, had served in the Revolutionary War. Thus, Majors fit the qualifications for membership in our society.

Starting in 1846 with six wagons and the necessary oxen to draw them, the first trek was made from Westport, Mo., to Santa Fe, N.M. By the early 1850s, the firm of Russell-Majors-Waddell employed 4,000 men and 3,000 wagons hauling freight to the West. Later, other far flung enterprises included the Overland Stagecoach Lines to Denver and Salt Lake City, and the Pony Express from St. Joseph, Mo., to Sacramento, Ca.

The development of the western half of America can be in a large part attributed to our chapter's namesake. He and his firm exerted great influence on establishing Kansas City's commercial destiny and on promoting the morals and principles upon which this nation was founded.

The first meetings, in 1984, were held at the restored Alexander Majors home at 83rd Street and State Line Road. This white antebellum farmhouse, erected in 1856, sits with distinction, facing westward, overlooking land once owned by Alexander Majors. Because of lack of facilities, it was impractical to hold regular meetings at this location and meeting attendance dwindled. Some members transferred to more active chapters in the greater Kansas City area and a few were dropped for non-payment of dues.

During 1985, the chapter was generally inactive, and it had only four active members on its roster.

In August 1986, MOSSAR President James A. Shelby appointed Marvin D. Vawter as Interim President and charged him with responsibility for rebuilding the chapter. On Nov. 8, the first meeting of 1986 was held at the Vawter Home. From that date until mid-1987, regular meetings were held the second Saturday morning of each month at the Vawter Home.

Since August 8, 1987, meetings have been held on the second Saturday morning of each month at Hillcrest Country Club. In addition to the regular business meeting, interesting and informative guest speakers have been provided at each meeting. Attendance at each meeting now averages twenty-five members and guests.

During 1988, the chapter has won the Performance Award at the 1988 George Washington's Birthday Luncheon, had seven participants in the Eagle Scout Scholarship Contest, presented eight ROTC Medals and presented the Law Enforcement Award to Norman A. Caron, former Police Chief of Kansas City, Mo.

JOSEPH MORGAN CHAPTER

The Joseph Morgan Chapter of MOSSAR had its beginning at a preliminary organization meeting May 7, 1983, at the K.C. Airport Holiday Inn in Platte County. Nineteen people were present, and the speaker and organizer was Arthur M. King, Honorable Vice President of the Missouri Society SAR and Former President General of the National SAR.

The new chapter was named for Joseph Morgan who was born in Rome, Italy, in 1739 and died in Platte County, Missouri, in 1841 at the age of 102. He had married Jenny McEwen who was born in Ireland in 1762 and died in 1845 in Platte County. They are both buried in the Riverview Cemetery, Platte City. Joseph Morgan served in the French Army, and he was present at the surrender of the British Army at Yorktown. After the war he returned to France but later came back to the United States to make his home. Because he served in the French Army, his application for a pension was turned down by the American government. He is the only known Revolutionary War veteran buried in Platte County. The chapter is happy to have three descendants of this soldier as members.

The new organization continued to meet monthly, and by August meeting the chapter application was completed. On October 15, 1983, Missouri State Society President Charles Calef presented the group with a charter from the state society. He also installed the following officers; President, O. V. Cecil; 1st Vice President, Kirk McDaniel; 2nd Vice President, Craig Uncapher; Secretary-Treasurer, Duncan E. Kincheloe Jr.; and Chaplain, John Pasley. Former President General Arthur M. King was named Honorary Vice President. There were eight charter members. Other charter members included Charles M. Johnson and Eugene W. Hoy. The new chapter had decided to meet once a month at 9:00 a.m. at the K.C. Airport Holiday Inn. The time was later changed to 8:00 a.m. on the third Saturday of each month.

On November 19, 1983, the new chapter had a joint meeting with the Platte Purchase Chapter of the D.A.R. At this meeting Compatriot John Pasley reported on the research he and his wife had done on the life of Joseph Morgan. Descendants of Morgan presented the chapter with its official flag. In December 1983 the meeting place was changed from the Holiday Inn to the K.C.I. Best Western Motel which is

nearby.

In January 1984 the chapter presented its first Good Citizenship Award to Eagle Scout Ron Lunt. He read his essay on "The Battle of King's Mountain." He went on to represent the chapter in the state essay contest. The February meeting was a joint meeting with the White Aloe Chapter of the D.A.R. of Parkville, Platte County.

On August 16, 1984, the chapter met for their regular meeting, then they motored to the Platte City Riverview Cemetery to place a Revolutionary War marker on the grave of Joseph Morgan. John Pasley and Darwin Martin, two direct descendants, spoke at

the ceremony. Other descendants were also present.

At the September meeting, the following took office for the coming year, 1985: President, Craig Uncapher, 1st Vice President, Duncan E. Kincheloe Jr.; 2nd Vice President, Charles M. Johnson; Secretary, Roy F. Hornbuckle; Treasurer, Darwin W. Martin; Chancellor, Donald Witt; Chaplain, John Pasley; and Sergeant-of-Arms, Donald McAdow.

In February 1985 the Joseph Morgan Chapter presented a Law Enforcement Award to Cpl. Phil Carter of the Platte County Sheriff's Department. Eagle Scout Steven Wyatt received the Good Citizenship Award in recognition of his outstanding record in scouting and community service. His essay on Americanism was entered in the state S.A.R. essay contest.

Compatriot Dr. Raymond J. Felling died in Weston July 5, 1985. He was known for

his work with the Weston Museum and articles on local history. He had planned to publish these articles. His wife hopes to complete this project. The Morgan Chapter made a contribution to the Weston Historical Museum in memory of Dr. Felling.

Officers for 1986 were installed in December 1985. They were President, Craig Uncapher; Vice President, Darwin Martin; Secretary, Roy F. Hornbuckle; Treasurer, Charles M. Johnson; Chaplain, John Pasley; Chancellor, Donald Witt; and Sergeant-of-Arms, Donald McAdow. In January 1986 Mr. Ralph Bunnell gave the chapter a set of flags of the American Revolution. This flag arrangement is displayed at each monthly meeting. Eagle Scout Chris Byrd was presented the Good Citizenship Award in February 1986.

One of the highlights of the monthly meetings during the period 1985-1987 has been a report by the president of what happened in our country 200 years ago in that month.

The annual Law Enforcement Award was given to Platte County Sheriff, Tom Thomas, who had served the county since 1968. During the May meeting Judge John Yeaman was presented the Silver Citizenship Medal for his service as Circuit Court Judge for over twenty years. In June 1986 Frances Hornbuckle, wife of Compatriot Roy Hornbuckle, was presented the Martha Washington Award for her outstanding service to the chapter. Compatriot Don McAdow, Sergeant-of-Arms, was presented a Meritorious Service Award for being at every meeting and having the room ready each month. Mrs. Mary Burt was presented a Distinguished Service Award. She has been very helpful with many of the membership applications. In 1986 the President, Craig Uncapher, became a National Trustee for Missouri.

During 1987 the Joseph Morgan Chapter placed four kiosks on display which showed sixteen facets of the development of the Constitution in 1787. This display was used by schools as well as being put on display in various public places. The chapter started placing the S.A.R. Magazine in the county libraries. A patron generously donated the subscriptions to make this possible. The new officers for 1987 were as follows: President, Duncan E. Kincheloe Jr.; 1st Vice President, Darwin W. Martin; 2nd Vice President, Roy Hornbuckle; Secretary, T. J. Beach; Treasurer, Charles M. Johnson; Chancellor, Donald Witt; Chaplain, John Pasley; and Sergeant-of-Arms, Donald

McAdow.

On February 17, 1987, the Morgan Chapter met with three other Missouri chapters in the Kansas City area for the first joint meeting celebrating the birthday of George Washington. It was held at the Hillcrest Country Club with Compatriot Paul T. Butler, State Secretary of MOSSAR as the main speaker. Special awards were presented to R. Crosby Kemper, James H. Hale, Joe McGuff and Chief Justice of the Missouri Supreme Court, Andrew J. Higgins.

During the June 1987 meeting Compatriot Roy Hornbuckle was elected to fill the office of President since Compatriot Duncan E. Kincheloe was unable to serve. In August Compatriot John Pasley was installed as a new Vice President, and Compatriot Darwin Martin became the new Chaplain. The chapter voted during the August meeting to

change the meeting place to the Sheridan Airport Inn.

In September 1987 the Morgan Chapter had a joint meeting with the Platte Purchase Chapter of the D.A.R. Mr. Larry Drunert of the Missouri Highway Patrol received the Law Enforcement Award. Compatriot Lawrence Loker of the Truman Chapter in Independence portrayed George Washington and was the main speaker of the joint meeting.

In January 1988 the new chapter officers were installed: President, Roy F. Hornbuckle; 1st Vice President, Gerald Hart; 2nd Vice President, Elmer C. Campbell; Secretary, T. J. Beach; Treasurer, Charles M. Johnson; Chancellor, Donald A. Witt; Charles Donald A. Witt; Charles Donald Donald A. Witt;

Chaplain, Darwin W. Martin; and Sergeant-of-Arms, Eugene W. Hoy.

The second Washington's Birthday celebration was held at the Hillcrest Country Club in Kansas City on February 20, 1988. At this meeting were five area chapters: Alexander Majors, Harry S. Truman, William Corum, Delaware Crossing and Joseph Morgan. They heard attorney Norman Gordon speak on the influence of George Washington on the Constitutional Convention. Special awards went to Mr. Charles Kimball of Midwest Research Institute, and Dr. Gordon Kingsley, President of William Jewell College.

The Joseph Morgan Chapter will soon finish its first five years. It now has twentynine members of which several are serving on the state level. Compatriot Craig Uncapher is now the State President and Compatriot Roy Hornbuckle is the State Treasurer. The chapter faces the future with many prospects and the opportunity to serve the community through a patriot organization.

SGT. ARIEL NIMS CHAPTER NO. ONE, JOPLIN, MISSOURI

On May 29, 1976, several SAR compatriots gathered in Joplin, Missouri, to sign a petition requesting permission to form the first local chapter of MOSSAR. Fourteen years ago, in 1975, there were no local SAR chapters in the State of Missouri. Those signing that petition were: Roland T. Smith, M.D., William H. Nims, Jr., William H. Nims, III, Kenneth A. Nims, Lloyd D. Lewis, II, Orville L. Youngblood, Stewart W. Miller, Robert F. Winegar, Richard C. Winegar, John F. Fix, Stephen R. Satterlee, and Giltner B. Stephens. On the same date, Robert F. Winegar and Stewart Miller presented the petition to the officers of MOSSAR at their annual meeting being held at The School of the Ozarks, Point Lookout, Missouri.

The State Society approved the petition and directed compatriot Robert F. Winegar, a Vice-President of MOSSAR at the time, to hold an organizational meeting for the purpose of electing officers and selecting a name for the first local SAR chapter in the State of Missouri to be located in Joplin. The officers of MOSSAR approved the name of the chapter as: "The Sgt. Ariel Nims Chapter No. One, of Joplin, MO." The charter was issued May 29, 1976, signed by John W. Hillemeyer, President of the Missouri Society, SAR, and by William E. Vesser, Secretary, MOSSAR.

On Saturday, July 17, 1976, at a luncheon meeting of the Missouri Society held in the Ramada Inn, Joplin, the officers of the State Society presented the charter to the Sgt. ACTIVITIES OF THE CHAPTER

William L. Wood

Law Enforcement Commendation Medals were awarded to Compatriot Richard L. Yohe in 1985, and to Sgt. George H. Gruenwald in 1987. In 1988 this medal was awarded to State Trooper Allen D. Hines, who was wounded when his partner Trooper Jimmie Linegar was shot and killed in the line of duty.

A government headstone was obtained and set in concrete at the grave of Elisha Headlee, a Revolutionary Soldier buried in Old Salem Cemetery in Greene County. Members of the Sergeant Ariel Nims Chapter Number 1 originated this activity, and members of the Ozark Mountain Chapter helped with its completion.

The Ozark Mountain Chapter placed SAR grave markers on the graves of two deceased members, William C. Britton and James Bever.

On August 17, 1986, the Ozark Mountain Chapter and the Missouri State Society were represented in the State of Pennsylvania by Compatriot Richard Yohe who was fulfilling a sixteen year old dream of finding and then re-dedicating a lost and forgotten cemetery near Washington and Monongahela, Pennsylvania.

After a ten year search the cemetery was found and saved from the blades of coal company bulldozers when a court order halted any destruction of the cemetery property. It was in this cemetery that Compatriot Yohe found the grave site of his grandfather (5th) and grandmother who had been buried at this cemetery in 1823 and 1833. A letter writing campaign was started in 1980 for donations, so that the cemetery could be cleared. The cemetery is 50 x 150 feet. In early 1986 the cleanup began and one hundred and fifty stones were found. Another generation of Compatriot Yohe's grandparents and an uncle and aunt were found. A short time later additional Revolutionary soldiers were found buried at the site, bringing the total to six.

A reunion of families who were related to the first five Revolutionary veterans, met for a re-dedication of the cemetery. Five SAR plaques were placed at the graves of the veterans. A sixth plaque was set four months after the dedication. Three video-cams were used to record the events on dedication day. Over one hundred and twenty-five SAR, DAR and relatives were on hand to hear FPG M. Graham Clark, State Senator J. Barry Stout (PA), Rev. Paul Miller Ruff and PASSAR Vice President Marshall Lignian address those present. The Missouri SAR flag was hung for all to see.

Work is now underway to make this cemetery a historical site and acquiring a right-

of-way to the cemetery which is now landlocked.

After the cemetery had been found, the first German Lutheran Church west of the Alleghenneys was found about six hundred feet from the cemetery. It had been built on land donated by Compatriot Yohe's grandfather. It had been sold in 1845, covered with white oak and used as a residence until 1974. Except for minor changes it remains much as it did in 1797.

Over one hundred pages of original records were found in the archives at the Lutheran Synod Library just north of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. They gave this generation a glimpse into some of the happy and sad times of its members. This church might well be the only Lutheran log church that has survived from those Colonial days. The cemetery may well be one of the smallest in size (footage) for the number of Revolutionary Soldiers resting there.

Two members, Compatriot Charles Sheppard and Dr. Charles F. Row, were awarded

25 year pins in 1986.

The SAR Silver ROTC Medal was awarded to a cadet from Evangel College and to a cadet from Southwest Missouri State University.

The Medal of Appreciation was awarded to Vera Wood. Martha Washington Medals were awarded to Ruth Calef, Mary Ellen Gifford, Geraldine Yohe and Willene Dernehl.

Compatriot William L. Wood has been awarded the Meritorius Service and Patriot Medals by MOSSAR and Richard L. Yohe received the MOSSAR Certificate of Appreciation.

BRAXTON C. POLLARD CHAPTER

The Braxton C. Pollard Chapter Missouri Society of the Sons of the American Revolution received its charter June 30, 1984, at Paris, Missouri, which was designated as the home of the chapter. W. Gordon Buckner, State Secretary and a former member and organizer of the M. Graham Clark Chapter, was designated president of the newly formed chapter by Charles R. Wollard, State President. Kirk McDaniel, Executive Vice-President of the MOSSAR, was appointed secretary with Paul W. Bennett, immediate past National Trustee, vice-president. The membership was composed at this time of eight other Compatriots, in addition to the officers, whose place of residence was such that no two lived in the same area except in the case of two from Paris. This chapter soon began the practice of holding their meetings in other locations as well as Paris for the convenience and interest of the membership.

As organizational president, W. Gordon Buckner went to great lengths to inform regents of the D.A.R. chapters in Northeast Missouri of the newly formed S.A.R. chapter and invited their participation.

Officers elected for 1985 were W. Gordon Buckner, President; Paul W. Bennett, Vice-President; Homer G. Sterne, Secretary-Treasurer. Membership was beginning to show an increase and general interest and enthusiasm was evident. Interesting programs were provided and the format of the State Society was reasonably well adheared to.

August 4, 1985, was an eventful day in the history of the chapter, for at this time the grave of the Revolutionary Soldier for whom the chapter was named, was officially designated by the placing of an S.A.R. marker. This date was selected in conjunction with Mark Twain's birthday celebration, Braxton C. Pollard being buried at Florida and Mark Twain having been born there. Braxton C. Pollard was born in Loudoun County, Virginia, December 25, 1760, the son of Thomas and Grace Pollard. In 1780, at the age of 20, he enlisted in the Virginia Militia from that county and was in time promoted to Corporal and served under Captain William Armistead in Colonel Charles

Dabney's regiment of Light Dragoons and participated in the Battle of Yorktown. At the close of the war Pollard returned to Loudoun County and in 1787 married Anna Guffee and they became the parents of six children. At some time during the next four years the Pollards moved to Owen County, Kentucky, and later to Pendleton County, Kentucky, where Anna died in 1799. In 1800 Pollard married Miss Powers and they had six children. In 1837 Braxton Pollard and his son Braxton C. Pollard, Jr., and family left Kentucky and moved to Missouri where they bought land in Monroe County near Florida and which land is now under a part of the Mark Twin Lake. Braxton C. Pollard died September 1, 1840, and was buried in the Florida Cemetery in Monroe County. The Elizabeth Cleveland Gillespie Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution of Perry, Missouri, marked the grave in 1934.

Two awards were made this year with Mrs. Barbara Vaughn and Mrs. Sarah Sterne receiving SAR Medals of Appreciation which are awarded to Daughters of the American Revolution for outstanding service to the Sons of the American Revolution.

Officers elected for 1986 were Gaylord P. O'Connor, President; Paul W. Bennett, Vice-President; Homer G. Sterne, Secretary-Treasurer; Frank P. Wilfley, Jr., Chaplain. Col. James A. Shelby, President, MOSSAR was present and installed the newly elected officers. Mrs. Shelby accompanied him. Newly acquired National and SAR flags were displayed for the first time. During this year the chapter established the third Saturday of the month as their regular meeting date and began traveling about the area for their noon luncheons and meetings. Vandalia, Hannibal and Clarksville were visited and the active membership showed their appreciation by attendance.

Officers for 1987 were Frank P. Wilfley, Jr., President; Paul W. Bennett, Vice-President; Homer G. Sterne, Secretary-Treasurer; D. Randall Cone, Chaplain. Col. James A. Shelby, President MOSSAR, was present and installed the officers at the February meeting. Interesting programs were presented throughout the year with emphasis on the Constitution. A program was initiated to mark revolutionary graves as rapidly as our resources would allow, there being a number of unmarked graves in the area. Applications for membership continue to be received and are in due time processed and accepted.

Officers for 1988 were Frank P. Wilfley, Jr., President; Gaylord P. O'Connor, Vice President; Homer G. Sterne, Secretary-Treasurer; D. Randall Cone, Chaplain. For the first time the chapter presented a Law-Enforcement Award, the recipient being Dean Mason of Monroe County who was completing his sixth term as sheriff of the county and had filed for a seventh term. His ardent stand against drug use and his popularity among the citizens of the area make him well qualified for this medal and citation. Cadet Sergeant First Class, William McConnell of Conway, Arkansas, a graduate of Missouri Military Academy, Mexico, Missouri, was the recipient of the R.O.T.C. Medal presented by the Sons of the American Revolution. He was also designated as recipient of four-year R.O.T.C. scholarships from the Army and the Navy. He has selected Memphis State for continuance of his studies.

The membership has doubled and continues to increase during this short span of existence. The ladies have always shown interest and have been an important influence in the organization. The membership list includes ladies in parenthesis.

THE SPIRIT OF ST. LOUIS CHAPTER

MARTIN WARREN CHAPTER

Ever since Charlie Drake became a member of the Harry S. Truman Chapter at Independence in 1985, Jim Shelby, then MOSSAR president, has encouraged him to start a chapter in Warrensburg. At that time it seemed like Mission Impossible, but he promoted membership among his associates, friends, and acquaintances in the various organizations that he attended. The reluctance of potential members to travel to Independence for SAR activities disappointed him, but, on the other hand, encouraged him to consider the possibility of an SAR chapter in Warrensburg. On trips to the trustees' meetings with the Shelbys and the Uncaphers, the possibility was always discussed. At the two Annual Congresses which the Drakes attended, the enthusiasm was resindled. When MOSSAR President Loker in 1988 set chartering a chapter of SAR in Warrensburg as one of his administration's goals, Charlie began to take it seriously. Jim offered to pay for an ad in the local papers. When three separate ads yielded only three interested persons, enthusiasm waned. But two of these three knew that they had DAR Patriots! Greg Gladfelter, about half my age, recruited diligently among his friends. Sam Welch of Chilhowee promised the membership of his son and twin grandsons. Could Charlie stop now and disappoint compatriots like them? The Drakes made announcements at the organizations to which they belonged, such as the West Central Missouri Genealogical Society, Johnson County Retired Teachers, and the Warrensburg Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. As the interest was increasing, the chartering date was set for 3 December, with the hope that 20 to 25, including visiting dignitaries, would be present at the chartering luncheon. During the days before the chartering luncheon, the reservations "snowballed" so that it was necessary to move the luncheon from the Gold Room in the Union to the dining rooms.

Sixty-three members of the Sons of the American Revolution, potential members, and their guests attended the luncheon in the University Union on the campus of Central M ssouri State University on December 3, 1988, when MOSSAR President Lawrence L. Loker presented the national charter to Compatriot Charles G. Drake whom he had appointed President of the New Martin Warren Chapter in Warrensburg. The following were elected to fill the rest of the offices of the chapter: vice president, Ernest W. Rush; co-secretaries, Alan W. Burke and Robert L. Young; treasurer, Greg Gladfelter; registrar, J. Eldon Yung; chancellor, David S. Lindsay; genealogist, A. J. Heck; chaplain, Samuel G. Welch; historian, Irl A. Gladfelter; and sergeant-at-arms, Robert D. Simmons. James A. Shelby, president of the South Central District, installed the officers and Compatriot Loker presented Compatriot Drake with an SAR gavel, symbolic of his new position. The program followed the ceremonies of the traditional SAR meeting. The luncheon opened with the invocation by Samuel G. Welch, chaplin of the Harry S. Truman Chapter. VPG Shelby led the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag, and Marvin D. Vawter, executive vice president, MOSSAR, led the SAR pledge.

After the election and installation of the officers, FPG Arthur M. King gave some history of the SAR and made appropriate remarks and admonitions to the new chapter

and its officers.

Dr. Robert A. Ulrich, mayor of Warrensburg, presented a proclamation to Presidents Loker and Drake, designating 3 December 1988, as Martin Warren Chapter

of the Sons of the American Revolution Day in the city of Warrensburg.

Compatriot Loker then read a letter of congratulations to the newest chapter of SAR from Charles F. Printz, President General, NSSAR. Greetings were extended to the new chapter by the Regent of the Warrensburg chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Dorothy L. McMeekin, who also conveyed the best wishes to the chapter from the State Regent, Mrs. K. Clark Froman, who regretted being unable to

attend the chartering because the date conflicted with scheduled activities of the Missouri DAR. Welcome to the city, the community, and the use of their resources was given by Jeff Hancock, city manager of Warrensburg, and Dr. H. Keith Stumpff, acting provost, Central Missouri State University.

State treasurer, Roy F. Hornbuckle, presented a \$50 check to the president of the chapter from the MOSSAR treasury as its usual contribution toward the expenses of starting a chapter. President Drake thanked Compatriot Hornbuckle for this much-needed financial assistance.

President Drake had made appropriate comments of appreciation to all the greetings, congratulations, and suggestions extended to the chapter and its officers. JOHN WOOLARD CHAPTER

The John Woolard Chapter was planned and conceived by one man, Charles Rainwater Wollard. Charles had retired to Cherokee Village, Arkansas, but in 1982 a desire to build a chapter of the S.A.R. in Richmond, Missouri, in Ray County, brought him back to Missouri after nearly forty years absence.

With the assistance of the William C. Corum Chapter he recruited members. Charles also placed advertisements in many local newspapers explaining the SAR and the formation of a local chapter. During this period Charles was driving back and forth from Arkansas to Missouri. He was assisted in Richmond by Judge David L. Busch, Mrs. Ramah Epps, librarian, and Mr. Donald Epps, retired. Charles and his assistants worked tirelessly on genealogical lines to establish proof to assist members in the preparation of their applications.

The installation of the new Missouri chapter was held at the Elms Hotel, Excelsior Springs, Missouri, on 18 December 1982. At that time it was the seventh SAR chapter in Missouri. The installation of the chapter started with an almost unheard of seventy-five members, due to the driving force of Charles R. Wollard.

The meeting was called to order by Former President General Arthur M. King who spoke on the growth of the SAR and the new headquarters in Louisville, Kentucky. Vice President General Augustus DiZerega talked about the history of the S.A.R. and conducted the installation of the John Woolard Chapter officers:

The chapter was named for Charles R. Wollard's great-grandfather, John Woolard, born in Pitts County, North Carolina, who came to Ray County in 1814. His father and grandfather were both soldiers in the Revolutionary War. John Woolard donated to Ray County the land where the present county courthouse in downtown Richmond, Missouri, is located. His donation was made in 1827 and Richmond was incorporated in 1837. John Woolard lived in a log cabin just south of the courthouse and, after donating the land, moved to a location nearby. According to records discovered in Richmond by Charles R. Wollard, the family name was changed in official records to "Wollard" with the children of John Woolard—as of 1845 the family used the "Wollard" spelling.

At the National Congress in Atlanta, 1983, Compatriot Wollard was presented the Florence Kendall award for recruiting the greatest number of new members during the past year. The medal was presented to Compatriot Wollard by then President General Howard Hamilton for signing up 63 new members. Listed below are the charter

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
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
