From The President

By President Steven Biggs

The following is the acceptence speech President Biggs articulated at congress:

Good evening, everyone. I'd like to first acknowledge my family for their love and support with getting us to this point tonight. My wife Vicki, daughters Loire and Abby, grandson Lincoln, and my aunt Shirley Brown along with my recently deceased mother Susan Biggs have always loved and supported myself and America's patriotic history.

Missouri Society Past, Present, and Future; how all three perspectives are needed

One of my favorite past compatriots, Winston Churchill, once said, "If we open a quarrel between the past and the present, we shall find we have lost the future." Some of you may not know that his mother was an American with roots back to the Revolution whereas some of us may have learned about it when a few years ago when MOSSAR marked the Fulton, Missouri site where Churchill gave his great Iron Curtain speech. He had traveled to Fulton by train from Washington, D.C. with another Compatriot, Missouri's own President Harry Truman. For the past couple of years, the Missouri Society holds annual Medal of Honor ceremonies at the Truman Library in Independence and I look forward to joining the event this year.

So back to Churchill - Churchill gave us wise words to think about when we are dealing with each other. Those who turn their backs on the past have no future. Those who prefer the present moment have cut themselves off from the great tradition that leads us to tomorrow. Life is a whole, and to choose one part of it at the expense of the rest is simply to mutilate it. We do not need to be reminded that those who become completely a man of either the past, the present or the future are not to be trusted. Life is whole and a man needs yesterday, today, and tomorrow in proper balance if he is to live a full life.

What does it mean to be mindful of the whole? Part of the answer is found in our own experience and here's some insight into how I got here.

The Missouri Society is one of the oldest state societies with our first state president, **Josiah Fogg**

also from St. Louis taking our oath in April 1889. Today's conference marks MOSSAR's 136th year as a patriotic organization.

My own journey to tonight's moment took about nine years from first applying to join the SAR:

- Shortly after joining our organization, I purchased Burt Mayfield's George Washington uniform and started serving in our Color Guard under the late great Bill Groth in 2017.
- Also starting in 2017, I was elected for the first of three times as the SSL Secretary before the chapter made me President twice during the next 2 years. The secretary role gave me a good place to learn the activities and procedures whereas my time as chapter president included the Covid years when we had to meet via Zoom for a time. Then we had to plan how to get members back in person and we hosted a number of special activities: a grave marking of five patriots at Fee Fee cemetery; a special lunch and silent auction for the SSL's 40th Anniversary; and later the MOSSAR state Conference. Along the way, I found one of my best friends, John Bedell.
- Next. I served as a state officer for 7 years: This included as MOSSAR Registrar 3 years under James, Howard, and George. Then on the Executive Committee each 1 year as 2nd VP under Michael, 1st VP under Dave, and EVP for Gene. Again, these offices were a time for learning. In addition to my regular duties, I began helping with the annual Battle of Fort San Carlos, a SAR national Color Guard event held in Ste. Genevieve whose success is largely due to our committee of Ken Lawrence, Steve Perkins, and Howard Fisk.

During my time on the ExCom, we've adopted monthly business Zoom meetings and term limits for state officers of 5 years in the same office. We're approaching the first set of term limits in a couple of years so opportunities abound to become a state officer. Now as your president, I am especially looking forward to working with our Committee of Communications which this year will rollout several new features to both protect and enhance MOSSAR's growth.

MOSSAR is conscious of the whole and taking steps to be a dynamic, thriving organization. So, let's look forward to some ways that you might get more

involved. Here are some of the items to look forward to in the coming year:

- 1) The **Kephart Fund** will have its first distribution since being recently established. This involved many Missourians who established a committee to oversee over \$500,000 from the sale of Compatriot Wilber Kephart's farm. Much thanks are deserved of Michael Powers, Ron Hack, Steve Newman, and others for their hard work on this matter. Reach out to these men and see they might help you.
- 2) Battle of Fort San Carlos 5/25/25, there's already a great team in place and we would like to see some of you join in preparation for the 2026 event that is being expanded to 3 days. There is much needed for this to successfully continue in coming years so please ask about joining this team.
- 3) **Chapter visits:** The local chapter is really where the rubber meets the road. With 16 chapters and plans for a new one coming near Cape Girardeau this year there are plenty of events to participate in activities.
- 4) Quarterly state meetings will remain in Jefferson City at the Jefferson Bank thanks to Compatriot Ed Gray. It is a marvelously decorated colonial facility and centrally located so come join in and help shape state business.
- 5) NSSAR Leadership and Congress meetings/
 Every Spring and Fall the national SAR hosts meetings in Louisville where you can meet fellow compatriots from across America. Missouri is just a few hours' drive from Louisville, Kentucky and I know some of you have even made it a day trip to test the waters, although we hope you decide to stay for the full event. Then there is the annual SAR Congress held in July that rotates around the country amongst the various districts. This year it is being held in Connecticut where our honored guest, Compatriot Michael Elston is set to take the national leadership role.
- 6) **The 250th Anniversary** of the American Revolution is well underway with events like the Lexington and Concord celebrations earlier this month. It is important for us to acknowledge the sacrifices of our patriot ancestors.

MOSSAR and the SAR are full of opportunities for your

growth helping with our patriotic and educational mission.

In conclusion, I'd like to close with a story about our nation's greatest patriot, George Washington. After the end of the actual fighting of the American Revolution, there were almost two years of uncertainty about the future. No peace treaty had been formally signed, and the army had to be maintained in case there was a resumption of hostilities. It was hard to keep up morale; our patriot ancestors were terribly underpaid, poorly fed, and miserably supplied. It was a time of testing. The soldiers began a movement to take things into their own hands and redress their own grievances. Even some of the officers were lending themselves to the idea.

Then Washington, called them altogether, not to chastise them, not to silence a righteous protest. So, with no show of anger or of being offended, very gravely he took a statement from his pocket about the meaning of the war and his hopes for peace. He adjusted his eye glasses, and then observed as an aside; "Gentlemen, you will permit me to put on my spectacles, for I have not only grown gray, but also almost blind in the service of my country."

He did not need to say any more. Suddenly his officers and men saw in him that the banishment of evil and the winning of freedom always means suffering. They fought for freedom and it would be a sad thing if they undid the whole purpose of the war and the ideals for which they for which they stood to support such a foolish movement.

Please remember how I opened with Compatriot Churchill's insights of a balance between past, present, and future. Organizations like MOSSAR and our nation need each of us to be mindful of the whole and participate to keep democracy strong for future generations of Americans. Thank you for your support and hope to see everyone in Springfield for next year's MOSSAR state conference!





Fort Zumwalt Monument Marker

MOSSAR Color Guard responded to a state muster to support the DAR Caroline Close Stewart Chapter on Sunday, April 27, 2025, at O'Fallon. At Fort Zumwalt Park a permanent historical marker was unveiled to recognize the home of Revolutionary War patriot Jacob Zumwalt. The procession of colors was led by the Lewis & Clark Fife & Drum Corps followed by twelve SAR Color Guard members. Upon falling into their positions, Regent Lori Vilbert and State Regent Lisa Parks proceeded with the ceremony and historical biography of soldier Jacob Zumwalt, and ultimately the unveiling followed by a triple-volley with five muskets. The group then proceeded to the Heald House where a bronze Revolutionary War marker set into a large stone, was unveiled. From some legend and mostly established family history, Jacob Zumwalt and family were early settlers to the eastern Missouri area in present-day O'Fallon. By surname you see German heritage, originally from the Pennsylvania colony. Five of his brothers followed him. Spanish land grant #55 provided 450 arpents (383 acres) situated both sides of Belleau Creek. Present Ft. Zumwalt park is on a part of that original patent. Patriot Grave Marking Ceremony for Thomas Hash


