Board of Directors Report

The Missouri Society, Sons of the American Revolution, under the direction of President George Swales, conducted the quarterly Board of Directors meeting on January 29, 2022. The meeting was conducted via Zoom, due to the continuing concern over in-person meetings due to Covid. Twenty-five of the forty-eight voting members were present. To be a voting member, a compatriot must be a chapter president, a state officer, or a state honorary vice-president.

Several state officers presented a written report of their activities for the previous quarter, and some also gave verbal reports. Additionally, some chapters presented written reports, but there were no verbal reports. Numerous committee chairmen presented written reports, with some following up with verbal presentations and/or motions.

Honorary Vice President (HVP) James Osbourn reported on the upcoming Annual Meeting which will be held in St. Louis, at the Sheraton Westport Chalet Hotel on April 29-30, 2022. There are great rates on the rooms, and registration is open during February and March. The Missouri Society webpage has information on meeting registration and hotel registration. All Missouri Society compatriots are encouraged to attend.

In old business, the Board voted to continue the use of plaques for both the Yohe Year Book Award and the Josiah Fogg Award winning chapters. President Swales commended (HVP) Dennis Hahn for his excellent reporting of color guard activities and the great coverage the Missouri Society receives as a result. Executive Vice President (EVP) Michael Robertson presented a report and motion from the annual meeting host chapter committee which will guide the selection of any chapters wishing to be placed on the host list. The list currently contains 7 Missouri Society chapters, and rotates from chapter to chapter. EVP Robertson also informed the Board that a fund to endow the Yohe Fund Raising Project is up and running. New donors will be recognized at the April Annual Meeting.

In an effort to bring Board of Directors meetings closer to the center of the state, Second Vice President Michael Powers reported that the location he had secured in Jefferson City has since decided to close their facility to all outside groups. The search for a suitable location starting in July continues.

First Vice President David Shaul reminded everyone who has any contact with youth through SAR that Youth Protection Training is a mandate. Once the very brief training is completed, each compatriot should copy the certificate of completion and forward a copy to the Missouri Society secretary.

As officers change, it is imperative that a Change of Officer form be completed and submitted to the Missouri Society

Secretary each time any officer changes occur. He will then inform the National Society, the State Registrar and the Webmaster so that everyone is on the same page. The form is on the NSSAR website.

HVP J. Howard Fisk updated the Board concerning the new plaque at the Harry S. Truman Library in Independence, MO. The plaque memorializes President Truman's membership in the Sons of the American Revolution, and is located adjacent to Truman's statue. Once the library reopens, compatriots are encouraged to tour and make note of the plaque.

The nominating committee presented a slate of officers for 2022-2023. The nominees are: President-J. Michael Robertson, EVP-David R. Shaul, 1st VP-Michael H. Powers, 2nd VP-Steven E. Biggs, Secretary-Walter E. (Gene) Henry, Treasurer-John L. Bedell, Genealogist-W. Christian Sizemore, Registrar-Kirk T. Walker, Chancellor-Ronald L. Hack, Chaplain-H. Dan Philbrick, Historian -- Harold T. (Tom) Sentman, Surgeon-Norman P. Knowlton, III, M.D., and Sergeant-at-Arms-Daniel F. Piedlow. Officers will be elected and installed at the April 29-30 meeting in St. Louis.

Publicity Committee Chairman Dan Evans reported on the reestablishment of The Missouri Compatriot, which will enhance the ability to inform compatriots and others of the activities and events of the Missouri Society and its chapters.

A motion was made and seconded to require National and State Life Members to remain chapter members also, by amending the Society's By-Laws. The vote on this motion will be conducted at the April meeting. This will have no effect on the 6 current MOSSAR compatriots who are members-at-large. That grouping was frozen at an earlier meeting, meaning there will be no additional members-at-large. An additional motion to amend the By-Laws will also be voted upon at the April meeting. That proposed amendment will include the requirement that chapter By-Laws will be archived at the State Historical Society.

Following the business meeting, Phil Bloyd, from the National Society Education Center and Museum gave an interesting power point presentation showing the remodeling of the facility. Phil's primary responsibility is fund raising and

he mentioned numerous potential large donors to the National Society to enhance operations.

Secretary General Bruce Pickette is a 1968 ROTC graduate of Jacksonville State University in Alabama. His degrees include a B.S. in Secondary Education with a major in History, a Masters in Business Administration, and a Masters in Library Science. He was commissioned in the Signal Corps and spent 24 years in the Army, retiring as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1992. After his military career, he worked full-time in the information technology field for defense contractor companies for 15 years, retiring again in 2007. He became a member of the Sons of the American Revolution in 2002. He served as his chapter president in 2006 and as Alabama Society state president in 2010-2011. Bruce has served as the National Society's Librarian General, Registrar General, Treasurer General and is currently serving as Secretary General of the SAR.

Color Guard Report

It is my pleasure as State Color Guard Commander to share some information about the Missouri Society Sons of the American Revolution Color Guard. For those who do not know me or not met me, I would like to offer a bit of an introduction. I became a member of the SAR in 2004 while living in Massachusetts. I am a Nebraska native and, in my 38+ career years moved around from Missouri (Springfield, Kansas City and St. Charles), Wisconsin and Massachusetts. My 16 years in the Boston (2000-2016) area was wonderful for getting exposed to history, and the SAR. I retired a little early and moved back to Springfield.

I became a MOSSAR Color Guard member in 2008, and concurrently served in a variety of offices at the chapter and state level, including state secretary for 4 years and state President for 18 months until relocation to Missouri. It is common in Massachusetts for the President to serve 2 or more years. I was the Commander of the Col. Henry Knox Regimental Color Guard for 1 year before becoming State President.

Currently, I am the chapter genealogist for Ozark Mountain Chapter, as well at the State Commander. These are my areas of focus and pleasure.

In Massachusetts, in the winter of 2016, the Guard began training to National Park Service standards. This was all by design so that the Guard could reinstitute what they did 25 years earlier: fire ceremonial musket volleys from the north bridge in Concord, the very location where the war for independence officially began. This also allowed the Guard to fire a triple volley at the Bunker Hill national park at the June 17 ceremony.

I want to train our Guardsmen to the same standards here in Missouri. It is not difficult, it does require some training, but once completed, they are certified to NPS standards. Training to this standard goes beyond perceived compliance. It provides a level of consistency across all chapters so that when a state or national event occurs, all who fire their musket do so in a safe and uniform manner. To the spectator, it is awesome to see, and instills pride within the Guardsman.

2022 is the year for re-certification and training for the new "musketeer" to a level recommended by the national Color Guard. We are also preparing regulations for Color Guard, and safety protocols and procedures. This will bring the Guard into full compliance with national recommendations. When the training opportunity arises, commit, and participate.

To a different thought. Chapter invigoration and participation. I would like to see all chapters in Missouri have at least two Color Guard members. A militia outfit is not nearly as expensive as a formal uniform, such as that worn by the Continental Army soldier, or that which I wear. I will discuss uniform options with anyone interested in becoming a Color Guard member. The important point: join. We are the public face of the SAR. We participate in many events in this State. This link below will take you to the current issue of the national ColorGuardsman magazine. Be proud at how many events the Show Me state does. Yet we can do more, and we can educate more in areas currently lacking a Color Guard presence. Magazine link:

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier Centennial Commemoration -- November 7, 2021 Maple Park Cemetery - Springfield, MO Remarks by Paul Frinsthal Former Sentinel and Commander of the First Relief

In just 4 days it will be the 100th anniversary of the burial of the World War 1 unknown soldier at Arlington National Cemetery (ANC). I am humbled by the names and titles of all those present who have taken time today for this remembrance of someone we do not know...an American soldier who sacrificed his life...that we may have this country...this land we call home.

ANC has been a national cemetery since 1864. Abraham Lincoln had a lot to do with this.

The civil war was about to break loose.

In July of 1861 President Lincoln invited Robert E. Lee to the white house to ask him to be the ranking general of the union army. Lee turned Lincoln down. Lee was living in Virginia, and it became a confederate state. Both men were very polite about this decision. However, cabinet members Montgomery Meigs and Edwin Stanton, who hated Lee, were constantly on the lookout for ways to hurt him.

Many terrible battles happened within a few miles of Arlington. Eventually, Meigs & Stanton started burying troops from both sides in and around the Lee property. From a number of battlefields unknown union and confederate soldiers were buried in Lee's back yard. In a grave measuring 50'x50'x10' the first unknowns (2,111) were buried at ANC.

Today there are 155 national military cemeteries in 42 states...some are very small. Most are maintained by the states where they are found. History reveals that the first unknown soldier memorial site was established in Denmark in 1849.

Our nation did not consider having an unknown soldier memorial...until after England established such a site in 1919.

Our first unknown soldier came about in 1921 in the following way:

- * Four French battlefield cemeteries were selected.
- * From each of these, one unknown American soldier was exhumed
- * The remains of each were placed in four identical coffins
- * Our most decorated American soldier, Sgt. Edward Younger was chosen to pick one of these four to be the WWI American unknown.

This unknown was taken from France to Washington DC where he was taken to lie in state in the rotunda of our nation's capital before he was taken the next day to ANC.

He was buried at a prepared site near the entrance to the memorial amphitheater.

President Warren G. Harding officiated at the internment on the 11th hour...of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1921.

- * From 1921 to 1925 the tomb was unprotected
- * From 1925 to 1937 a military guard was in place when the cemetery was open to the public
- * From 1937 to this very moment a military guard has been present every second.
- * The WWI tomb we see today was dedicated in 1932: 7 pieces of marble: at about 80 tons
- * It is cleaned and inspected every year

The number one question wherever I go....is how the sentinels are selected for this honor.

In my time they were picked by current guards and honor guard ranking personal. We were trained at night and on weekends...then we were tried...then we were accepted or rejected.

On July 7, 1965...I was in the prep room at the tomb. In just a few minutes at 1:00 pm, I would walk the mat in front of the tomb for the first time. I was being tried. My clothes and buttons and shoes and all other uniform parts were carefully checked by me and others...over and over again...they were perfect...they had to be...I felt great...I was ready. Then the commander of the first relief...who does all the guard changes...said to me as he went out the door:

"Frinsthal...this is it.... remember...as a tomb guard you only get one chance to make your final mistake" My rifle was handed to me...along with encouragement from other guards...I was ready!!!

Then it hit me.... what was I about to do...I was about to do things I knew I couldn't do...I was never able to give a speech and in basketball, I was too nervous to shoot the ball or carry the ball with everyone looking at me. Once again...I now had the ball...everyone (about 1,500 people) ...and their cameras would all be focused on me.

Somewhere over 1,200+ guard changes later...I was still a little nervous...but I got through it because what I was doing was not for me...the crowd.... the Sgt. of the guard.... or any military-minded person from the pentagon who might have a note pad and a stopwatch to make sure we were doing our job.

What I was doing was for all the unknowns...who had no name on their white stone...but they deserved this honor because of their ultimate sacrifice.

Two experiences happened to me at the tomb that I cannot forget:

Night duty...with my friends.

After the cemetery would close each day...the tomb guards would start 2-hour shifts until 7 am the next morning...not formal...but demanding.

You're in the middle of a large cemetery and there is not another living person to talk to...you hear sounds...you see things move...you're a bit tired.

On some evenings I would pass the time away by talking to the unknowns...I know what you're thinking...for the record... no! They did not respond.

But I always felt that somehow, they knew I was there...it was a good...friendly feeling. Such thoughts touched my heart.

One other experience I will share: On a regular day...about 200 people gathered...the guard change was over and I was beginning my 60-minute walk.... then at one end of the plaza I spotted an older couple. The man had a cane he leaned on, and the woman had a hanky she kept wiping her eyes.

I never gave it much thought until that evening. It came to me...just maybe this couple had a son who fought in WWI. And maybe he never came home. Could it be that this couple thought the unknown buried there was possibly their son?

As this tribute ends, I want you to know and consider the motto of the tomb guards both active and retired: "Soldiers never die...until they are forgotten...tomb guards never forget"

Many of you here this day also believe this with all your heart...thank you.

No place that honors our veterans in America is more special than others...but only one has chosen for the past 84 years to honor our unknowns...as is done at Arlington...in doing so we encourage the living to never let this remembrance die...since 1937.

This special guard unit understands completely their call to duty and the impact of these words found upon the tomb of the WWI unknown:

Here rests in honored glory

An American soldier

Known but to God

I truly believe that somewhere in God's eternity for us...if so blessed...I will meet the soldier we honor today...first a salute... then a soldier's hug.

On veteran's day, in a quiet moment, we...from our hearts might ask God to bless this day of remembrance. Under the shadow of freedom and liberty provided by our veterans whose names are often found on white marble markers...all across this land and around the world...and lest we forget...our thanks to the thousands of lives whose stones are simply marked...Unknown American Soldier.

Our freedoms and liberty...might encourage us to say...from our hearts: God bless moments of remembrance like this God bless our veterans, God bless the DAR and all patriotic Americans who will never forget!

And God bless America!

On Saturday, September 18th, 2021, the William C. Corum Chapter held the grave marking ceremony for Patriot John Davis led by chapter President, Michael Robertson.

John Davis was born August 19th, 1753 in Prince William County VA. In the Spring of 1775 while living in Prince William County, he enlisted in the Virginia Regiment of the Continental Army. He served 3 months in Colonel Levin Powell's Virginia regiment in Captain Heatter's company. After that, he re-enlisted as a wagoner under Wagon Master John Morris and served for fifteen months. Again in 1780 John Davis enlisted for service this time from Rowan County, NC in Colonel Lytle's NC regiment in Captain Lowman's Company and one month in Captain Hendricks's Company. Following the war, he served an additional six months against the Tories and was taken prisoner at Charleston NC. He received his pension on August 10th, 1832 in Perry Township, Pickaway County, OH and moved to Washington Township, Buchanan County, MO in 1843. On May 31st, 1844, John Davis passed away and was buried at King Hill Cemetery with full military honors.

Founding of the Missouri Society and the

National Society, Sons of the American Revolution

In 1883, the New York Society of the Sons of Revolution was organized by John Austin Stevens (1827-1910). In 1889, William Osborne McDowell (1848-1927), Josiah Collins Pumpelly (1839-1920) and General William Scudder Stryker (1838-1900), residents of New Jersey and members of the New York Society of the Sons of the Revolution organized the New Jersey Society of the Sons of the Revolution but were unwilling to accept the Sons of the Revolution requirement that other state societies be subordinate to the New York society.

As a result, McDowell organized the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) at Fraunces Tavern in New York City on April 30, 1889. This date was the centennial for the inauguration of George Washington as the First President of the United States of America in 1789. The SAR was incorporated on January 17, 1890, in Connecticut and the first National Congress was held on April 30, 1890, in Louisville, Kentucky. A congressional charter was granted on June 9, 1906, and signed by President Theodore Roosevelt, a member of the SAR.

The circular sent to Missouri Governor David Rowland Francis by William Osborne McDowell was the beginning of the thought to form a state society in Missouri.

The New Jersey Society called on all states to meet in New York City on April 30, 1889, and to form a national society. The circular set forth the objectives and aims of the proposed society. Governor Francis sent the circular and other papers to Josiah Fogg of St. Louis and stated that he had no objection to have the organization in St. Louis. Josiah Fogg immediately published a notice in the newspaper and met with interested men. He published a second notice resulting in nearly 50 men in attendance on April 23, 1889.

The previously appointed committee reported in favor of organizing and presented a constitution and bylaws. Those in attendance at the meeting voted in favor of organizing the proposed Missouri Society, SAR and adopted the constitution and bylaws. The Missouri Society, SAR, was officially organized on April 23, 1889. Officers elected were President. Josiah Fogg, Secretary Harmon J. Bliss, Registrar John M. Fulton, and Treasurer Dr. Charles E. Briggs. The Honorable Gaius Orville Paddock was duly elected to serve as a delegate to the meeting on April 30, 1889, in New York City at Fraunces Tavern.


Founding of the Missouri Society and the

National Society, Sons of the American Revolution Continued

After a two-day session, the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR), came into being and Gaius Orville Paddock of St. Louis was elected as Treasurer General. Missouri Governor David Rowland Francis was elected as a Vice President General for Missouri. The St. Louis City government and the Merchants Exchange jointly arranged to have a grand parade on April 30, 1889, in accordance with the recommendations of United States Congress to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as the first president of the United States. The Missouri Society of the Sons of the American Revolution voted to join the procession with their marshals, flags, and music, and to wear the old Continental hats. It was reported "the day was a delight, and nothing occurred to spoil the pleasure of the occasion". The Missouri Society hosted the 15th NSSAR Annual Congress at the 1904 World's Fair in St. Louis.
